behavior is for the common good. I trust we are caring to one another, we are supported and encouraged to assist one another, and finally I hope that our routine makes time for us to celebrate who we are.


Remember, as a member of Barry's community your benefit will be equal to how you choose to participate.


So, enjoy the semester and learn great things, but still be part of the great people around you, for you are special to this community.

Phonothon Brings in Donations

Exceeding its goal once again, this year's Alumni Phonothon raised \$109,029.

The main ingredient for this year's enormous success was the participation from the student body. The students, in addition to other volunteers, helped to raise money with their hard work.

The event, which was coordinated by the alumni department, raised \$40,000 during the first few hours of the first night. This incredible amount helped to set the pace and motivate the volunteers for the successive nights. Surprisingly, the number of volunteers reached at least 120 on each of the three nights.

The volunteers came from a variety of organizations and departments on campus. Among those present were the Circle K Club, Phi Kappa Tau, andDelta Phi Epsilon. Miami Country Day School also helped by sending over some members of their Anchor Club. The Barry Cheerleaders boosted spirits by making phone calls, posting up tallies, and serving drinks. More importantly, however, their bright faces and upbeat cheers prompted the callers to continue trying to make the Phonothon the great success that it was.

Donna Crawford, who is the Director of the Alumni Department, said, "I am

particularly proud of this year's turnout. This is the most student interest we have ever had in helping us and volunteering."

Due to the commitment and pride of the Alumni for Barry University, the goal of \$100,000 not only was reached, but was surpassed by nearly \$10,000. The donors were allowed to choose to have their donations benefit the scholarship fund, the building fund, or the unrestricted fund (which leaves that option to the University's discretion). The majority of the donors gave the money to the unrestricted fund, which covers basically everything.

Barry, a non-profit university, depends on the annual Phonothon and other fund raising events to meet the needs of the budget. Without the annual Phonothon the school would have to consider raising tuition in order to survive.

Mrs. Crawford said,"I consider this year's Phonothon a success, simply because of the involvement from the community here at Barry and from the community of Miami Shores, which is our backbone. This is more than I could have dreamed of."

Barry Hosts Leaders Foreman Theatre Goes Belly-Up

On Saturday, September 22, Barry University held a Leadership Day, sponsored by Campus Ministry, for students from several different colleges who were interested in learning how they could develop into community leaders.

The theme of the event was "If you can't walk on water, what can you do? We believe you can do plenty." A total of forty students from Barry, The University of Miami, Florida International University, St. Thomas University, and Broward Community College gathered to discover together their individual gifts and talents, and to discuss how to use them for the betterment of their community.

The day focused on Christian service, as open discussions addressed the increasing role of the laity in the church. Julie B. Mickler, one of the four campus ministers at Barry said, "Lay leadership in the church should not be limited to the traditional Lector or Eucharistic Minister roles, but rather, a holistic spirituality includes service such as tutoring, visiting

orphanages, and feeding the homeless as well as worship and prayer."

The day began at 10:00 A.M. with refreshments and informal sharing. After the opening prayer, Fr. Dennis Rausch from Florida International University spoke on the topic of exploring one's gifts and building the self-esteem and the confidence necessary to use such qualities in our parishes and local communities. Students shared their individual ideas and feelings in small and large group settings. Sr. Mary Therese, another campus minister at Barry, said "We all need to pool our gifts and talents. We are all called to minister."

Later in the day, four separate workshops were offered on the topics of relationships, communication skills, student led worship and prayer, and today's leadership in the Church.

The afternoon came to a close at 4:00 P.M. with some time for quiet, personal reflection, and a prayer of commitment.

miss the professional plays put on by the Ruth Foreman Theatre Company this year. The company canceled its last show, I'm Not Rappaport, last year, and will not have any more this year.

The Ruth Foreman Theatre Company made Barry University its home from July 1989 until its closing in April 1990. The company had to shut its doors due to bankruptcy.

