Men's soccer team ranked No. 1 for the first time ever The Lady Bucs remain undefeated and are now 8-0

arry's soccer teams have be gun the season in style. The men's team lead by coach Steve McCrath achieved its first ever no. I ranking in the NCAA polls in September. The women's team a perennial Division II. powerhouse is ranked no. 2 and was at the time of the Buccaneer going to press undefeated in seven games.

Coach McCrath leads the Bucs soccer team for the third year. His team returns with eight starters from last year's team. These eight starters

helped last year's squad set the school's best record ever and advanced to the NCAA Final Four for the first time in the school's history.

Although key players Jon Samford, Vinicius Cavani and Michael Bolton have graduated, many talented newcomers will join the eight starters.

The defensive line is held strong by three returning players. Marco Velez, First team All-SCC Greg Vehs, second team All-SCC and senior Arturo Siso all key players in the defensive line.

Up front, Alen Marcina has led the way with ten goals in eight games,

while his last year's striking partner Andy Hylton has performed well at the center of the Buc defence. Marcina leads the Sunshine Conference in goals scored while goalkeeper Ron Gogouen leads the SSC in goalsagainst average with a 0.61 mark and four solo shutouts.

In September, the Bucs hosted one of the premier soccer tournaments in all of Division II, with the Nike Tournament of Champions. The tournament featured four top caliber teams: Barry, Seattle Pacific, Southern Connecticut State and Tampa and included two memorable victories. Firstly the Bucs'

marked their first men's game under the floodlights with a win against Seattle Pacific, whose coach is Cliff McCrath, Steve's father. Last years champions Southern Connecticut were also soundly beaten 4-1 installing great confidence in the Buccaneers.

Reaching the Final Four in the '99 season can be attributed to both hard work and dedication given by both the players and coaching staff. This year the same work ethics and dedication are present and the Bucs are in search of the 2000 National Championship trophy.

Nurse practitioner allows Health Center to provide advanced care

his year Student Health Ser vices announced the addition of a Nurse Practitioner to its staff. This position will provide advance health care to the student at Barry University. Carolyn LePage ARNP, a graduate of the nurse practitioner program in the School of Nursing at Barry, enhances the caring dimensions of the University.

In the past if a student needed lab work, or prescriptive care they had to seek a health care provider off campus, according to Eileen Egan-Hineline, the director of Health Services. "This resulted in considerable inconvenience for our students especially those who

do not have transportation. It also resulted in increased absenteeism."

Nurse Practitioners serve a regular health care provider during health and illness. In order to provide complete health care an ARNP can obtain medical histories and perform physical examination, perform diagnosis and treat acute health problems such as infections and injuries. An ARNP can also diagnose and treat chronic diseases, order, perform, and interpret diagnostic studies, prescribe medications and other treathealth ments and collaborate with physicians and other health professionals as needed.







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Know the issues and register to vote

OP presidential candidate George W. Bush accepted his nomination last month in the Philadelphia GOP convention. Bush, who is considered by many to be more likeable than his opponent, Al Gore, skimmed through the issues. Using the wit and charm he is known for he spoke of Social Security and Medicare, education, and military funding without ever failing to attack his opponent.

Democratic presidential candidate Al Gore also accepted his nomination later last month in Los Angeles. Known as a more serious and less approachable individual, Gore concentrated on speaking about the issues. "I know that sometimes people say I'm too serious, that I talk too much substance and policy," said Gore. "But the Presidency is more than a popularity

contest. It's a day-by-day fight for people."

After both speeches and with only a few months away from the presidential elections many American citizens are now beginning to focus more on the elections. "I think people normally vote for who is more likeable, but this year it looks like people are really looking at the issues," says Alex Jackson, member of the Democratic Party.

But it seems likeability will be the major deciding factor for many voters. "I just don't like Gore because he is a liberal from the word 'go'," said Kristy Taye, a junior at LSU. "He will never get my vote."

"Gore speaks for what he believes," says Michelle Liao, a junior. "I think we need that kind of people in the government."

