hen Sr. Jeanne O'Laughlin hosted the meeting between Elian Gonzalez and his grandmothers, some Barry students once again raised a familiar question. Does our tuition pay for Sr. Jeanne's Miami Beach villa?

The answer is no. At a town hall meeting with the Barry community in February, Jeanne told the story of her acquaintance with Ucola Katzentine

for the umpteenth time. The 6,957square-foot house, built in 1930, was donated to the university in 1986, with the condition that a Barry official had to live there for at least 10 years. The donor, Mrs. Katzentine, had bought it in 1941 with her husband, Frank, who was elected Miami Beach major in 1930. Together they founded WKAT radio in 1937, and after her husband's

death in 1960, Mrs. Katzentine owned and operated the station until 1979 when she sold it.

The couple had no children and in the early 1980s Sr. Jeanne received a call from Mrs. Katzentine. The widow ordered her to come over in 30 minutes if she wanted the house. Mrs. Katzentine had been friends with Monsignor William Barry in the 1960s

and she struck up a friendship with Sr. Jeanne that lasted until her death at the age of 81 in 1986.

The Mediterranean-style house needed plumbing and wiring when Sr. Jeanne moved into it from her threebedroom house across the street from the Barry campus in March 1987. Its value was estimated at \$374,000, and it

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Olympic Historian gives ostounding speech at Barry

lympic historian Bud Greenspan spent homecoming weekend with Barry University and shared his valuable Olympic experiences with a speech at Broad Audito-

Greenspan has been called the foremost writer/producer/director of sports films and one of the world's leading sports historians. He has a lengthy list of achievements and awards, including in 1997 he was awarded the George Foster Peabody Award, the broadcast and cable industry's most prestigious honor, for his lifetime work.

In 1995, he was honored with the Lifetime Achievement Award by the Directors Guild of America. He has attended every Olympic Games since 1948 and produced 100 Years of Olympic Glory, a three-hour film exploring great international stories of the Olympic games, and America's Greatest Olympians, two hours narrating stories of American Olympic athletes.

Greenspan also produced the critically acclaimed NBC movie of the week, Wilma, based on the life of Olympic champion, Wilma Rudolph. The film was one of the highest rated television films of the 1977 season.

Barry University professor Dr. Daniel Rosenberg is Greenspan's nephew and knows first-hand that the

great historian has a special gift.

"Bud represents maintaining professional integrity in commercial success, with at the same time artistic integrity," Rosenberg said.

Greenspan's films focus more on the athletes than on the sport itself as he believes that every athlete is a winner at the Olympics.

"There are no losers at the Olympics," Greenspan said. "Many of the athletes I have interviewed are very disappointed finishing in 5th or 6th place, but they have to

remember that they are the 5th or 6th place in the world."

The main reason why Greenspan produces such Olympic stories is to inform the audience something they might not know.

"I want the audience to say 'gee I didn't know that' after they watch one of my films," Greenspan said.

Greenspan's speech at the Broad Auditorium touched many hearts in the audience, as he showed his own film-clips of the greatest moments in Olympic history.

One of the clips that he showed was the inspiring story of American speedskater, Dan Jansen. Jansen overcame tremendous adversity, including the death of his sister Jane to leukemia and several tragic falls in previous Olympics, to win the Gold Medal

in his final race of his Olympic career.

Another clip that Greenspan showed was one of the most memorable scenes in the history of the Olympic Games. In the 1992 Barcelona Olympic Games, Derek Redmond, a sprinter from Great Britian, suffered a torn hamstring in the semi-final of the 400 meters race. Redmond stopped in pain at the spot where he had suffered the injury. The other seven runners finished the race but all eyes were on the injured Redmond. At this time, he started to try to finish the race. Then his father appeared on the track and helped his son make his way around the track to the finish line.

He included a 15-minute clip at the end of his speech called "Hymn to the Nations", that focused on the most memorable moments in Olympic his-

Grandmother wanted to defect herself

inally, Sr. Jeanne O'Laughlin has provided the answers everyone had waited for regarding her turnabout in the Elian Gonzalez story.

Going into the meeting between Elian and his grandmothers, which the Immigration and Naturalization Service asked her to host, Sr. Jeanne's opinion was clear. The child should be with his father.


A day after the meeting a distraught Sr. Jeanne told the press that she had changed her mind and boarded a plane to Washington to convince Congress that Elian should stay in the US.

At a town hall meeting at Barry University with faculty and students in early February, Sr. Jeanne told those gathered that she had gone out of her way to provide a caring atmosphere for the families to meet. During the meeting she had come to realize that the circumstances surrounding Elian were far more complex than most people could comprehend. Elian Gonzalez had become a hot political issue with the opposite sites and the media paying little attention to a six-

year old's well being. In February Sr. Jeanne continued to lobby Congress for a bill by Senator Connie Mack(R) which would allow Elian to stay.

