The program will include a farewell to the seniors, given by Evelyn Howard, Junior class president, and recently elected Sodality prefect for the year 1948-49. Cor Jesu Chapel, the heart of campus activities, will be the scene of the seventh annual graduation exercises at Barry College, June 2. On that evening, 23 Seniors will receive their academic diplomas from the Rt. Rev. Thomas J. McDonough, Auxiliary Bishop of the Diocese of St. Augustine.

The Rt. Rev. Carroll F. Deady, Superintendent of Schools in the Archdiocese of Detroit will be the principal speaker. Monsignor Deady has taught at the University of Detroit, Notre Dame University, and Siena Heights College.

The largest number of Bachelor of Arts degrees ever presented at Barry will be awarded that evening to nine seniors. Anne Criado, Barbara Lane, and Adelia McInarnay will receive their degrees with majors in social science. Jane Dexter and Catherine Ficks will receive the B.A. degree with majors in English; Barbara Hannon will receive hers in music, Mary Lou Lomaistro in Spanish, Claire McCullough in mathematics, and Marion Roberts in history.

Bachelor of Science degrees will be received by Joan McGraw in social science, Rosemary Henretty in chemistry, Irene Draughton in mathematics, and Georgia Gussow will receive her degree in biology. Also receiving B.S. degrees will be Marianne Moesta and Dorothy Wood who will receive their degrees in home economics, and Rosemary Naef who will be awarded her degree with a major in dietetics.

Receiving Bachelor of Philosophy degrees will be English majors Colleen Gillen and Mari-lu Gray, music major Geraldine Condon and history major Ella Pintado. Barbara Thompson and Jean Pastor will receive their diplomas with a major in education. Lucille Steiner, social science major, will also receive the Bachelor of Philosophy degree.

The music for the evening's ceremonies will be sung by the Cor Jesu choir. **Panis Angelicus** by Barbara Hannon will be played for the first time in public, and Sister Mary Denise's new **Ave Maria** will be heard. Also included in the musical program will be Singenburger's **Ecce Sacerdos** which will be sung as the Bishop approaches the altar. **Salve Regina** by Waddington, **Veni Creator**, by Ravanello, and **Tantum Ergo** by Grazioli and the official liturgical hymn of thanksgiving, the **Te Deum**, will also be part of the program.

