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

Nichols named SSC coach of the year

his season, volleyball coach Dave Nichols led the Buccaneers to a 27-2 overall record while also posting a 13-1 mark in SSC play, and led the Bucs to a share of the SSC title for the first time since 1997. During the season, the Bucs also climbed the national poll earning their highest ranking at sixth in the nation since the 1997 NCAA runner-up season.

In his sixth season at the helm of the Buccaneer volleyball program, Nichols is Barry's all-time winningest coach in school history with a record of 149-42 and a .780 overall winning percentage. He has also tallied an overall 69-14 record and an .831 winning percentage versus Sunshine State Conference.

The team shared the SSC title with arch rivals Tampa. The Bucs beat Tampa 3-2 at home after trailing 1-2. Barry rolled off 16 consecutive wins to end the regular season, the third longest winning streak in school history. The Bucs were unbeaten at home throughout the season. Karla Bersano led a balanced Buccaneer attack with 4.03 kills per game and a hit .282. Fernanda Ferreira paced the team with a .334 attack percentage and added 3.15 kills per game. Simone Ferrarezi also chipped in over three kills per game at 3.37, while hitting .294.

After the defeat of Tampa, Ferrarezi, a 5-10 junior outside hitter from Sao Paulo, Brazil, was named the AVCA (American Volleyball Coaches Association)/ Sports Imports Division II National Player of the Week.

Ferrarezi tallied 19 kills, a .364 attack percentage, and 18 digs in leading the Buccaneers to their first win over their rivals since October 1, 1999. The win also halted Tampa's 36 consecutive conference victories.

At the time of the Buccaneer going to press the Bucs advanced to the Elite Eight by defeating Tampa again 3-2 and look more impressive by the day.

Neveu resigned after hitting student: Police report filed

he practice was coming to a close, the day had been strenuous, and the coach lost it. Barry's head women's soccer coach Mike Neveu resigned on September 22, hours after he had slapped senior player Stephanie

O'Brien across the face three times at practice.

O'Brien proceeded to file a report at the Miami Shores Police Department on October 1. The report states, "Ms. O'Brien is a member of Barry University's Women's soccer team. She and the other members of the team had just completed practice and began to joke with one of the team's student trainers. Some com-

ments were made that apparently angered the head soccer coach, Mr. Neveu. At this time Ms. O'Brien states that Mr. Neveu slapped her face three times and told her that her comments were inappropriate. The entire team witnessed these actions. Ms. O'Brien stated that she filed an incident report with Barry University and that approximately four hours later Mr. Neveu resigned. Ms. O'Brien further

stated that she did not want to report the battery or press charges, that she just wanted the incident documented with another agency other than Barry University." The case is currently open and pending.

The Ft. Lauderdale Sun Sentinel reported on the incident on October 6. In the paper O'Brien said that during a post-practice huddle she jokingly called a student trainer "a fag."



Some of what we MUST know about SACS

ean Judith Balcerski, of the School of Nursing, is one of the few deans or others from Barry University to have been a SACS visitor to other universities. She described the visits and what we should expect as a university and a faculty and the impact the visit would have on us as faculty.

One element of the visit that may come as a surprise is the number of visitors that appear, anywhere from 18-20 people arriving on campus to survey and evaluate us. The visitors are usually from like universities: size, private, church-related and a southern university. In addition, the visitors represent like schools, such as someone from nursing, education, law, individuals who are experts in their own field. Others will include people from the library, finance, technical fields, institutional research and planning and distance learning. Usually there is at least one, and sometimes two presidents of universities. We are truly evaluated by our peers.

The visitors receive the entire self-study and frequently additional documents related to their areas before the visit and may have questions and concerns before they arrive. The visit lasts about three days, during which time the visitors read and read and read all the prepared materials (responses to the MUST statements) that we have written for the last 2½ years. They then validate and share information with each other regarding weak areas



or areas that are not readily in evidence. They have to have access to all the data to substantiate the MUST statements. If you have not heard about the MUST statements, you MUST find out about them. My sense is that by the time we are finished with all the documentation we will be have had enough of two little words, MUST STATEMENTS.