The Ruth Foreman Theatre had a "working relationship" with Barry University, according to Pat Minnaugh, chairperson of the fine arts department. The company rented out the theatre facilities at Barry, and used them to stage their productions. In return, Barry received discounts on tickets for both students and faculty, the company provided internships for students who were studying theatre, and part of the profits from each play went to the fine arts department for scholarships and renovations to the existing facilities.

During the months that the company by Elizabeth Vicens resided at Barry University, it put on six

plays. Scheduled performances last year included The 1940s Radio Hour, Broadway Bound, Child's Play, Milk and Honey, and I'm Not Rappaport. The company adjusted their schedule in order to avoid interfering with Barry theatre department productions, such as Twelve Angry Men, last spring's Pelican Theatre performance.

In the summer of 1990, renovations were made to the Shepard and Ruth K. Broad Center for the Performing Arts, and the Pelican Theatre was built. Some new classrooms and faculty offices were built as well. Ironically, these renovations were made to accommodate both the theatre department and the Ruth Foreman Theatre Company.

The Ruth Foreman Theatre is no longer in existence, but the Barry department University theatre will continue to produce plays. Two plays have been produced thus far this year, Orphans and Seven Keys to Baldpate.

Barry Library Receives Knight Grant

\$250,000 award from the Knight Foundation in order to extend the Monsignor William Barry Memorial Library's electronic services.

The grant, which the university must match, will be used to obtain new computer terminals and an electronic link-up service allowing students and faculty alike to retrieve library information on a twentyfour hour basis.

"This will be very useful for our campus," said Hugh Ripley, University Librarian, and Dean.

The \$500,000 project, estimated to be completed by the spring of 1993, consists of installing 20 terminals in the

Barry University has received a library building and another 20 to 30 in dormitory lounges, faculty offices, and other common areas of the campus.

> The terminals will be linked to the libraries of nine different institutions, and to public libraries in the area. Barry's outreach campuses in Indiantown, Fort Myers, and Homestead will also be connected to the system. "This will give us access to 21,000 periodicals and over 9 million items," said Ripley.

> Although the library already has access to this material through its membership in the South Eastern Florida Library Information Network, the new project will help users to locate the information easier and faster.

The project is expected to begin by January, 1991. Not all elements of the project have been formulated. "We have interviewed three companies that provide the service needed here; however, the decision of which to hire has not been made at this time," said Ripley.

Barry University's grant proposal, submitted along with 24 others from various competing colleges and universities, was revised and recommended to the members of the foundation by their selection committee. "The members felt that it was a strong proposal," said the vice president and secretary of the Knight Foundation, Jim Spaniolo.

"We decided to award Barry because we thought that this grant would strengthen the institution and that it would provide services to its community," said Spaniolo.

"The fact that the library is the biggest building on campus and that [the library's] budget has been increased by 20% annually impresses these various foundations," said Ripley, "They see our commitment to the library. They see that it [the library] grows."

The Knight Foundation, the philanthropic division of Knight-Ridder Inc., gives grants primarily to educational institutions in the cities where Knight-Ridder newspapers operate.

Students Cautioned About Eating Disorders

The week of October 21-25 was "Eating Disorders Awareness Week" at Barry. A lecture was held at Thompson Hall that pointed out the potential seriousness of eating disorders to all students. This is an alarming issue, and anyone who sees himself or herself reflected in the descriptions of these disorders given below should seek help immediately.

Eating disorders affect people around the world, especially young women. The most common eating disorders are anorexia and bulimia. Many people are currently trying to find effective measures to treat people with these eating disorders.

Anorexia causes the individual to continuously feel fat, even when he or she is thin and (in fact) losing weight. The individual with this eating disorder practically starves in a desperate attempt to lose weight and become "slim."

Bulimia, or binge-purging, causes a person to starve for long periods of time and then overeat. After binging the person induces vomiting. A bulimic person, after the long starvation periods, will eat almost anything and will then either induce vomiting, or take an excessive amount of a laxative to undo the binge. A bulimic person, like an anorexic person, constantly

There are many causes of eating disorders. Most causes, however, share the property of an individual's low selfesteem. The person perceives himself or herself as fat and forces excessive weight loss. Curiously, persons with these eating disorders often were not fat to begin with.

