Tuition - \$250 per Semester

"The charge for tuition and fees is \$250 per year, or \$125 per semester ...

"Board and residence in double rooms are furnished at \$500 to \$600 per year, or \$250 to \$300 per semester, payable in advance at the time of registration."

I am sure you're thinking "it must be a misprint!" It isn't or wasn't. These were the

original fees quoted in the first Barry College catalog. Today we pay almost the equivalent - but not per semester, per credit.

Opened Doors

When Barry University opened its doors for the first time 48 years ago it was the dream of the Most Reverend Patrick Barry, D.D. after whom the school is named. A dream to build a college for Catholic women.

Founded by the Adrian Dominican Sisters, Monsignor William Barry, Bishop Pat-

rick Barry, Mother Gerald Barry and attorney John Thompson. Barry College officially commenced classes on September 19, 1940 with an enrollment status of 45 female students. It had forty full-time and five part-time undergraduates and a faculty of 14 members. Today, Barry educates, unofficially, 4713 students.

The Dream

The dream began on Ascension Thursday, May 18, 1939, when the first 40 acres for the campus were bought by the Adrian Dominican Sisters. Ground was broken on January 24, 1940.

On June 20, the Most Rev. Patrick Barry laid the cornerstones for the first five buildings: Cor Jesus Chapel, Angelicus Hall (Adrian), Rosa Mystica and Maris Stella (Kelly and Farrel dorms.) and Calaroga Hall

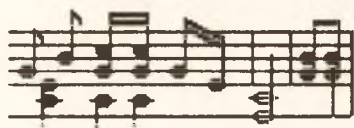



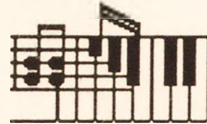

Barry opened its doors to registration on the 16, 17, and 18 of September, 1940.

On September, Rev. Patrick Barry's dream became a reality, not to him, but to the world. Due to the untimely death of Bishop Patrick Barry on August 13, the Bishop never saw the opening of the school a little more than a month later.

Genesis

In remembrance of Bishop Barry, the university normally celebrates Founder's Day on November 15.

The genesis of Barry is simple, but its achievements have been great. On November 13, 1981 Barry College became Barry University and today has grown into a well established institution. Its many displayed accolades are by no means the only signs of its success. Its success lies in the greater development of each individual that passes through the Barry annals.

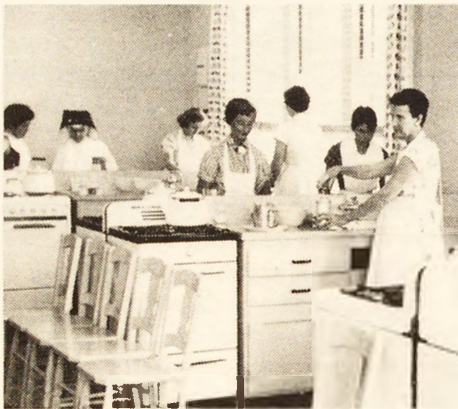