The faculty, students, and staff may be questioned by any of the visitors and are queried more in depth by the visitor specific to their school or service. The visitors validate the documentation provided and all the MUST statements related to the university. (There's that must word again). In all, it is a pretty rigorous time for everyone.

The School of Nursing has been through many accreditations, but this will be a new experience for many. When the process has been completed and we have the much sought after SACS reaffirmation of accreditation, we will truly know that we have accomplished an outstanding fete. And then we MUST all celebrate.

Hurley voted to SSC Hall of Fame

ormer Barry Distinguished Alumni honoree Mickisha Hurley has been elected to the Sunshine State Conference Hall of Fame. The 6'1" middle blocker led the Buccaneers to the 1995 Division II National Title, finishing her career as the team's all-time leader in kills (1,683), attacks (3,432), hitting percentage (.385), block solos (127), block assists (332) and total

blocks (459). Currently playing professionally for A.S. Roma Pallavolo in Italy, Mickisha was a key member on the bronze medal winning U.S. Olympic Volleyball Team. She continues to remain a member of the U.S. National team and has the distinction of being the only small-college player on the squad.



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ANTHRAXPrecautions

Recent events have raised public concern about the risks posed by the threat of Anthrax exposure. In an effort to better inform all members of the Barry community that the university is ready to help insure everyone's safety and security, the Division of Student Services hosted a Forum on Anthrax Related Concerns on October 24. Following is some information that the Office of Public Safety published in order to assist the community in dealing with a threat quickly and efficiently.



EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

Contaminated Person or Area

- 1. Do not panic.
- 2. Do not leave the area..... stay put!
- 3. Look and see who else is in the same area and calmly ask them to alert Public Safety (899-3333, or x8300 on residence hall phone system) to the possible contamination.
- 4. Tell people in the immediate area to **NOT** leave the area. Emergency personnel will come to the scene.
- 5. Very calmly, leave the contaminant in the same general area found preferably away from any high activity areas.

Public Safety Personnel will:

- 1. Immediately notify facilities to shut off the air conditioning or heating to help prevent any contaminant spread.
- 2. Dispatch Public Safety personnel to the scene to secure the area to prevent anyone from leaving or entering the area of suspected contamination.
- 3. Dial 911 (or 9-911 from the residence hall phone system) and advise operator the following:
- a. Hazard being experienced: Example: Anthrax
- b. Tell the operator to dispatch: Fire Department, Police, and the Hazardous Material Response Team to the location identified of suspected contamination.
- 4. Notify the Director of Public Safety of the suspected contamination.
- 5. Provide leadership to keep calm and order to the area and to calm concerned persons.
- 6. Alert all departments in the area to perform a visual headcount of employees and account for all personnel.
- 7. Alert Emergency Response Personnel of anyone that has left the building since the declared general alert and the possible destination or whereabouts of that individual.
- 8. Assist Emergency Response Personnel.

Facility Management Personnel will:

- 1. Shut off air conditioning and heating, if possible, to the identified area to prevent contaminant spread.
- 2. Assist Public Safety to prevent anyone from exiting or entering the building.
- 3. Provide leadership to calm concerned persons.

If you have any questions or concerns, do not hesitate to contact the offices of the Director of Commuter Affairs (305-899-3089) and Director of Residential Life (305-899-3875) with any questions you may have.

* This checklist is non-comprehensive and all persons responsible for incoming mail should use "common sense" in handling suspicious mail.

* MAIL SCREENING CHECKLIST


Students and staff responsible for incoming mail should maintain an awareness of the possibility of anthrax threat letters.

Some typical characteristics
Postal Inspectors have
detected over the years,
which ought to trigger
suspicion, include parcels
that:

- Contain no return address.
- 2. Have excessive postage.
- 3. Are handwritten or have a poorly typed address.
- 4. Have misspelling of common words.
- 5. Have restrictive mark ing such as "Confiden tial" or "Personal," etc.
- 6. Are unexpected or are from someone unfamil iar to you.
- 7. Are addressed to some one no longer with your organization or are therwise outdated.
- 8. Have protruding wires, strange odors or stains.
- 9. Show a city or state in the postmark that doesn't match the return address.
- 10. Are of unusual weight, given their size, or are lopsided or oddly shaped, discolored portions of the envelope, oily film on the envelope, and/or the presence of a powdery substance on the envelope.

