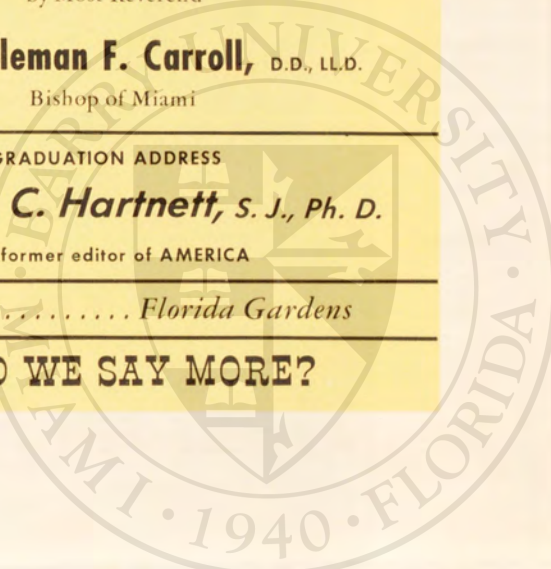

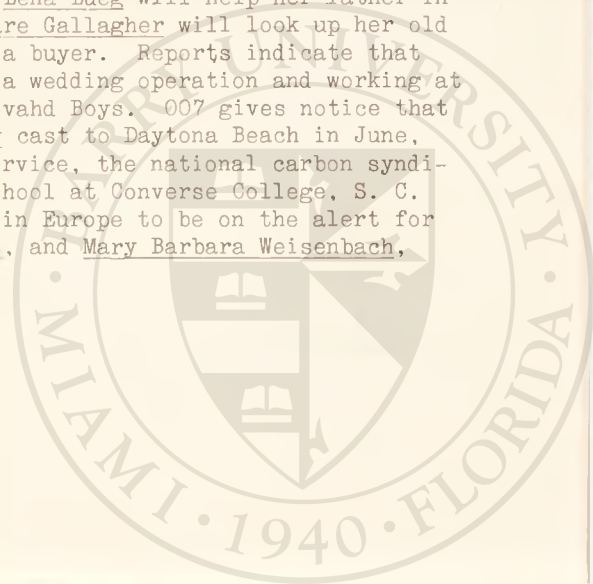

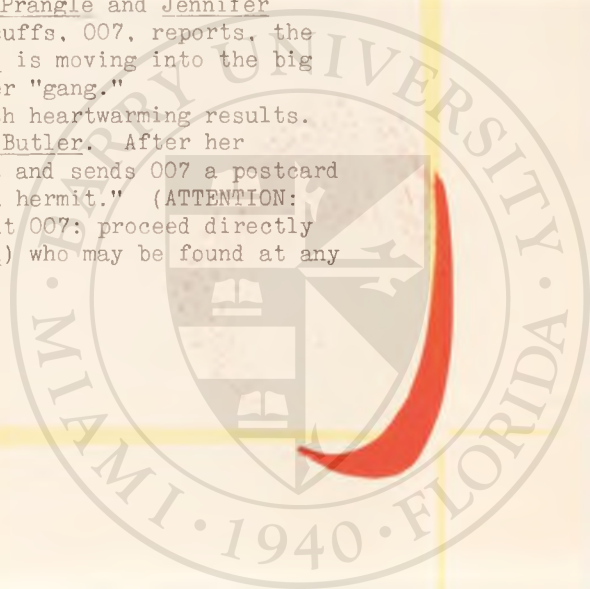


With Love

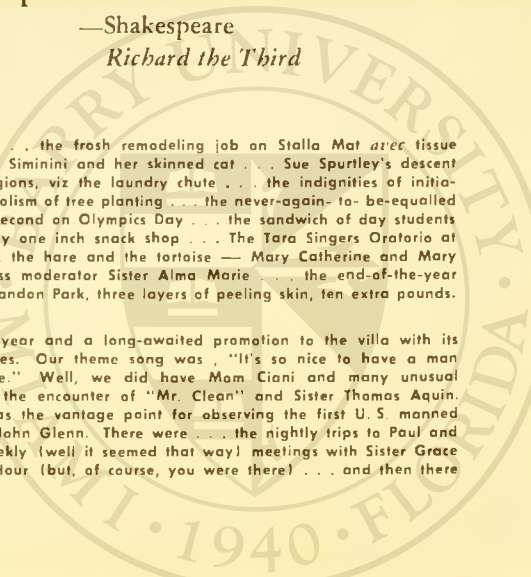

These, the events at 11 o'clock; the delights and grief of a proximate senior year. But there are other events, rosy red still, which began to mischief themselves four fresh years ago. We recall them sunily below in order that we may see our shadows as we pass

Sue Spurtley's descent into the inner regions, viz the laundry chute . . . the indignities of initiation . . . the symbolism of tree planting . . . the never-again-to-be-equalled glory of placing second on Olympics Day . . . the sandwich of day students in the one inch by one inch snack shop . . . The Tara Singers Oratorio at Punta Gorda . . . the hare and the tortoise — Mary Catherine and Mary Barbara . . . class moderator Sister Alma Marie . . . the end-of-the-year beach party at Crandon Park, three layers of peeling skin, ten extra pounds.

