There has been a notable increase in the number of new resident student applications for the fall term of 1956, representing a 68% in-



Fr. Walker's Visit Recalls Beginning Months At Barry

Father James Bernard Walker's visit to Barry as Commencement day speaker will recall to mind for some of us another time when the beloved Dominican priest came to the college and stayed on for a whole year.

This was in 1940, at the beginning of Barry's opening year, and Father Walker witnessed much of the growth and excitement of those first months while serving as campus chap-

In November of the same year, a ten-page mimeographed student rewspaper appeared on campus for the first time, at the behest of Barry students. Published by a handful of girls, it was known as the "Barry College Digest," and with its immediate success became the forerunner of ANGELICUS, published a few months later.

This first mimeographed issue covered the campus doing well, with write-ups on sports, a faculty tea, the art department, faculty conventions, lecturers, class elections, verse speaking and dramatics. Feature interest was included in the paper, too, with one article entitled "Father Walker Proposes Objectives for School Paper," attracting particular attention.

"The appearance of a college paper on the campus at Barry College in the very first year of its foundation is a healthy and encouraging sign," Father stated in his article. "The Barry girls are aware of the changes taking place in the world they are to live in. They understand that the ideas and ideals which have for centuries formed the warp and woof of our individual and social lives are being replaced by ideologies both inhuman and depraved. They are also cognizant of the printed word in propagating the doctrines that are effecting these transforma-

Father Walker went on to say that Barry girls "are quite conscious, despite their enthusiastic entry on the field of journalism, that what they now have to say may not carry much weight, nor have much influence on the outcome of the struggle."

"But," he added, "the appearance of a Barry College Digest points to the willingness to enter the fray upon the side of truth and a recognition of the importance literary expression must play in the cause of reason and sanity . . . If I may presume to point out an immediate objective, may I say that there is a great need for insistence upon the Christian conception of the dignity of womanhood and a correct understanding of the nature of love . . ."

Angelicus is proud of itself and Barry college and the manner in which both have adhered to those ideals laid down sixteen years ago. With joy we welcome back Father Walker, the inspiring priest who first assisted us with our pioneering plans.

To the graduating class of Barry college the Angelicus staff extends its best wishes for a successful and blessed life . . .



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