FACTS

- 1. Anthrax bacteria are normal occurring bacteria.
- 2. Contamination occurs through a concentrated powder form either by inhalation or through a skin abrasion/cut.
- 3. If infected by the bacteria, immediate antibiotic treatment by emergency staff achieves a 100% recovery rate.
- 4. A quarantine of all affected work areas will be implemented to prevent any further contamination.
- 5. If Anthrax is left untreated, symptoms (nausea, diarrhea, vomiting, rash, sweating, and convulsions) will appear and death will result within days.

What about the children?

n the morning of September 11, 2001, the American public was shocked and saddened as they sat glued to their televisions and radios in an effort to gather the most up-to-date information on the tragedies unfolding in New York and Washington, DC. Government buildings, universities, and other heavily populated locations were closed and, in some cases, evacuated as the threat of continued offenses became more reality than phobia. In the midst of the nationwide commotion, daycare centers and schools were bombarded with parents frantically trying to extract their children from their classes. In most cases, these children were taken home were their parents perched themselves in front of the television where they continued to monitor the events. Those children that remained in school were expected to proceed with daily assignments while their teachers kept in-class sets tuned to local broadcasts for information.

For the next 48 hours, men and women alike tried their best to make some sort of sense out of the senseless situation. But what about

the children? In dealing with their own grief and confusion, many adults inadvertently overlooked the impact that the attacks had, and continue to have on the nations young people. For some, it is easier to dismiss the issue as "over the heads" of their children than it is to address the issue directly. Sadly, it is this very line of thinking that can lead to an increase in the anxiety felt by those considered "too young" to understand.

On the afternoon of the offensive, workers at the American Tae Kwon Do Academy which runs a local after-school care program noticed the various proclamations being tossed around by the children. Many were yelling statements like, "They're gonna bomb Florida next!" At one point, a seven-year-old boy appeared before Carlos Urbizo, one of the workers, and asked, "Is this the beginning of World War III?" This is when Urbizo decided that, "something had to be done." So the program employees gathered the children and began a dialogue aimed at clarifying the circumstances and allaying some of their fears. Urbizo recalls, "First we asked them to explain what they had already

heard, then we tried to offer an explanation in terms they could comprehend." Although they were unable to completely eliminate the children's concerns, Urbizo and his fellow workers are confident that they were able to change their perspective.

It was ironic to hear the

media encourage parents to do their best to shield their children from reports of the catastrophes when virtually all network television programming was preempted by news accounts. Fortunately, one network designed strictly for children created a special program to address the issue on a level they could comprehend. The Orlando based Nickelodeon network, which airs a weekly program called "Nick News," enlisted the program's host, famed journalist Linda Ellerbee, to mediate an on-air discussion about the crisis with twelve grammar-school-aged children. Along with the youngsters, a child psychologist was on hand to answer questions and explain that their feelings, whatever they may be, were a normal part of the healing proThe program, entitled "Kids, Terrorism, and the American Spirit," offered some guidelines to follow when approaching this or any other difficult news topic with children:

- Explore the age appropriateness of the news you allow your child to watch.
- Watch or read the news with your kids.
- 3. Create an open dialogue.
- 4. Share *your* feelings about the news you see.
- Let your kids know the difference between news and reality.
- 6. Acknowledge you child's fears.
- 7. Explore the facts with your child.
- Acknowledge the complexity of the news.
- 9. Select kid friendly news sources.
- 10. Balances your child's news diet.

In dealing with one's own feelings, it is important to recognize that children are people too, and have similar questions and concerns. They simply do not have the same mechanisms to process information and need help from those who do.

Sean Casey: Living life RAW

t might be the challenge of trying something new and different. The satisfaction of standing out as a unique individual in a society that has conformed to the rules given. But to live life raw does not necessarily mean to be adventurous, on the contrary for Sean Casey it is, "treating your body as a holy temple."

