

## Celebration of First Founder's Day To Be Observed Nov. 15

Founders Day will be celebrated for the first time at Barry on November 15, the birthday of the late Bishop Patrick Barry for whom the college is named. The day's program will begin with celebration of a Solemn High Mass in Cor Jesu Chapel. The Right Reverend Monsignor Barry of St. Patrick's, Miami Beach, will be the celebrant.

Students and faculty will form an academic procession into the chapel preceding the Mass at 8:30 A. M. The Mass will be sung by members of the first choir.

Following the Mass will be a formal breakfast in Calaroga. Father Burke, as principal speaker will give a brief history of the College. Miss Colleen Breslin will give a summary of a student's impression of a year in her "Reminiscences." Miss Rosalie Fallon, freshman voice student will be included on the musical program planned by Sister M. Denise.

## Summer Changes In Barry Faculty

Summer brought many changes. And some of these affected Barry and the Barry girls. Sister Rose Dominic, O.P., and Father J. B. Walker, O.P., failed to appear on that first school day when roll was called. At first it was thought that tardiness was the reason for their absence, but it was later disclosed that Sister Rose Dominic had been missioned to Santa Cruz, California, and Father Walker gave up the study of the psychology of women to teach at the Dominican House of Studies in River Forrest, Illinois.

A qualified instructor from the Miami Chapter of the American Red Cross will conduct this series of lectures. The classes will meet two nights a week. The course is open to both students and faculty.

Threats of civil war were already apparent and Father told of days spent in suspense and uncertainty as to whether theirs would be the next roof to go up in flames.

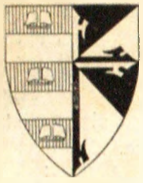

Monthly meetings, both social and business, have been planned.

Barry College students have answered the plea for mission support made by their chaplain, the Reverend Cyril Burke, O.P. Following the suggestion of Patricia Ridge, Sodality Prefect, funds are being raised for the adoption of homeless Chinese babies.

## Enrollment Shows Marked Increase

From thirty students in September, 1940, to sixty-three for the fall term of 1941, the number of registrations at Barry have more than doubled this year.

In proportion to the expanded registrations there has been an increase in the curriculum. The twenty-eight new courses introduced this term include: Sacred Scripture, "The Son of God and His Masterpiece," in the Religion and Philosophy department. New courses in the Language and Literature department are History of Latin Literature, Studies in Latin Prose, Contemporary Spanish Literature, French Literature of the Seventeenth Century, English Literature of the Renaissance, Introduction to Medieval Literature, Newswriting and Editing, and Educational Dramatics.

### Science Additions

To the Natural Science department have been added General Biology, Bacteriology and Qualitative Analysis. Social Science department offers Latin American History, Religious Forces in American History Social Ethics, Business Law. In the Secretarial Science course are Accounting 5, Accounting 15 and Office Practice. The Fine and Applied Arts take in Harmony and Gregorian Chant, Art Philosophy, Lettering and Display, Home Management and Practice, Clothing, Chemistry of Foods. Also added to the above group is the newly-formed course in Physical Education.

Contrasting the number of Freshmen registered in 1940 with that of 1941, statistics show that there were fourteen in the first Freshman class, as compared with thirty-five in the Class of '45.

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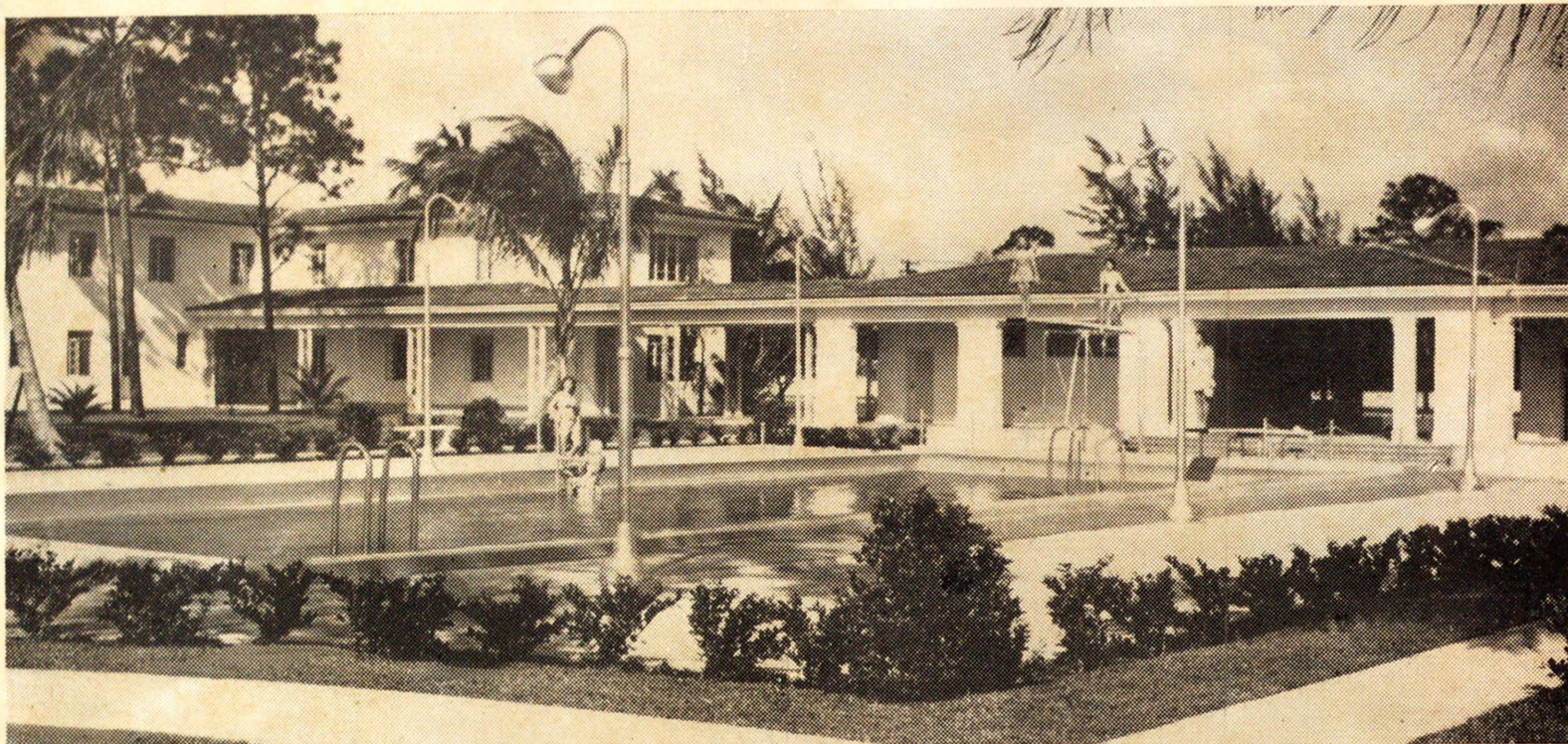