How can one become an educated voter? Just look at the issues. Both Gore and Bush have different stands on the issues of abortion, campaign finance reform, civil rights, defense, economy, the environment and social security among others.

Al Gore supports abortion rights and opposes restrictions on late-term abortion. George Bush, on the other hand, opposes abortion except in cases of rape, incest or to save a woman's life and does support late-term abortion restrictions.

Gore supports affirmative action, same-sex marriage for religious reasons and gay adoptions while Bush opposes quotas and racial preferences, same sex-marriage and gay adoptions.

In the issue of campaign finance reform Gore supports public financing of congressional and presidential campaigns through his \$7 billions "Democracy Endowment" fund and supports the banning of "soft money" donations to political parties from all sources, including individuals. Bush opposes publicly financed congressional and presidential campaigns and supports "soft money" donations from individuals.

What must one do to vote? Register. You can apply for voter registration by filling out a Voter Registration Application Form. You must also be registered for at least 29 days before the election date. These forms can be found in most post offices, libraries, banks, government offices or you can fill out an on-line application form and get more information at http://election.dos.state.fl.us/. General elections will be held on November 7.

Carelessness leads to Theft in Freshman Dorms

ou just received a gleaming \$5,000 laptop computer, with all the trimmings, from your parents. You carry the brand-new, precious object with you as you walk outside. For a moment, you set the laptop down on the D and D front steps so you can run to your car a few feet away. The laptop will be perfectly safe. After all, it's in your sight the whole time. Isn't it? That was not the story for some in the last semester.

"I guess I just turned around too fast," said the then Dunspaugh resident Chelan Smith, speaking on this particular incident in which her new laptop was stolen.

It would be difficult imagining something like this occurring, but it

"I heard voices and turned back around quickly," said Chelan. "But it was gone. I still haven't told my parents."

Like any college campus, one has to be careful with valuable possessions, but exactly how careful?

Nick Tamposi, a then freshman living in Weber Hall, was shocked to discover that his \$2,000 laptop had been stolen in what seemed like an instant. "It happened so quickly," Nick said. "I went down the hall for a quick second and, when I came back, no laptop. My new computer was gone."

A question is raised than of how cautious does one have to be. If stu-

dents are not wary at all times, will they be the victims of theft? Security measures come into question.

At the Weber and D and D buildings, front desk personnel are the only authority figures present. They might be able to weed out suspicious characters coming in, but within the dorms, they are virtually powerless.

"I had my wallet stolen from my room while my roommates were in there. So it had to be someone either they or I knew," said a then Weber freshman Matt Hansen. "That means that we all have to be a lot more observant."

Certainly, if students strongly request it, a program could be set up that would help prevent theft, especially dormitory theft. Perhaps one where students could arm themselves with even the basic knowledge of dealing with robbery. Primarily, to always report it.

"That's the problem with us students," laughed first year student Jamil Davis. "Every single one of my friends who had something stolen never reported it to at least an RA."

Despite reasonable complaints, some at Barry think otherwise.

"Nothing like that has ever happened to me," stated freshman Weber resident Marc Williams. "I leave my door unlocked all the time. When I'm sleeping and when I'm in the shower."

Sentiments of this nature also proved relevant among some of the D



and D population. Sophomore Kelly Bayliss, who was a Dalton resident last semester, said, "I leave my door open a lot. When I come back from the cafeteria or somewhere else, it's cool to see one of my friends in there hanging out or watching T.V."

As inviting as a concept that this might sound, the Barry public safety department, located in Thompson Hall room 119, still advises dorm residents to be cautious. Students can go there to voice concerns. Also, students can visit the Barry Campus Crime Checking Center, headed by Freddy Ulloa, found in a tricky spot right outside the west end of Weber Hall. These two facilities offer some helpful hints to avoid dorm theft and other crimes.

Security Tips

- Always take steps to protect yourself.
- Don't carry large amounts of cash.
- Go with someone. There is safety in numbers.
- Stay away from Isolated areas.
- Try to stay near well lit areas.
- Lock your door every time you leave.
- Don't leave your belongings unattended.
- Put valuables in the trunk.
- Lock your bicycle.
- Register your bike with campus security.
- Report any suspicious activity to campus security or local police immediately.