Like many in America, Casey is taking an active role in the Organic Movement that first began in the 1960s. Although the groovy days of the flower children and hippies have passed, the truth learned during this time not only survived, but also continues to grow. the body. However, what barriers do college students, like Casey, face and is it worth it?

Casey, 27, was first introduced to this new lifestyle while he was working at AT&T a little over four years ago. A customer had introduced the idea of eating organic food to him. "I thought that I was a pretty healthy guy," explained Casey. "But then he started telling me about what was out there." By the time this man, who is now a good friend, asked Casey, "How old do you think I am?" Casey was surprised to learn that

this man was 52 instead of the guessed age of 39. That's when Casey decided to make a change. "My goal is to look six years younger than my age," said Casey.

With the help of his new friend, Casey learned what products to avoid. Soon enough he began to research about chemicals like sulphur and its side effects. "There are two ways: organic and conventional," he said. "Organic is without chemicals and uses natural fertilizers whereas conventional uses chemicals to make it last longer." Casey uses his Buc card only to purchase water and instead shops every week at organic stores like Whole Foods in Aventura or Wild Oats in South Beach. Purchasing everything from organic food to organic products, including lotion, toothpaste and toiler paper has him spending \$60 each time. "To quote the Bible, God says we should take care of our bodies as a 'holy temple,'" Casey said. "I do not care what the price is, I take care of my body."

Casey admits that it takes plenty of sacrifice and discipline, but does not regret his decision. "It took time to learn but my friend really helped me a lot, after awhile he was like 'man you are taking it to the extreme' but that is the way I am, I live for a challenge everyday."

The next challenge is living life raw.

Casey is starting to eat only organic raw foods. Nothing cooked. Although once in a while, one might find him in Pi Changs restaurant, never expect to see him at a fast food place like Burger King. Instead in a typical day, Casey jogs in the mornings and would snack on his organic raw almonds, pumpkin and sunflower seeds, or raisins. Majority of the day he is drinking wheat grass juice. "This builds up your stamina, cleanses you and toxifies the bacteria in your blood," he explained.

Casey is not depriving his body of nutrients or proteins. His daily organic drinks like Beet juice, contains iron which produces red blood cells. He eats soybeans, which has 50% more useable protein than steak and seaweed that is rich in B-vitamins.

But there is more to this Sports management major. Casey is looking forward to graduating in May and plans on obtaining his nutrition license. Besides exercising, Casey enjoys collecting antiques and managing a band called 9 miles. His goals include one day owning either a Vegan restaurant split with an organic grocery/health store or a vintage clothing store.

For Casey life is constantly changing but one thing is sure. "This lifestyle keeps me stress free and more lively."

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



I immediately went to the Department of Public Safety in Thompson Hall, to see if they had got word of this. Stan Young reassured me that they had heard nothing of even a possibility of anthrax on campus. Thank God! I was really surprised to hear that a student or students here at Barry would take a serious issue that we are all facing right now, and turn it into a practical joke.

Americans have been shocked by the recent events that have taken place in this country. We are scared, confused, and we do not know where to turn for answers. After what happened on Sept. 11, it seemed things could not get much worse. We were wrong. Anthrax is here. The scary thing is, we do not know where it came from, nor can we predict where it will turn up next. Anthrax is considered to be a potential agent for use in biological warfare. They have not come right out and said it on the news, for obvious reasons. We are already frantic enough.

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Anthrax anxiety

were already shaken to hear that the terrorists responsible for the tragic events were living quietly among us. But now, we hear about an anthrax breakout in Boca Raton! What is going on? The problem is, no one knows! First, we must research this nasty bacteria to find out what it is, and then we must learn to protect ourselves. Finally, and most importantly, we must go on. We must live as normally as we can. If we allow our nation to be in constant fear, than whoever is responsible for terrorizing us will achieve what they set out to do. Of course we are all afraid, but we cannot panic. It is important to stay calm, take the proper precautions, and continue with our daily routine.