Jacqueline Quinn—

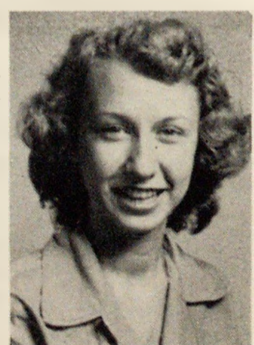

Susie Miller—

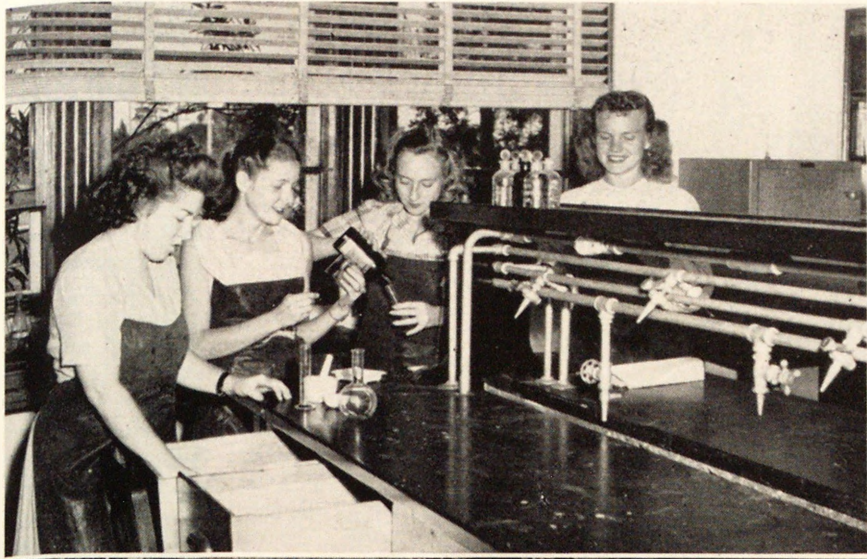

Flowerland Ball JUNIOR-SENIOR PROM

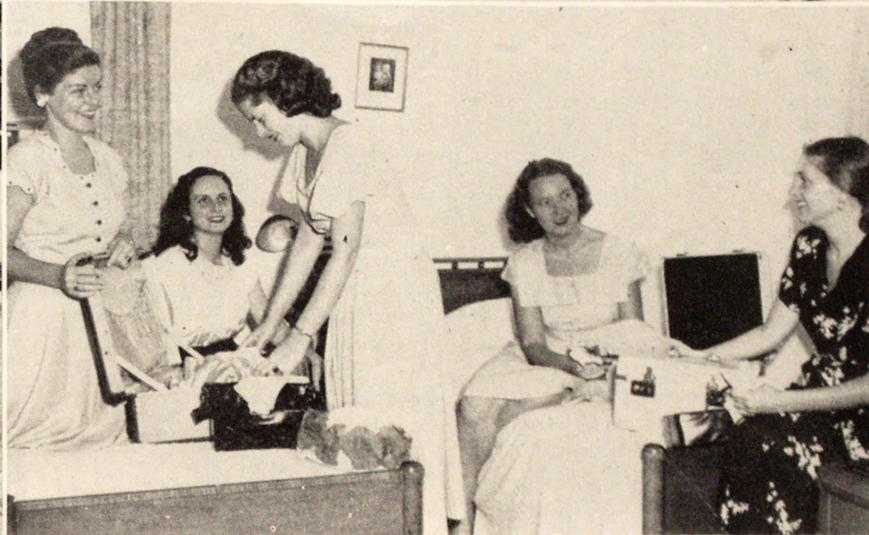

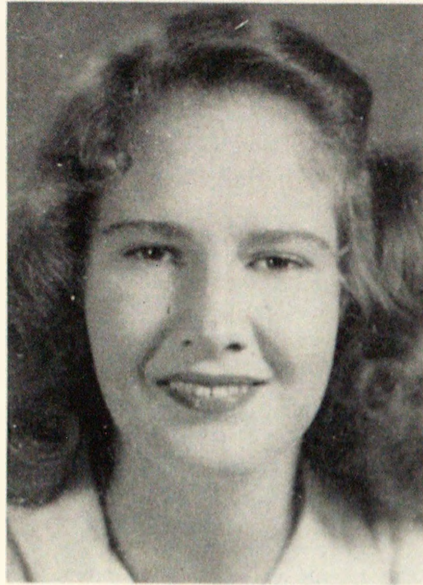

Research Unit Investigates Cancer

The Institutum Divi Thomae was founded in 1935, in Cincinnati, Ohio by His Grace, Archbishop John T. McNicholas, O.P. Its purpose is to train religious and lay Catholics in the field of science so they can carry on research and train other scientists.

The Institutum now has many branches, one of which is Barry College. Here, Sister Mary Jane, O.P., and Sister Thomas Mary, O.P., graduates of the Institutum, are investigating one of the many pathological effects of cancer. Working with them is Sister Ann Charles, O.P.

The problem that the Sisters are concentrating on is the effect of various germicides upon the activity of peroxidase, a simple enzyme. Peroxidase was chosen because it is an enzyme similar to the cytochromes of the respiratory chain and because its action can be easily studied.

It is known that cancer depresses the normal respiratory rate of tissues, which means that the respiratory enzymes might be affected too. Therefore the Sisters are experimenting with the effect of such poisons as phenylmercuric nitrate and phenylmercuric hydroxide upon their simple enzyme system. They are also attempting to determine what substances will restore the lost activity of the enzyme.

Assisting the Sisters are freshmen Madeline De Chiaro, Dolores Fiorentino, Rose Mary Gargano, Mary Frances Guzman, Mary Kay Marelli and Shirley Jean Wright. These girls are being trained in research methods and technique, and are acquiring invaluable practical experience.