In an interview with the Miami Herald on Feb. 20, Sr. Jeanne at long last came forth and said what she had witnessed that fateful night. According to the grandmothers, Elian's family had contacted their Miami uncle, Lazaro, 10 days before making the journey toward the U.S. One of the grandmothers had also raised the topic of defecting herself and they talked about Elian's father having abused the mother who would not make the trip alive.

All these factors made Sr. Jeanne seriously question what would be in the child's best interest. At the town hall meeting Sr. Jeanne stated her wish that Elian's case would be heard in a family court. Legal wrangles will most definitely prevent that, as the little boy never touched the earth before being handed over to officials on Thanksgiving Day, a requirement for Cubans who want to become naturalized US. citizens.

75 minutes, 142 pounds lost

fter only seventy-five minutes on an operating table, I traded in my size 28 jeans for a curvy size 12.

Nine months ago I made the decision to fly to Tel Aviv, Israel to undergo weight loss surgery. The process is called Laparoscopic Gastro-plasty. The Lap-Band Adjustable Gastric Banding System is a minimally invasive surgery that involves applying a prosthesis (the Lap-Band) around the stomach—creating a small gastric pouch—and a calibrated opening to the rest of the stomach.

In layman's terms—I have a silicone rubber band around my stomach, causing me to reach a feeling of fullness after about a cup of food. By creating a smaller gastric pouch, the Lap-Band system limits the flow of food from this smaller pouch to the rest of the digestive tract. I feel comfortably full with a small amount of food. And because of the slow emptying, I will continue to feel full for several hours reducing the urge to eat between meals.

I arrived at my surgeon's office weighing 320 lbs. Within two weeks, I dropped 22 pounds and progressively lost about 2-7 pounds per week thereafter. My diet changed dramatically and took on a role similar to that of an infant's eating stages. I was instructed to start off with clear liquids, move on to pureed vegetables, soft foods and finally graduated to regular food.

Those who are close to me have come to the realization that the sacrifice is too great for them, but understand how beneficial it has been to my health. Most people fear a foreign object in their bodies and are too aloof to maintain a rigid diet of restrictive foods. When I use the word restrictive, I am referring to forbidding the use of fresh breads, pasta, rice, carbonated beverages and anything that expands when emerged in water.

I maintain an exercise routine and follow it 5-6 days a week to prevent my skin from flapping in the wind. My energy level has increased immensely and my confidence, for those who know me, has not changed one bit.

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Fundamental identity comes from knowledge of heritage

Interview with Ekwueme Michael Thelwell

n celebration of Black History Month, Barry students and faculty were treated to a visit from Professor Ekwueme Michael Thelwell, the Jamaican author of "The Harder They Come."

It was an effort by a combination of groups within Barry, which calls itself the PEACE (People for the Ethical Advancement of Culture and Education) which brought Professor Thelwell to the university.

Barry University's School of Arts and Sciences offers a minor in Africana Studies, exposing students to current scholarship in African American, Caribbean, and African affairs and cultures.

Thelwell, a renowned civil rights activist, writer and editor, is the founding Chair of African American Studies at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst and a member of the Howard University chapter of Student's Non-Violent Coordinating Committee. He is currently working on the autobiography of noted activist Stokely Carmichael/Kwame Ture.

Q: How important is it for people to know their own heritage?

It is particularly important in the time we live in. Never before has been this kind of demographic movement of human populations. A lot of people do not live or even die in the place they were born, they keep moving around. If you have this kind of movement and dislocation of modern life, it becomes doubly important that people have a sense of their origins, of the

history of their ancestors, their values and experiences to give them fundamental identity.

Q: What can young African-Americans learn from African culture that they might not expect to find?

There is so much they can learn. A full answer to this question would not be of any use, it would be enough for a book. Any sophisticated and accurate view of traditional African cultures will help young African-Americans and people from the Caribbean understand their own cultural situation.

It enables them to see where the forms and cultural practices around them originated from. When I grew up in Jamaica there was a whole range of fascinating things which I looked at and all the reference I had for that was "that's what people do." When I started to study African history and culture I understood where it came from and what it meant, as I never had been able to before. I do not see any reason why that should not be true for young African-Americans today.

Q: The Western media does not portray Africa favorably, does it?