So what exactly is anthrax and where is it most commonly found? Anthrax is an acute infectious disease caused by the sporeforming bacterium Bacillus anthracis. Anthrax most commonly occurs in wild and domestic lower vertebrates, like cattle, sheep, and goats, but it can also occur in humans who are exposed to infected animals or tissue from infected animals. It is most commonly found in agricultural regions like South and Central America, Southern and Eastern Europe, Asia, Africa, the Caribbean, and the Middle East. Officials report only a handful of anthrax cases in livestock in the United States.

There are three types of anthrax, characterized by the way they are spread: cutaneous (infection when the bacterium enters a cut or abrasions on the skin, death is rare), inhalation (infection renders flu-like symptoms and breathing trouble, usually fatal), and gastrointestinal (contracted through the consumption of contaminated meat and inflames the intestinal tract. Some 25 to 60 percent infected will die from it).

But how do we take proper precautions to prevent infection? Over the past few weeks, doctors have been bombarded by panic-stricken patients reporting many of these common symptoms. The problem is, even the doctors themselves are not sure what to do.

"Doctors are making decisions with almost zero level of knowledge," said Dr. Irwin Redlener, president of the New Children's Hospital in Montefiore, N.Y., "They are racing to get knowledge in the midst of an onslaught of calls from people who have colds, flu's, and intestinal upsets, and want to know, 'could this be anthrax?""

Never before have we as Americans felt so helpless. But that is not to say that we will accept this vulnerable state. The problem is, it is very rare for a human to be infected by this bacterium, and that is why we got caught off guard. But we are acting fast. If treatment begins in the early stages of the infection, the survival

rate is very high. Doctors are prescribing antibiotics such as Ciprofloxacin, Levaquin, Floxin, and Tequin to infected patients as well as the worried and the overly cautious others.

So how cautious is too cautious? Be reasonable, people, I'm not sure that we need to walk around wearing gas masks. Not yet. Nor do I suggest we all start pumping our systems with overpriced, unnecessary antibiotics. What we need to do is live. Wake up every day ready for it and not afraid of it. Do not allow yourself to be consumed by fear of what may be, because quite frankly, if something is going to happen, it will, regardless of you perceived protection. Remember: there is a difference between being cautious, and being consumed. Don't be consumed.

On behalf of myself and everyone else who heard this rumor, it was not funny! This is the first time in American history that we are threatened by biological warfare. We, in essence, do not even know what were in for. This is a serious issue we are all facing together. Let us make sure we remember that we are all in this together, we need each other, and we are somewhat responsible for one another. These frightening times give us all the more reason to turn to God through prayer and to each other for comfort.

Coach Neveu responded that it was inappropriate and slapped her. The whole team witnessed the incident.

O'Brien and other players filed a complaint with Mike Covone, Barry University's Athletic Director. Covone had a meeting with Neveu, and four hours later the coach resigned. "Coach Neveu resigned for personal reasons. We do not like to comment further on personal matters regarding our staff and students," said Covone. "We do not like to see any student suffer and we are very sensitive to all our student concerns," he said. "I think we moved in an expeditious way and in this case the student has done a great job at focusing and continuing doing a great job for her team during the season."


In the Sun-Sentinel report and when speaking to a Buccaneer reporter, O'Brien, who happens to be the current Buccaneer Sports Editor, said that she did not mean it as a sexual slur. She says she has many gay friends and will probably not use this word again.

O'Brien was upset about

an announcement on the university's web site about Neveu's resignation that made it appear as if the incident had never happened. When O'Brien and Marie Alvarez, Associate Vice President of Student Services confronted Covone and Dr. Jean Cerra, Vice Provost and the Dean of Human Performance and Leisure Sciences about the announcement it was still not pulled. It remained posted until the following weekend when O'Brien's parents came into town.

O'Brien and her parents asked Barry faculty members in the athletic department to report the incident to the NCAA. When they refused, O'Brien filed the police report. "I did not press charges, I filed the report because we were uneasy and we just wanted the police department to know about it," said O'Brien. "Sometimes I feel like people do not understand the weight of this incident."




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Strong showing for TENNIS


Samir M'Bioka captured the individual singles title at the C.L. Varner Invitational (Photo: Sports Information)