While the two previous disorders consist of a dangerous and extreme attempt at weight loss, another eating disorder exists at the opposite end of the scale-obesity. An obese person has no

control over his or her food intake. Stress usually accentuates the condition, causing some people to overeat.

The common thread of low self-esteem is also present here. People who are overweight (and have been bothered by it all their lives), sometimes give-up trying to lose weight. These people continue eating abnormal amounts of food until they can no longer control how much

Eating disorders are problems that do not often surface. Like alcoholics, persons with these conditions are often reluctant to admit that they have a problem. If you suspect that a friend has a condition similar to one of those mentioned above. be a friend and talk to, encourage, and support him or her. This simple action could be the first step on the road to

Barry to Entomb Time Capsule

As the year of its 50th anniversary draws to a close, Barry University is preparing for its journey into the next century by entonibing a time capsule on the university campus.

The entombment will take place during Founder's Week, on the afternoon of November 14 in the university's new Health & Sports Complex located west of North Miami Avenue.

The time capsule's purpose is to preserve articles that represent accomplishments of Barry's over its first 50 years. Included are memorabilia that document Barry's growth from a student population of 40, in 1940-41, to its present population of over 6,000.


In addition to telling the story of Barry's growth, the items being placed in the capsule portray the university's involvement in community development and commitment to serving the needs of the underpriviledged. For instance, Chris Evert donated a pair of shoes to Barry's "Shoes for the Homeless" project several years ago, which will be included in the capsule. According to

Donna Crawford, coordinator of the Time Capsule project, "Barry was very successful in its efforts to collect shoes for the homeless, and the shoes of the famous

tennis player will be included as a symbol of our achievements."

The time capsule is scheduled to be opened during Founders' Week in the year 2040. A letter enclosed in the capsule addresses the future Barry population, asking the important question, "where are your homeless now?" We can only hope that the answer will reflect the

Today, 14 November 2040, a time capsule buried fifty years ago at Barry was opened and its contents removed by Geraldo Rivera III as 35,000 students watched by teleview. The exact contents of the capsule were previously unknown due to the destruction of records by a computer virus that struck before vaccines were developed.

broadcasting came forth with a device which he referred to as a "vieseear." Although the image produced was of poor quality, most viewers could make out a woman, identified as Sr. Jeanne O'Laughlin (the Barry president credited with encouraging campus expansion) with a gilded shovel dedicating the site of a future building, located where Barry's west

gym now sits. Remarkably, she was shoveling the dirt herself instead of allowing a robot to do the work.

Among the items found was an unusual set of footwear, known in those days as "sneakers." Written on these peculiar shoes were two words which turned out to be the name of a famous tennis player of that time period: Chris Evert. She donated these shoes to publicize the plight of the homeless.

Barry was involved in activities to help the homeless during that era, as evidenced by a letter enclosed in the capsule asking, "Where are your homeless now?"

We can only guess at what this ancient phenomena might

be. The question most of us areasking right now is "What are the homeless?"

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Opening Date for Gym Remains in Question

An official day for the ceremonial opening of Barry's new health and sports center has not been determined as of yet. According to the superintendent of the project, Bruce Randell, "It should be ready around the first week of November, if everything goes according to plan." That would be good news for the women's basketball team's home opener against Flagler College.

The construction of the new 60,000 square foot complex has been a fast process, but with late additions (primarily consisting of outdoor facilities),

it has seemed like an eternity for complaining, however, after viewing the some university students. "This is my junior year, and all I ever heard each year was how we were getting a gym," said Ann Martin, who is pursuing a degree in broadcast communications

The actual construction of the building has not taken that long, however. According to Randell, "The permit for the outdoor facilities wasn't approved until June 25 of this year, and that has pushed us back several months."

results. According to Barry's new Sports Information Director, Mike Bunting, "It's a major step-up in class, and it's going to help the image of Barry University. The university has grown so much under Sister Jeanne's leadership, and this is just another example of that growth." Bunting went on to say, "It's going to up-grade all of our athletic programs—even the teams that don't play indoors."