Africa has some extraordinarily distressing problems, which are clearly a function of the historical inheritance. I think Africa is going through the worst time in its history. That is not all that is happening in Africa, but if you look only at Western media you would think it was one unbroken tapestry of disaster, of suffering, of peril and jeopardy. There are all kinds of interesting things happening in Africa which looking at the media you would never know of. And I think there is almost a vested

interest in Western culture, European culture with a history of colonization to present Africa in the most negative way as a moral justification of their own supremacy.

Q: Is there a notable difference between island culture and continental culture?

I do not think there is much difference although some scholars have brought up the issue. I think that because of smaller land mass people from islands travel and want to get away more than continental people do. But as far as people being closer to each other and more culturally aware, I do not think it has to do with being an island. Kazakhstan is in the middle of a huge landmass, surrounded by mountains but its people display these "island characteristics" of interdependency. It also transcends to Africa and it is not an island. So traveling would be the only thing I see different. I think it has to do with traditional cultures as

opposed to post-modern cultures, and more to do with being a small nation than actually being from an island.

Q: How valuable is the multicultural environment Barry students live in for their future?

There is nothing that supersedes its real value. What matters in multicultural context though is that it is consequential and not superficial. You can bring groups of people from various and different cultures together but not have multiculturalism. What you have is a group of different people from different cultures. Multiculturalism has more substance to it than that. It begins with a conscious recognition of the potential contributions and values of different cultures' approaches to human existence. And not just celebrating that but bringing them into contact with each other. That is what I think they are trying to do here at Barry University. Where that is present multiculturalism is very valuable.

Nearby 12th century monastery transports visitors to Spain for a day

he cool dampness and must of centuries-old stone greets you as soon as you enter the cloisters of the ancient Spanish monastery. The cloisters, beautiful covered walkways with high vaulted ceilings, are empty now except for the occasional curious visitors. But it is where Spanish monks tread throughout their daily lives hundreds of years ago.

The Monastery of St. Bernard de Clairvaux was built in Sacramenia, in the province of Segovia, Spain during the period of 1133-1141. Cisterian monks occupied the monastery for nearly 700 years until the cloisters were seized, sold and converted into a granary and stable during a social revolution in the mid 1830s.

In 1925, media mogul William Randolph Hearst bought the cloisters and the monastery's outbuildings, dismantled the stones and shipped them to the United States. Soon after the shipment, however, Hearst's financial problems forced most of his property to be sold at auction. The stones remained in a New York City warehouse for 26 years until 1952, when they were purchased for a tourist attraction. It took 19 months and \$1.5 million to put the monastery back together like a giant jigsaw puzzle. But they now stand as they once existed during a distant

time in a far away land.

The small chapel toward the back of the monastery, now an active Episcopalian church, was the dining hall, where the monks ate their meals. Inside, the two stained glass windows above the altar are two of the only three known telescopic windows in existence today. At either side of the altar are two paintings, one dated around 1540, the other around 1470. An 800 year-old baptismal font is still used today for

the parish's baptisms. Pay attention to the details or you will miss the beauty of this place.

Outside, you can explore the gardens and statues while enjoying the sunshine. To the far left of the gardens lies the abbot's chair made of stone. There are benches throughout the gardens where you can sit for a while to take in the serenity of the ancient monastery

no wedding or other special events. The monastery is popular for weddings and photographers because of its remarkable beauty. But going for a visit while the grounds are mobbed with frantic caterers spoils the

monastery's allure. Call in advance to find out if there are any events going on or better yet, go on a weekday. It is the best time for an undisturbed, peaceful visit.



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
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

PS: Beastie Boy won the race. Go figure!


Festival of Nations

ts Florida. Sunny weather, beaches, jet skis, tropical fish—and now, dolphin encounters. How often do we as a species encounter such a passive, loving & gentle marine mammal long enough to capture a Kodak moment? In Grassy Key, Florida it happens twice a day.

Structured dolphin swims are open to the public (by appointment) at the world famous, highly visited Dolphin Research center (DRC). DRC is a notfor profit education and research facility which maintains a colony averaging fifteen dolphins in a natural marine environment. On-site programs include DolphinLab, a week long program available for college credit, which allows students to learn about dolphins first-hand, Dolphin Encounter, a half day program which allows participants to learn about dolphins through playfully structured swim sessions and workshops, and Dolphlusight, a half day program which gives participants an intimate look into the world of the dolphin and how we affect that world.

I was Blessed with a boyfriend who adheres to subtle Birthday gift hints and had the honor of recently swimming with these fascinating dolphins. The trip averages two hours from campus and is well worth its time in visual reward. Nothing but water, sun and the occasional neighbor driver surrounds you as you drive toward the Florida Keys.