The Student Health Services staff consists of a Nurse Director, a board certified in college health, a full-time nurse practitioner, a part time RN, a grad assistant who is a registered nurse, an assistant to the director, and three student health advisors. All the staff works under a signed established protocol, provided by medical consultant, Dr. Susan Dombrowsky.

"The most common problems we see are the episodic illness that occur


in the average college students like respiratory infections and minor injuries", says Egan-Hineline. "Last year we saw in excess of 4000 visits to SHS. 40% of those visits were referred to an off campus health care provider. Having Carolyn in SHS, we are anticipating our referral to off site providers to be reduced to 10-15% this year with most of the referrals being to medical specialists".

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

Williamson joins Barry coaching staff as new men's golf coach

oel Williamson joins the Barry athletic staff as the Buccaneers new men's golf coach. Williamson takes over for Roger White who will remain as the women's golf coach and head up the university's golf management program.

A PGA professional, Williamson most recently served as the head of golf instruction for Baylor University in Waco, Texas for the past six years and Assistant Golf Professional for Better Golf, Inc.

Williamson has seven years of collegiate coaching experience as well. He served as head men's golf coach at the University of Texas – San Antonio, a NCAA Division I program, for six seasons (1987-93), and as the assistant men's coach at the University of Mary Hardin Baylor, an NAIA program in Belton, Texas, for one season. While at UTSA he developed one of

the top men's golf programs in the Trans America Athletic Conference. He was selected conference Coach of the Year in 1990-91 and guided the Roadrunners to a No. 23 national ranking during the season in 1993. His teams at Texas-San Antonio also excelled in the classroom with three players earning Academic All-America honors and nine players earn Academic All-Conference honors.

He graduated from the University of Mary Hardin Baylor with a bachelor's degree in Liberal Arts in 1984 and a bachelor's degree in Education in 1985. Williamson then earned a master's degree in Education from Baylor University in 1986.

Williamson is also a veteran of the U.S. Army having served as a crewchief and flight engineer for the 101st Airborne Division at Fort Campbell, Kentucky from 1972 to 1975.



hey say national nominating conventions used to come with all the drama of Survivor, the back-stabbing of The Sopranos and the sleaziness of Jerry Springer. They also say that they were fun. Now they say they look like infomercials. TV-hungry parties use every frame of free airtime to hawk their wares and introduce their shining stars. 

Best known for his program "Friendship in the Age of AIDS" (with T.J. Sullivan), Joel Goldman has now put together a powerful solo program called "Sex Under the Influence." The new program includes humor, personal experiences, interactive exercises, and video to help students better understand how sexual decisions made under the influence of alcohol can dramatically affect their lives, and the lives of their friends.

Joel is a person living with HIV, and he traces many of the behaviors that led to his infection to his college days. With humor and unflinching honesty, Joel tells of how he learned – like many college students – to hook up at parties and bars while intoxicated. His non-preachy style is always received well by students who are challenged to look at their own behaviors. Joel shows how even those students who understand safe sex can make deadly mistakes when mixing sex and alcohol.




The Legend of Starring: Bagger Vance

Barry Alumnus Represents the U.S. at the Olympics

hen Mickisha Hurley '96 (School of Arts and Sciences) takes the volleyball court in the Sydney Summer Olympics in September, the roar from the crowd will not deaden the one thought in her head. For years she's been repeating it over and over again: Ignore the pain and play to the best of your ability.

A Miami native and Barry All-American who led the Barry Buccaneers to the 1995 NCAA Division II national championship, Hurley is the only player on the U.S. national team roster to have emerged from a Division II school.

And she's had to deal with excruciating pain every day since shin splints surfaced in 1997, after a year layoff from athletics.


"I almost want to give up all the time because of the pain," she said. "But I know this is where God wants me to be."