The Health and Sports Center's main attraction is its gymnasium. The first thing that draws attention is its hardwood

floor. The National Basketball Association (N. B. A.)-approved Robins floor system is described by Randell as "The Cadillac" of basketball courts. Next are the N.B.A.style basketball hoops that are unique in university gymnasiums. Normally, universities have ceiling mounted hoops.

Other indoor facilities include a 2500 square foot weight room, an 1800 square foot physical therapy room, 16 offices, 8 locker rooms, and numerous other utility rooms and classrooms.

At Barry University, as at any American college campus, there exists the possibility of rape. There are many things that students should know about protecting themselves from rape.

The Barry campus is fortunate to have one of the best security systems around. The widely used corporation known as Wackenhut secures the campus twenty four hours a day, seven days a week. There are four guards working around the clock to protect the students and the campus.

Every one of Wackenhut's employees goes through a one hundred hour course and a twenty hour course when arriving at Barry. These two courses must be taken in order to become a security guard. Along with the two courses, Wackenhut does an extensive background check on the

individual applicants.

To notify security, just call 3333. After six o'clock p.m., dial *3. In addition to this, you must clarify who you are, where you are, and what the problem is. Security is more than happy to work with the students at any time, for any reason.

Despite Barry's security force, one should not take unnecessary risks. Every human being is a potential victim of rape.

It is believed that the most vulnerable target of rape is a woman. However, rape can, and does, occur to men and children as well. According to the State Attorney General's Office, "Studies do not indicate any age preference by rapist's, nor do they support the myth that sexual assault is provoked by either a woman's mode of dress or her mannerisms.



request for Ahmad to make, but I thought little of it at

the time. Of course it was a Friday, the Moslem holy day, and most of the stores in downtown Dammam would be closedjust like a Sunday back home in the states, but I was bored and not about to question the sudden appearance of something to do on my social calendar.

As we walked around some of the back streets of Dammam, I had the impression that something was about to happen. The day was typical for the time of year in the eastern province of Saudi Arabia: the sun was bright and the air was hot and dry. The streets were a mix of the modern and the ancient. Pavement and automobiles of today mixed with the dust and smells of the centuries to create a labyrinth that quickly destroyed my sense of direction. I had to trust in my guide completely, as I was lost both geographically and culturally.

We came upon the town square rather suddenly, and I was shocked to find a huge, noisy crowd gathered there. Several thousand men were crowded together there, throbbing with expectation of something I could not have imagined in my wildest dreams. A slightly elevated platform rose near the center of the crowd and was the focus of the masses. I asked my guide what was going on, only to have him answer, "You will see."

A door opened at the end of the square and a man in chains emerged with a fierce-looking police escort. All eyes focused on him as the crowd was still. Silence. Then I noticed that the platform held a large block of wood, and that a man, dressed in the black robes of an executioner, was approaching it with a large, curved sword in hand.

When the officers and the prisoner reached the platform, an officer read aloud from a book; evidently he was reading the charges. According to Ahmad's translation, the prisoner was a Filipino who had entered a house, raped a man's wife, and later killed the husband. For these crimes, sharia (Muslim) law prescribes death by mutilation (otherwise known as a beheading). Based on the crowd's reaction to the charges and the punishment, they were clearly in support of the law.

After what seemed like an eternity of ceremony, they tied the prisoner down with his neck exposed and fixed on the wooden block. The noise level of the crowd began to swell, but the prisoner was surprisingly quiet. He seemed to have resigned himself to his fate and to be prepared for his punishment. I watched the scene with a strange mix of fascination and terror. This was the twentieth century! Did they really stll do this? It could not have been real, but there it was, a man being prepared for a public execution!

crowd went silent again with a quiet that seemed to pulsate with anger and fear. The executioner raised his weapon. As every eye in the square followed its path, he let it fall. Three blows of the sword were used to punish the murderer. Three blows were used to take a man's life.

I never forgot the words I heard Ahmad say as I watched the scene with unbelieving eyes: "It is the will of Allah, and as it should be."

