
Mercedes selected two arias of Desdemona from Otello, the "Willow Song" and the "Ave Maria.



Baptismal Ceremony, Attire Carries Religious Symbolism

I baptize thee . . . by this, the second birth of man, a child is "incorporated into the Mystical Body of Christ; he is endowed with the long reach of love that is stopped by no barriers; he is given hosts of helpers in the communion of saints . .."

To make the Baptismal ceremony an even more memorable time perhaps you would like to begin this custom in your home and community.

The pictured dress is made from any ordinary commercial pattern. All the stitches should be done by hand, and the edges are hand rolled. The seven inserts, each surrounded on all sides by lace, signify the seven sacraments.

The first insert, representing Baptism, pictures the Baptismal water. The second, Penance, shows the keys of the kingdom which Our Lord gave to St. Peter. These illustrate the private right to forgive sins.

Confirmation, the third insert, pictures the dove symbolic of the Holy Ghost. The sacraments of Holy Eucharist and Extreme Unction are the next two inserts. The first features the chalice and host and the last, the candle.

The stole, symbolic of the sacred priesthood in the sacrament of Holy Orders, along with the alb and two candles repesenting Matrimony complete the insertions.

The sacramental cloth, placed on the reception table, consists of the seven symbols (signified here by letter) in the shape of a cross. It is a plain white linen square, with an inch hem embroidered in red. Next to each sacrament the pertinent information regarding the sacrament is placed.

For instance, next to the Baptism picture would appear the name of the child, the date of Baptism, the sponsors' names, and the name of the priest who administers the sacrament.

A bowl of ivy is placed in the middle of the table signifying the baby becoming a part of the Mysti-

cal Body, "I am the vine, you are the branches."

Directly in front of the ivy a shell, used to pour the Baptismal water, is placed.

The sacramental cloth is kept throughout the child's life and at his death thus, his sacramental history, is buried with him.

Of course, the sacrament itself is the important thing. These are only niceties used to add solemnity to the day.


A resident of Dade County, Rachel has been chosen on the basis of her scholastic ability, participation in campus activities and personality.
