



For the past 15 years, Sister Jeanne O'Laughlin, OP, has been beautifying and expanding the Barry University campus. Thanks to her, we now have more classrooms, more buildings, and the faculty has more offices. The interest now is shifting to physical beauty of the campus for the students, employees, and visitors.

The Grounds Beautification Planning Committee, along with Sr. Jeanne, is making this project happen. The committee chairs are Sister Margaret Johnson, OP, Vice President of "Planting," Research, and Evaluation and Dr. Judith Balcerski, Dean of the School of Nursing.

"On Monday, Oct. 14, Sr. Jeanne, Gene Autrey, Vice President for Institutional Advancement, and I met with Manny Diaz and his family and the deal was struck," said Sr. Margaret. "We came back and proudly announced that on Oct. 18, planting was to begin."

And so it did.

Diaz donated the trees from his farm with the deal that Barry University was to pay for transportation and planting costs. So where is Barry getting the money for this? The money is not com-

nal Barry University family members. "Sr. Jeanne has asked about 1500 people to donate \$100 each," informed Sr. Margaret. The total cost for this project is an estimated \$150,000.

As most projects of this type, there were a few minor set-backs.

"We are extremely pleased that there was little disruption with a project of this magnitude. Cable was cut off on two different days, but was repaired in time for the 8:00 p.m. movies and shows. Water service to Mottram Doss and Flood dormitories was interrupted for a two hour period," informed George Webb, "Dean" of Facilities Management.

"A chill-water break at the Library af-

fected the air conditioning in Andreas and the Library for one evening."

Can anybody guess how many new trees there will be on campus once the project is complete? If you guessed 1500, you are right on target. Sr. Margaret has spear-headed a campaign to solocit volunteers to help watering these 1500 beauties. Staff and faculty members have been given designated areas to water and even students are encouraged to participate.

"The trees have exceeded our wildest dreams for quality," said Sr. Margaret. The plan is to have Diaz's farm come



Roosevelt to win a second term as President. Bill Clinton's landslide in the Electoral College and impressive victory in the popular vote, crushing Bob Dole in most regions, has brought an end to this 1996 Presidential Campaign. Ross Perot, the Texas tycoon who ran on the ticket of the Reform Party he had created, finished a distant third, receiving about half of the 19% he drew in 1992. Unlike four years ago for Mr. Perot, his message about eliminating the deficit and overhauling the campaign finance system did not loom in 1996. Additionally, because of his low numbers in the polls prior to election day, he was excluded from two Presidential debates. With the elections now in hindsight, I'd like to shed some light on an Education Forum I attended a few weeks ago where Former-Vice President Dan Quayle spoke.

Quayle is one of the speakers I will have the opportunity to hear during the 1996-97 Forum Series sponsored by Nova Southeastern University. Invitations were sent to a mixed crowd of civic leaders in South Florida, including college/high school editors, as well as the general public, giving us an opportunity to hear and discuss current issues of politics.

While sitting at the media table, being the youngest one there, I was surrounded by owners of local magazines, privately owned and operated newspapers, and two of Quayle's campaign assistants. Somehow, I did a great job not feeling the least bit intimidated. The ambiance and company couldn't have been better. After engaging in small talk over breakfast, the tension eased a bit. Quayle's ice breaker of a joke didn't hurt either. But with all jokes aside, he knew why we were all there, expecting with baited breath, his objective, unbiased, nonpartisan, viewpoint on who the next President should be and how the congressional races are going to turn out.

I was impressed by his political jokes, but equally impressed with his speech. I know what you're thinking- he's a politician and not much more needs to be said. But, how he addressed the Q & A would put many to shame, not to mention the sincerity of his personal integrity and values.