When informally polling Barry students on the role that America has been playing in the middle east over the past two months, I found that a disturbing majority of the students want the American forces to engage Saddam Hussein's troops and "get it over with." Americans have re-developed a sense of confidence in our military superiority, thought to have been lost after the Vietnam conflict, and this fuels the fire of popular opinion. This is a frightening proposition. But as the situation wears on, and American troops sweat it out in the desert of Saudi Arabia, the site of the holiest shrines of the Moslem religion, it is becoming a popular point of

What these true believers do not realize, however, is the very real threat that the 'middle-eastern madman' poses to our troops, and that our enemy is not merely the Iraqi footsoldier, but the ideology that drives him to battle.

Iraqi ideology is based on traditional desert values that are rooted in violence. Sharia law is merely an example of the violent potential of the Arab people. In this legal system, the punishment usually fits the crime, and it is not unusual to find public floggings, stonings and mutilations (removal of the hands, feet, or head). Based on the Koran-the will of Allah-the laws have been a part of the basis of Arab society and have been enforced for centuries. However, the violence of the Arabs is not limited to capital punishment, as can be seen in their approach to war.

In the centuries immediately following Mohammed, the Arabs created an empire that stretched from Spain to the middle east. This empire was created by a series of holy wars, or jihad s, that gave the conquered people a simple choice: convert to Mohammedism, or die. For the Mohammedan soldier, a jihad was an opportunity to go directly to the paradise promised in the Koran; for any man killed while fighting for God's will would be granted entrance into the kingdom of

The 1980s have given us several imples of the modern jihad. In Afghanistan, a rag-tag group of rebels drove the giant Soviet machine back to Moscow. During the Iran-Iraq war, millions were sacrificed on the battlefield for no significant gain of any kind. The leaders of both sides of this conflict, Saddam Hussein and Ayatollah Khomeini,

declared the war a jihad and inspired the masses to make the ultimate sacrificethat of their lives. Stories of atrocities came back to the west of the use of chemical weapons and of children marched into minefields to clear the path for the troops that would follow.

Saddam Hussein has already called the potential war with the United States a holy war-calling on his people to defend the most venerated shrine of their religion, Mecca. For the Arabs, there could be no greater call to battle than to defend their faith. Couple this with the riches of the oil fields of the eastern province of Saudi Arabia and those already taken from Kuwait. They clearly give the war a practical purpose: Iraq's oil wealth would soar with the control of these territories.

Militarily speaking, it is true that we have a strong technological advantage over the Iraqi army. But in the desert, where the battles would be won or lost, our soldiers will have to face a horde of people who have but one thing on their minds: jihad. This is a land where one man's interpretation of the "will of God" rules, and where violence can be the basis for spiritual salvation. Are we prepared to fight an enemy who has nothing to lose in battle and everything to gain in death? In Vietnam, our soldiers had to face an enemy who used children and babies as weapons, and we are, in many ways, still recovering from the shock of that experience. Are we prepared to create and witness the slaughter of millions of men, women, and children? As we have seen in the past decade, this is not an unreasonable scenario to expect. A

war with Iraq would be potentially devastating not only to the American soldier-who would have to face an enemy who knows no fear-but to the American psyche as well.

But what can we do? Is there a way out of the stalemate? Perhaps the Chinese can give us an answer. Sun Tzu, the first known military philosopher, said: "When an enemy is surrounded, leave him an escape route. If surrounded, he will fight like a captured tiger. If there is an escape route, he will quietly withdraw to live another day."

My suggestion to the aggressive majority is that we have patience, and allow for Saddam Hussein to quietly withdraw. After the embargo has taken its full effect on the economy of Iraq, he will be forced to withdraw as he will not have the funding for a war. We need to exercise patience in the coming months as we try to persuade Saddam Hussein, and the population of Iraq, that withdrawal from Kuwait would be "the will of Allah, and as it should be."

We are now in the silence that precedes the falling sword. Both Iraq and the United States would like for the world to believe that they are the executioner, the minister of world justice. Let us act with prudence, and avoid the falling of the sword. Allow for our enemy to live again. Three blows of the sword were used to take the life of one man. If we are the executioner, how many blows will we have to strike in order to administer justice, and are we prepared to try?