Sophomore year and a long-awaited promotion to the villa with its removable jalousies. Our theme song was, "It's so nice to have a man around the house." Well, we did have Mam Ciani and many unusual visitors. Witness the encounter of "Mr. Clean" and Sister Thomas Aquin. The sun porch was the vantage point for observing the first U. S. manned orbital flight by John Glenn. There were . . . the nightly trips to Paul and Fifi's . . . the weekly (well it seemed that way) meetings with Sister Grace Ellen after Holy Hour (but, of course, you were there!) . . . and then there





was the beginning of our greatest tradition: right! fourth place on Olympics Day . . . the victory (ahem) celebration at 10 p.m. in the pool . . . the atmosphere of hula and fire dancing at our dinner at the South Pacific and Father John Egan and Martha Suguitan's unique "Bali Hai" duet . . . class moderator Sister Joseph Margaret. The year ended with the beaver sounds of builders putting together something special (for US?), and with the peaceful news that Rita Hall was changing her name to Sister Mary Alice — of the Franciscan Order, that is.

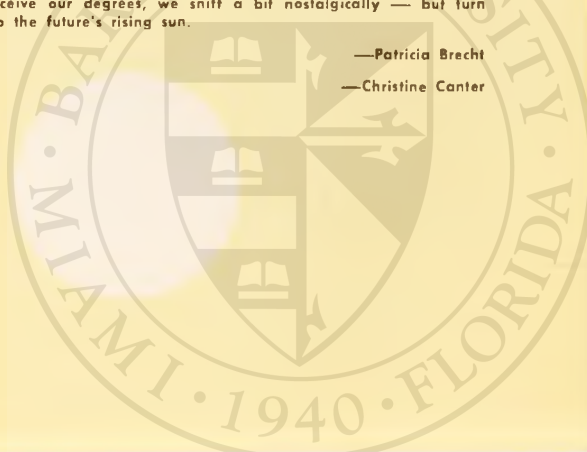
Junior year meant change and innovation: The residents checked into Regina Roc, thanks to Sister Mary Alice (O.P.) and those beavers. Sister Elizabeth Ann became class moderator. A genial "y'all" prompted salutes as Sister Mary Arnold hoisted her Confederate flag in the Academic Dean's office. Founder's Day, perhaps the biggest in the college's history, opened the doors of the new student union Thompson Hall, named in honor of founder John Graves Thompson . . . Students toured the new center with eyes popping and guests were seriously contemplating a return to college. DSO adopted a new constitution. The theology department welcomed Father Joseph Jurasko and welcomed back Father John Manroe as chaplain. The bell in the dorm seemed very quiet . . . (Claudia?) . . . Class rings finally arrived to be blessed. Once again for Olympics Day we steeled ourselves and bravely battled to obtain victory — fourth place. The year closed with our gift to the seniors — "An Evening in Lavender" prom at the Saxony Hotel.

September, 1964 . . . We returned to campus to meet a new president, Sister Mary Dorothy. The Student Council began work with the advantages of a vice-chairman, secretary-treasurer, and a Student-Faculty Relations Committee. Then — one Friday in November — all Barry wept silently in chapel for the slain president . . .

The resident student body gave a rather dubious ovation to the Seniors' sunrise Christmas caroling. At least class moderator, Sister Kenneth, wasn't disturbed; the peaceful quiet of the senior dorm always provided her with many hours of restful sleep — amid the snap of snapping popcorn, of course. At Olympics Day, we breathed a sigh of relief. A tradition had been sealed . . . What place? . . . Need we say? Five seniors — not biology majors — were seen chasing bugs one Sunday at the Beauville Hotel, "yeah, yeah, yeah." At the maraca-rhythm-filled Golden Gate, juniors bade seniors a very tropical Jamaican farewell (but how did the JRS. also manage to time the rhythm of that liquid starlight outside?) And with spring came the unveiling of the much-talked-about Barry bone . . .

Now the long, arduous hours of practicing for graduation exercises — Baccalaureate Sunday, Rose and Candle, and finally, Graduation itself — have been shaped into ready-to-go, polished performances. As we prepare to receive our degrees, we sniff a bit nostalgically — but turn nevertheless to the future's rising sun.

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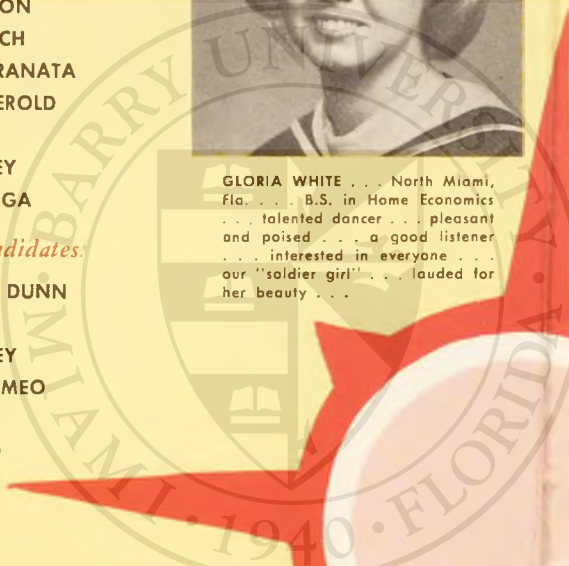
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"On the Clear Green Path..." Two Farewells