Although Quayle has been out of office for three and a half years, he has remained politically active. The core of his speech stemmed from his deep emotions toward each party's participation. When generalizing over the Presidential campaign, he said that he is struck by the lack of energy and the lack of focus in the Presidential election by both the Republican and Democratic parties. He said there just isn't the intensity that's normally there. He said however we vote, we've got to be energized; we've got to have the intensity; we've got to be involved. It's our country. If we don't participate and things go the wrong way, who are we to complain? I related totally to this concern for political apathy. A favorite political story of his, representing this attitude, follows: a man is asked, there are two things gripping our country today: Ignorance and Apathy. What do you think is more important? And the man replies- I don't know and I don't care.



Tuesday, Oct. 22, Miami Dade Community College welcomed President Bill Clinton. President Clinton approached the podium and said Staff Reporter that America should

enter the 21st century with him and Al Gore in the White House.

Motivated by a speech given by Jerry Charles Sawyer Jr., President of the Student Government at Miami Dade Community College, Clinton was full of enthusiasm which seemed to spread throughout the crowd.

"Four years ago, Clinton ran for President because he was wary that the country wasn't ready for the 21st century," Sawyer told the crowd. With that in mind, Clinton spoke about a variety of issues with a particular focus on education. He emphasized the role the community colleges will play in helping to reshape America's educational programs.

"I believe community colleges work the way America has to work in the 21st century. It's open to all. This is the way America ought to work," he said.

After a cheer from the crowd, he spoke of his administration's personal ties to

> Clinton also spoke about his plans for welfare reform, "We moved two million people from welfare to work. I've got a plan to create a million more jobs for people on welfare."

> After the crowd settled down Clinton dismissed the notion that his administration is not tough enough on crime. Although he said this was accomplished to

seemed confident that if given another chance he would be able to put even more officers on the streets. Rounding out the crime issue, Clinton said that children should not be able to attain illegal drugs under any circumstances and that he will enforce this if given a second term.

Finally, Clinton said he would focus on home owners in his second term. According to the President, the number of home owners has dramatically increased during his first term.

"If you give us four more years, we'll have even more homeowners," he said.

The President then left his audience with a useful analogy, keeping in mind the theme of his speech- "Building America's Bridge" : "I have worked to reinforce the principals of responsibility," he said. "You will decide by how you vote; you will decide by whether you

HACU seeks intern applicants

PRESS RELEASE - The Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) is seeking applications for its sixth annual National Internship Program. HACU is recruiting college students to work as interns within various federal agencies in Washington, D.C. and locations throughout the U.S.

Building on the success of last summer's program, which placed 288 interns in internship assignments in Washington, D.C. and 24 states and Puerto Rico, HACU is expanding its partnership to include more federal government department/agencies, as well as corporate sponsors, and increasing its number and location of interns for 1997.

Currently enrolled students with a GPA of 3.0 or higher are eligible to apply. Applicants must be permanent residents or U.S. citizens.

The dates of the internships are from June 2- Aug. 8, 1997. Students will arrive in Washington on or before May 30, 1997 for an orientation program. Stipends and round-trip transportation to and from internship assignment are provided and HACU facilitates housing arrangements. The scale for stipends is: \$370 per week for sophomore/junior interns; \$410 per week for senior interns; and \$490 per week for graduate/law interns. Stipend levels are determined by class status at the time of application. Additionally, HACU organizes a stimulating series of professional development workshops and seminars as well as various social and cultural activities.

Applications for the 1997 HACU National Internship Program may be picked up at the office of Dr. Jesus Mendez in Lehman 318. Applications must be postmarked by March 1, 1997, in order to be considered. However, due to the large demand for placement, early applications are strongly encouraged. The deadline for applications for the CIA and other high security positions is Nov. 15, 1996.

against years of his own strong belief for deficit reduction. An added surprise within the Dole campaign was the selection of Jack Kemp as a running mate, an individual Mr. Dole had strained relations and quarrels with for several years. And nearing the final weeks of election day, after multiple public announcements expressing his reputation as a man of rectitude, he began attacking Mr. Clinton's character and ethical standards.

