



We look forward with trust and we look backward with love and thankfulness upon our time at Barry College. We invite you to relive it with us in the pages of this TORCH AND SHIELD ...







••• In the next few pages, dear Mother, we will tell you of some of our activities and clubs which filled 1943-44 with pleasant memories for us . . . Most important in our student life is your Sodality. It sponsors many of our traditional ceremonies; it operates by means of five committees, to one of which every Sodalist belongs.





First comes the Eucharistic committee, which, during the year, sponsored several triduums and novenas, cared for a poor family, arranged for speakers and round table discussions and sold refreshments at parties. The chairman of the committee was Frances Collier.

Betty Motschall headed the Catholic Truth committee, which included among its year's activities a

subscription drive for the QUEEN'S WORK, preparation of toys for hospitalized children, the formation of a study club and display of appropriate Lenten books in the campus library.

Your committee, Our Lady's, was headed by Dor-

othy Motschall. This year the group sponsored the

Living Rosary ceremony and the May crowning of your statue. It also provided the colored children of a Dominican mission with Christmas gifts and decorated your altar on the feasts of the Purification and the Annunciation.



The Publicity committee was headed by Lorraine Miller. Its year's activities included a display in public libraries during Catholic Book Week, weekly bulletin board displays, two raffles and the sponsorship of a series of bingo parties.

The Social Life committee, led by Jean Travnikar,

planned the dances held at Barry during the year. These included two tea dances, a Valentine formal and the Senior prom.

Apart from Soality activities, a highlight of the year's events is the Freshman tree planting. The east lawn of Rosa Mystica is set aside for class trees. The Freshmen, in caps and gowns, marched solemnly to





their tree, singing "Hymn to the God of Creation." The class president threw a shovelful of earth upon the roots of the tree. Father Burke then sprinkled the tree with holy water and blessed it. It symbolized the fruitful and evergrowing loyalty of the new students to their Alma Mater.

John G. Thompson, Mayor of Miami Shores and the Right Reverend Monsignor William Barry, rector of St. Patrick's church, Miami Beach.



the editorship of Lorraine Miller and Ruth Waters




it has had a very successful year, during which it turned to an editorial policy of featurizing news, and became a member of the Associated Collegiate Press.






Team sports were headed by Ruth Waters, and the Junior class was victorious in volleyball and basketball tournaments.



With Josefina Caballero as president, the activities




of the Spanish club included several programs presented to the entire student body, and community sings of Spanish songs. The group also cared for a poor Spanish family at Christmas.

The Albertus Magnus science club, with Audrey Hull as president, presented three outside speakers to the student body and held a tea for members at the end of the school year.

Students of the dramatic group concentrated on



presenting and producing their own plays. Ann Grimshawe's play, Joan of Arc Speaks Again was staged in this way. Other productions included Little Women and several skits and sketches.

Under the direction of Sister Denise, the student body sang the Oratorio of Mary in the chapel at Christmas time. Other musical highlights included

the publication of Campus Songs and the singing of Sister's new "Regina Coeli" at Pan-American day Mass.

The feast of St. Pius V was a red-letter day for private Dominican Tertiaries on campus, for a Tertiary chapter was founded, a novice was professed and three other students celebrated their first anniversary as professed Tertiaries.




