#### Professor Accuses Arts Colleges of Neglecting Politics

What are liberal arts colleges doing to help students understand national problems? Very little, according to Dr. Frank Johnson, speaking at a joint Florida Intercollegiate Student Government and Press Association meeting at Rollins college.

Patricia Oak, Georgann Travnikar, Jane Burman, and Isabel Dempsey attended the convention in Winter Park as student government representatives.

Dr. Johnson, of the Rollins history department, stressed the fact that politics plays a part in our every day lives. Students should be vitally interested in learning more about this subject, he insisted.

Causes for the lack of understanding, according to Dr. Johnson, include: fear of discussing controversial subjects, lack of funds for new enterprises, diverted interests of teachers, and the inertia of many professors.

Results of a panel discussion on the value of the FISGA show that the delegates believe it brings about better relations between colleges. Individually, the delegates can acquire leadership, initiative, poise, and experience in discussing problems with others.

#### Art Major to Display Stations in Ceramics

For her senior project art major Barbara O'Donnell is making the Stations of the Cross in unglazed ceramics. She will display her work at an exhibition here the last week in May.

Barbara begins each station by modeling it in clay and casting it in a one-piece plaster mould. Then she reproduces it in its final clay medium.