Leonid Yelin, former head coach at Barry, had to convince her to try out for the national team. At the trials in Colorado Springs, Hurley leaped higher than any other player, touching the 10-feet-10-inches high — that's almost a foot above a basketball rim. U.S. Olympic coach Mick Haley invited her back for a probationary period.

"Getting on the team was the work of the Lord," she said. "Doors kept opening, and I just walked this way and that way. I figure when it is time for me to go, I'll know too."

Since 1997 she has traveled with the U.S. national team to all corners of the world, visiting Australia, Brazil, Dominican Republic, and Japan in 1999 alone. Last year she led the starters with a .338 hitting percentage at the World Cup and helped Team USA claim a bronze medal at the Pan American Games.

By continually posting impressive numbers — for example, in a four-game

win over Brazil last year, she tallied 12 kills, seven blocks, and a .500 hitting percentage — she has provided a major contribution toward Team USA qualifying for the Olympics.

Along the way, she shattered the stigma she first faced with team members for being the only Division II

player. Even the coach teased her, saying what was good enough at Barry may not be good enough against highly skilled Asian teams.

"Not everything is set in stone," she said. "Regardless of where you come from, you can make the opportunity (Continued on Pg. 14).

Tennis star named NCAA Woman of the Year

ormer Barry University student - athlete Anna Hallbergson has been named one of the 10 finalists for the 2000 NCAA Woman of the Year award. A senior captain last season for the Barry women's tennis team, Hallbergson is currently attending medical school at Chicago Medical School in Chicago, Illinois.

Earlier this month Hallbergson was selected NCAA Woman for the state of Florida. The 10 finalists were selected from the 51 state winners. Hallbergson is the third female athlete from Barry to win the award in the past five years. Marya Morusiewicz received the award in 1996 and her sister, Janina Morusiewicz, won it in 1998.


Hallbergson led the Buccaneers to a 16-8 record last season while receiving All-American honors and maintaining a 4.0 GPA. Barry placed third in the Sunshine State Conference last season and made a fifth-straight appearance in the national tournament. She won the NCAA's \$12,500 Walter Byers post-graduate school, making Barry the only scholarship at any level to have two Walter Byers scholarship winners (Marya Morusiewicz won the

honor in 1997). She helped Barry win the conference title in 1998 and a No. 3 ranking in the national polls last season.

The NCAA will salute the achievements and accomplishments of all of its state winners and finalists at the awards dinner on Oct. 15, at the Indiana Roof Ballroom in Indianapolis, Indiana.

While at Barry, Hallbergson conducted research on fetal alcohol syndrome with Barry professor Dr. Laura Mudd. She also spent time volunteering at Jackson Memorial Hospital and the Big Brother/Big Sister program. A biology major at Barry, Hallbergson is originally from Sweden and began playing tennis at the age of 9.

Her medical aspirations began at an early age. She excelled at chemistry and biology, and began spending time at hospitals when she was 15. In her first year in South Florida, 1996, she helped Miami-Dade Community College win the national junior college title, playing No. 1 singles and doubles. She won the conference's Scholar Athlete of the Year in 1998 and 1999.



Undefeated Lady Bucs Ranked No. 2


Outscoring their opponents 46-4, Bucs reach double digits twice

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Barry Golfer Bachztezt dies at 21 years of age

oel Bachstetz, member of the Buccaneer Golf team died on September 2nd after loosing his battle with neurofibromatosis, a genetic disease that causes tumors to grow on nerves. Bachstetz was 21, from Ocho Rios, Jamaica and had arrived at Barry University in the fall of 1999, pursuing a dream of becoming his country's best golfer. By then he was already deaf because a tumor had been removed from an auditory nerve, yet he had ambitions of being the Buccaneer's best golfer ever.

Bachztetz qualified for the Lynn University tournament where he shot 79-80-80, and the Northwood tournament, and came close to qualifying on several other occasions. In April, Bachztetz complained about his fingers going numb, leading to the discovery of that eventually fatal tumor on the stem of the brain.

A movement is under way to establish a golf scholarship at Barry in

Junior setter Meghan Clarke is averaging 11.98 assist per game.


Barry returns all six of its starters from last season.