Upon arrival, suited up and ready to go we (my boyfriend and I) were given a tour of the dolphins and briefed on the dangers they encounter in the wild. Humans, believe it or

not are contributing to the damage of these mammals lives. Hand feeding the dolphins trains them to let go of their human fear and therefor approach boats in search of food putting them in great danger of deaths by boat injury, nets and motors. What is happening is that we are creating beggars out of wild marine life which in essence prohibits them from teaching their young survival skills.

Verbal and hand signals were taught outside of the water as were safety rules and regulations. We were instructed on how to respect the dolphins space and habitat and cued on what makes them uncomfortable or unsafe. At this point I stopped hearing


the laws and could only hear the voices of my new dorsal finned friends in the water.

The moment finally arrived and we were on our way to the dock to swim with the most playful creatures I have ever encountered. There is no greater smile than one from a dolphin that greets you with straight eye contact and a full set of dolphin teeth! At last, bodies are immersed in water and initial dolphin contact is made! The instructor started slow. We started by petting the dolphin and moved on to greater adventures. Eventually we were told to swim a distance from the dock, lay on our backs and wait for the dolphin to retrieve us, a seemingly incred-

ible task, and of course, he did and it

After about a half hour of dancing, swimming, imitating and laughing witlf our new friends, we were asked to stand stationary and let the dolphin do one more thing. Trust was already built and it was time to say goodbye. The dolphin swam slowly to my face buried his lips in my cheek and kissed me—a kiss so sweet that I thought I could have turned into a mermaid.

Richard soon realizes that what seems to look like paradise slowly becomes a living hell by the same people who created it. Jealousy and personal conflicts begin to rise and the once peaceful community begins to shatter. Richard is then witness to mankind's destructive nature. As in Lord of the Flies moral values are lost and the island settlers turn to more primitive behaviors. The film combines the savagery of Apocalypse Now and Joseph Conrad's "Heart of Darkness" with the romanticism of Blue Lagoon.

Teen sensation DiCaprio makes his comeback in this film after a two year hiatus. The Beach is not another action-packed, TITANIC chick flick with great special effects and an almost non-existent script. The Beach puts him back in more challenging roles as he did in such films as What's Eating Gilbert Grape, which gave him an Oscar nomination in 1993.



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Bucs enter season with top ten ranking

he Barry University softball team has the talent and experience to once again be one of the top squads in the nation. The team returns a solid nucleus from last year's team which finished 44-13, advanced to the NCAA South Regional, and finished ranked ninth in the final USA Today/NFCA Division II poll.

The team starts of the 2000 season ranked once again in the top ten in the country at #10. Head Coach Lisa Navas believes that this pre-season ranking is due to the returning starters from a year ago.

"We have all of our starters returning besides at first and third base," Navas said. "The newcomers at those positions are just as good, so there is no drop-off."

Coach Navas enters her ninth season at Barry just two wins shy of 300. She has guided the Buccaneers to back-to-back 40-win seasons and four straight appearances in the NCAA tournament.

Navas says that this achievement isn't that important.

"This accomplishment happens because of the players. It's not that big of a deal," Navas said.

The Bucs are led by a senior trio of pitcher/designated hitter Stephanie Caldwell, leftfielder Tayna Catalanotte and rightfielder Tanaye Goehring.

Caldwell is a two-time All-American and Sunshine State Conference Player of the Year and holds the school record with 224 strikeout last season. She is also valuable at the plate, where last season she hit .351 with two home runs and 36 runs batted in.

Catalonotte is a first-team All-SCC outfielder and was selected to the second team All-South region. She led

the SSC and the team with a .386 batting average, and also hit four home runs and drove in 40 batters.

Goehring, despite off-season shoulder surgery, came back to start 36 games and was one of the best defenders on the

The SSC honors don't stop with the seniors. Juniors Lindsay Anderson and Cindi Perantoni also were named to the second team and first team respectively. Anderson returns as one of the top pitchers in the conference and she posted her second straight 20-win season a year ago.

Perantoni batted .352 and drove in 29 runs, third best on the team and scored 24 runs.

Perantoni says that the preparation for this season was a little different from the previous two seasons.

"Our usual training are mile runs and sprints, but this year we also had to take kickboxing classes," Perantoni said.

Barry has another challenging schedule this season facing Division I opponents Florida Atlantic University and University of Pittsburgh.

The Bucs lost a close game to FAU last season 3-1, and looks to challenge the Division I powerhouse again this season.

"We have the confidence this year since we only lost by a few runs last season," Navas said. "The better competition you have, the better you are as a team."

Coach Navas believes that if each position is focused, the post-season shouldn't be too far off.

"If every position completes their goals, the Regional Tournament will take care of itself."