This election showed how voters are willing to set aside any concerns they had about Mr. Clinton's character and concentrate on their general perception that the country is heading in the right direction. Aside from these two factors that helped catapult the President into his second term, Mr. Clinton's popularity among women, which apparently resulted from the Republican Party's absolute stand against abortion, predominantly gave alliance to the Democratic Party. On Nov. 6, the New York Times bluntly reported that, "It was almost as

Physician's mission in Mexico

PRESS RELEASE - Four podiatrists and one podiatric resident from Miami are en route to Merida, Mexico on a mission to evaluate and correct deformities of disadvantaged crippled children in the State of Yucatan, Mexico. Twice a month, the team flies on weekends to Mexico to treat conditions such as post-Polio deformities, bone spurs, flat feet, clubfoot, and even genetic abnormality syndromes.

Headed by Dr. Charles Southerland, D.P.M., F.A.C.F.A.S., F.A.C.F.A.O.M., Professor of Podiatric Orthopedics and Biomechanics at Barry University School of Podiatric Medicine, the team began on July 4th weekend and have performed five scheduled surgeries at D'Hourin Hospital on children and juveniles (aging from 6 years to young adults). More than 150 other patients have been evaluated and treated by orthotic devices, prostheses, physical therapy, diagnostic tests, and coordination with other health care profession-

ment at 899-3283. Barry remembers Great Irish Famine

PRESS RELEASE-The worst famines in history have taken place this century. We have all seen shocking photos of starving African infants in Time and Newsweek. However, the worst of all known peacetime famines took place in Ireland from 1845-1850.

When the famine began, Ireland had a population of 8 million. The majority were tenant-farming families subsisting on a few acres and a single crop--the potato that had been brought to England and Ireland from Latin America by the English explorer Sir Francis Drake. In good times, the potato provided a healthy diet; a family could live for a year on the potatoes grown in a half-acre of rocky ground. In 1845, a blight ruined the potato crop, first in Canada, then in Ireland. There was alarm in London and Dublin. Those who had other sources of food (corn or wheat), were able to survive. Those who depended on the potato began to suffer. Tenants unable to pay their rents were evicted from their farms, their rock homes demolished. The roads were soon filled with families with no place to go.

One million died of famine and famine-related diseases; two million were forced to emigrate to Canada, America, Australia. Nobody knows how many died in the "coffin ships" (unseaworthy, sickness-ridden boats) in

which thousands made their escape. Twenty years after the famine ended, Ireland's population had been cut in half.

The Great Irish Famine will be the focus of worldwide interest next year. One hundred thousand descendents of emigrants from Ireland are expected to attend a commemoration in Dublin on June 1.

Barry University will hold a day-long event on Saturday, Feb. 22, Washington's Birthday, to examine the famine, and celebrate some of its most famous emigrants to America. The event called "An Obligation to Remember" will be on campus in conjunction with the Irish American Unity Foundation.


A tree will be planted and blessed in


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
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

It's just like the old days-Phish and The Grateful Dead






and flavor to the gentle melody which only Phish possesses. It's a true confession at heart, a plea for something greater.




With the band's folky Vermont vibe and the picking skills of the kid with the banjo in "Deliverance", guitarist Trey Anastasio comes across as a veteran of song, a rider on the storm of life. Able to summarize feelings by

picking the strings, music fans should definitely check out this release now in stores. 



the "Hate" I'm talking about is not the intense, gut-gnawing feeling you get whenever your roommate "forgets" to clean the bathroom, but rather the intense, gut-gnawing French movie that took both audiences and critics at this year's Miami Film Festival by storm: Mathieu Kassovitz' angry masterpiece "L'Haine".

"Hate"-the film's name in English- is a movie with a familiar theme: inner city kids trying to cope with life in the ghetto. But don't expect a Spike Lee re-make of Boyz'n the Hood; this urban drama takes place, not in the mean streets of New York or South Central LA, but in the outskirts of Paris and the City of Lights never looked this dark. In the film, a series of violent social outbursts have climaxed in an LA-like riot where one young slum kid is beaten to an inch of his life by the cops, and a single police-issue revolver is lost. The entire city tensely awaits to see whether or not the kid will die, and whether or not the violence will explode again.