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Avalon: An Excursion into Nostalgia

Movie successes of Good Morning, Vietnam and Rain Man, director-

screenwriter Barry Levinson explores his and other immigrant families' pasts in Avalon. Along with his own memories of his family's past, Levinson interweaves stories of other immigrant families into the film. His parents were on the set during most of the filming and served as experts on the time period concerned. Levinson's father, Irv Levinson, commented that after he saw the 1950s televisions and appliances, he felt like he had gone back in time.

Avalon's story of immigrants settling in Baltimore is shown in a lighthearted manner. The story begins in the present. Sam Krichinsky (played by Armin Mueller-Stahl) gathers his children together and tells them the story of his arrival in Baltimore during the Fourth of July celebrations in 1914 while his wife, Eva Krichinsky (Joan Plowright), disputes certain details of the story. The children sit around the television for hours, drinking soda pop, and watching the unchanging test pattern. Particularly entertaining is Sam and Eva's argument over the weather when they went to pick up his father (who came to join his family in America). Thanksgiving, which serves as a family reunion and feast day, is a holiday that none of the Krichinskys understand, but which nonetheless becomes a tradition

This movie charts the forces that altered the Krichinskys' life from the 1910s

into the 1960s. During this fifty-year period, the family changes from a large extended one to several small immediate families.

The Krichinskys were financially successful in America. Sam Krichinsky's son, Jules Kaye (Aidan Quinn), and his

nephew, Izzy Kirk (Leo Fuchs), set up a store that sold appliances and televisions. In time, the store became very popular and they, in turn, became rich. An American myth is realized.

Avalon's five decades of history re-created were through the use of old Baltimore, specially constructed sets, extraitems such as food and Fourthof-July lights, and personal treasures that Baltimore's people were willing to lend.

Armin Mueller-Stahl, who plays Sam Krichinsky in Avalon, himself an immigrant from East Germany. In 1980,

he migrated to West Germany because he had signed the Biermann Resolution, a manifesto critical of the East German government. Because of this, he was banned from acting in that country. Since then, he has appeared in the motion pictures Lola, Colonel Redl, Angry Harvest, and the drama Music Box.

Joan Plowright, who plays Sam's wife Eva Krichinsky, is one of Great Britain's foremost actresses. She has appeared on

A Lunchtime Alternative

With this issue, The Barry Buccaneer is happy to inaugurate a regular restaurant review column. As the reviewer, I will be writing about several restaurants in the

North Miami and Miami Shores area. Most of these will be places for lunch. Several aspects of each restaurant will be discussed and graded based on the Buccaneer's review policy (to the right).

I went to the Gourmet Diner, a small restaurant located on the corner of Biscayne Boulevard and Northeast 139 Avenue. The first thing I noticed was the location. There was nothing notable next to it, and anyone could pass it by without noticing (like I did). It is approximately ten minutes from Barry. Parking is fair at the restaurant. I went at about 1:30 p.m. and it was fairly busy. When I first walked in, it seemed like a quiet place, and one might have thought that it was located somewhere on a dock or a beach, not Biscayne Boulevard. Seating was not a problem and the service was very good.

The menu had a very wide variety of selections. I ordered a very basic lunch: a bacon-cheeseburger, fries, and a Coke. I was amazed by the promptness of the service, for within ten minutes I had received my order.

The food was very good-it definitely beats going to Wendy's. For an extra three dollars, you get seated, get waited on, and eat a much better meal. The one thing I could not believe was the price of a large soda (\$1.60). Otherwise, the Gourmet Diner has fair prices.

Overall, the Gourmet Diner is a reasonable place to have lunch. It is near Barry, the service is good, the food is very good, and the price is moderate. I recommend it as a break from the routine of fast food places.

The two most important criteria which the N.C.A.A. considers when making its decision are the team record and the schedule's strength. Barry has a slight edge over its competition in each of these categories.


After taking all of these things into consideration, Coach Covone simply stated, "I'm confident. I'm really looking forward to the phone call on Monday."






