Have you ever wondered who those psychological theorists were before they began their forays into psychology? What were these people's experiences, and how important were they to their later theories?

This summer, Barry College's own Dr. John Sause will be in San Jose delving into just these matters. Dr. Sause will be attending classes at San Jose State College under the tutelage of Martin Friedman, Ph.D. Friedman, an author, is considered to be the American authority on Martin Buber, the existentialist, philosopher and theologian. Friedman is further distinguished by his work in religious psychology.

Dr. Friedman will be dealing with the religious experiences, views and conclusions of prominent psychological thinkers. Among them are: Sigmund Freud, Carl Gustav Jung, and Otto Rank. After this seminar in California, Dr. Sause will return to Miami to present a summer course in the religious background of major psychological theorists and how it related to their theories.

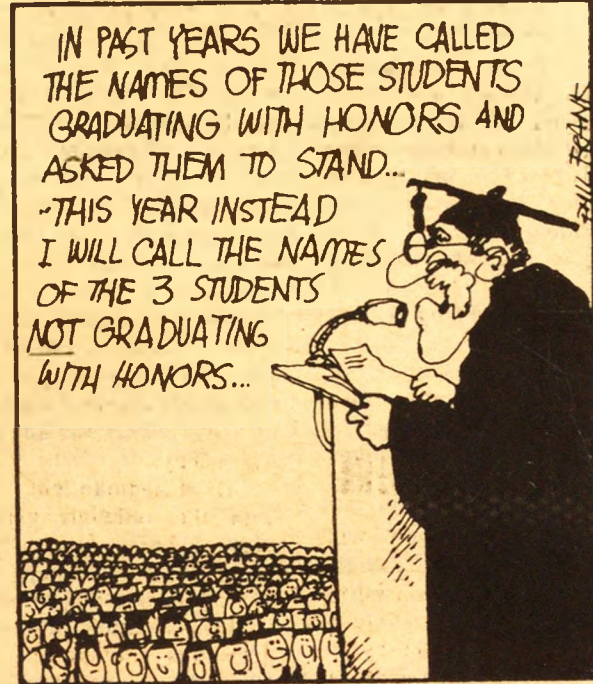
Our writers will be Hilary O'Connor, Alan Turin, and hopefully others too numerous to mention here.

Campus Council Organizing

About six to seven years ago the President's Council met every other week to discuss issues and problems of the campus. This committee became defunct because the administration believed that the committee could be handled more effectively on departmental levels.

The time has now come for this idea to be reinstated. Committees are breaking down to avoid confusion. The new committee will be called the Campus Council.

Representatives on the Council are students, faculty, staff and administration.

The Campus Council has

decided to concentrate on two major issues. These areas came to be because they are recurring issues that appear in planning studies by faculty, staff and administration. These issues are: 1) the processes of undergraduate learning experiences and 2) the nature of the Catholic College.

The first topic will be examined in several forms. Sr. Trinita stated: "There is a great need for students and faculty to talk seriously about the processes of learning, curriculum content and its basis in the reality of life."

In examination of the two topics they hope to explore what

obligations are present in the Catholic College educational system, as opposed to what is available in state institutions. The questions raised are, How broad should the commitment be? Also, what is involved in a total commitment?

The Campus Council will be exploring these issues in the coming year. Their first meeting will be in very early fall. If you are interested in these topics there are reserved readings in the library under Faculty 301. If you have any input, address it to the Office of the President.