This is where our protagonists come in. The movie chronicles the 24 hours following the riot in the lives of three young friends. Said, an Arab con-man (conboy?) who is all-mouth and no action, Hubert, a black boxer with an intense desire to leave the life of the ghetto, and Vinz, a Jewish hot-head who recites lines from Taxi Driver (you talkin' to me?). The acting is superb, but the cast is composed entirely of French actors who none of us would recognize, so I'll spare you the trouble of trying to remember their names. However, I will tell you they do the best thing any actor could possibly

do: they are not there. That is, the only people you see on screen for the entire length of the movie are three utterly real, painfully convincing young men who are immersed in the desperation of their lives, who share the passionate energy

of youth, and who choke on the acid anger of the slums. Every moment of their performances is spellbinding.

Nevertheless, the real star of the film is writer-director, Mathieu Kassovitz. He weaves together a tightly coiled script that bites like a venomous snake: the boys find the lost police revolver, and float through Paris trying to somehow direct with their aimless lives. The script is at times scary, funny, or pitiful, but always powerful: the boys clash with the upper classes at an art exhibition, hot wire a car only to realize that none of them know how to drive, get caught and tortured by brutal police officers, and beat the daylights out of a group of

Neo-Nazis. The dialogue is fast and angry, peppered with curse words and racist remarks. Ultimately the driving force throughout the narration is their need for revenge: revenge against the police that beat and kill their own people, revenge against a society that forces them to the extremes.

Kassovitz produces a masterpiece of

modern angry cinema. He shoots the film in stark black and white that exaggerates the geometric angles of the urban landscape, giving it the feel of a gritty, foreboding prison. The movie itself makes use of all kinds of creative techniques, from impossibly clever camera angles to almost impossible focus shifts to just plain impossible continu-

ous 3 or 4 minute shots. Flashbacks, day-dreams and reality all blend into one big visual spectacle. The man must have been first in his film class.

The pacing is break-neck, almost hypnotic, toggling between those long, kinetic shots and a barrage of quick edits that almost flow into one another. What Kassovitz ultimately ends up with is a loud, fast two hour-long angst-fest that would make MTV proud; and that's not even remotely a bad thing. The movie packs visceral wallop like Chiquita packed bananas in endless, ripe bunches.

I understand that at first look, this film may not seem very appealing. Black and white foreign movies in French are

hardly everyone's cup of tea. But trust me on this one: the monochromatic scheme actually improves the movie (remember Schindler's List?), and once you give the film a couple of minutes, the French and the subtitles will vanish. Forget about renting Happy Gilmore for the third time and try something a little more daring; in the end you'll have enjoyed an angry, technically perfect work of art that will leave you with the desire to give the world the finger... Geez, as if we didn't feel that way already.

Demi Moore shows some skin -and no restraint- in Striptease (Nov. 19). And some pesky aliens try to barbecue Will Smith and Bill Pullman when Independence Day (or, if you prefer, ID4) invades video stores Nov. 22.


There, that should keep you busy until those nasty finals start cutting into your leisure time. Until next time, stay safe and remember- Be Kind, Please Rewind.

Clinton Obtiene Victoria

El Presidente Bill Clinton fue re-elegido a su cargo con el 49% del voto popular y con 373 votos electorales. Clinton es el segundo presidente demócrata en ser reelecto al cargo desde Franklin D. Roosevelt en 1936. También es el segundo presidente en ganar un segundo mandato después de la Segunda Guerra Mundial; el otro fue Ronald Reagan.


Another change in the system is a new coach, Dave Nichols. Nichols brought in a completely different system and it took the ladies some time to


Coach Nichols said the turning point of the season was the loss to Central Florida.


