A Nation Sits and Waits

On September 11, 2001, at 8:46 a.m., the first plane hits the north tower of the World Trade Center in New York. Seventeen minutes later the second plane hits the south tower. At 10:05 the south tower collapses and at 10:29 the north followed. An entire nation stunned. Almost an hour after the first attack on the north tower, at 9:43 a.m. flight 77 crashes into the Pentagon. Chaos sets in; smoke and soot fill the air. People are running, screaming, trying to escape, and fearing for their lives. The unfathomed has occurred.

President Bush addressed the nation saying that the U.S. will make no distinction between the terrorist and those whom help harbor them. He vows to the people that justice will be served and we will seek out and punish, "The folks who are responsible."

Between September 10 and September 14 of last year, Bush's approval rating went up thirty-five percent (from 51 to 86). Even after all of the controversy over the Election'2000, this country was sticking by their president.

"I guess if the President feels there is a threat, there is one. Who are we to turn on our own, especially in a time like now? If we stop backing the Presidents decisions then fall apart from within than we will be more vulnerable. We need to let all these countries that hate us know that we will not be broken" Said Amber Moral a Broward resident and a student at FIU.

There were 3, 005 people killed at the World Trade Center, The Pentagon, and the four fatal flights that never landed. That figure including 366 firefighters, police officers, and paramedics. It was estimated that 2,000 children lost a mommy or a daddy that day.

Here we are, one year later, the war on 'terror' continues, as the man hiding behind the mask, Saudi militant, Osama bin Laden remains missing and Americans are still threatened by the possibility of future terrorist attacks on the United States by such groups in the East such as Al'Qaeda. Also, overseas, the results of recent investigations by the United Nations have given the President reason to believe that Iraqi leader

Saddam Hussein may have access to Nuclear weapons and plans to use them on the United States.

Although Iraq's foreign minister read a combative letter from Mr. Hussein, insisting his country had no weapons of mass destruction but attacking the Bush administration for a "cyclone of American accusations and fabricated crises against Iraq." Despite this letter, the chance of the U.S. declaring war on Iraq seems inevitable since over the past year, the linkage in the president's mind between Mr. bin Laden and Mr. Hussein has grown tighter and given birth to a new policy of pre-emption that encapsulates Mr. Bush's view that the United States must strike before it is struck

These issues are serious ones. When one looks at the massive destruction that these groups have imposed upon New York and the Pentagon and when one remembers the anguish that each of us felt that day, it is clear that this is not over

yet. And there is a chance that the possible attacks to come will be worse than Sept 11.

On Sept. 10, 2001, the United States' sense of itself was as a nation at the top of its prowess, rich, resourceful and unchallenged. But no more. The observances that took place on the one year anniversary were under the orange glow of a threat warning that said the risk of terrorism was high. Higher than ever.

Despite the pain and anguish that is still fresh in the hearts of so many here in America and all over the globe, Americans will never give up.

Poet Maya Angelou says it best, "I see the growth rebuilding, the restoring. I see that is the American Psyche. There is so much we can draw understanding from. One of the lessons is the development of courage. Because without courage, you can't practice any of the other virtues consistently."

Flori-duh Can't Make the Cut

Florida election officials extended regular voting hours by two hours on Sept 10, 2002 statewide. It seems that two years and \$125 million after the 2000 presidential election, there are still problems with the voting system in South Florida.

It is not certain if it was due to all of the inexperienced poll workers, some of whom packed up and closed shop early; the malfunctioning machines; or simply that people in Dade and Broward do not know what they are doing once they step into that tiny booth. But whatever the reason, it was a nightmare, not to mention yet another embarrassment to Florida, and especially Dade and Broward coun-

For these two counties, many of their precincts failed to open on time,

of the new touch-screen machines wrong. People simply could not worked correctly. According to Miami-Dade Mayor Penelas, shortly after 7 a.m., 178 out of the 754 precincts reported some degree of problem. At 9:45 a.m., 68 precincts were still completely closed to voters and 110 reported that at least half of their machines didn't work.

At nearly 11 a.m., 32 precincts were still closed and 45 were operating at one half capacity. All precincts weren't opened until 4 p.m., although some of them still had machines that were inoperative. Many were exhausted and frustrated, having had to wait in line for hours. Other complaints were that people were handed the wrong documents and had to literally fight to participate in their party's primary. Some others claimed that the address of the precinct in which they were supposed to vote were incom-

and for the ones that did open, not all plete and in some cases completely believe this was possible after what t e m happened in 2000.

> But these are new problems. Two years ago all of the precincts were opened on time. Experts boil the problem down to two categories: poll workers and machinery. Some clerks didn't even show up, especially in Broward. Many of those that did show seemed inexperienced with the new touch screen voting machines.

> Governor Bush was furning. "There has been ample time to prepare for this election," There is no excuse for not having precinct workers in a precinct for voting. There is no excuse for not turning on the machines, it is shameful," he commented.

> So who picks these poll workers anyway? Well, Miriam Oliphant, who is the Elections Supervisor of Broward County, promises to change

I ask this: is this really why President Bush wants to go after Saddam Hussein? The political crossfire addresses the issue of war from both a democrat and a republican point of view. As for myself, I believe that we're dealing with a double-edged sword. Although I'm not American, I know why I am here. For the same reason every immigrant comes here: to be safe, to be free, to pursue dreams and to achieve. My life, as that of many others, I'm sure, has been deeply affected since this tragedy. How can I now be safe in this country I thought was the safest? Where can I go now? What will I do? We have to realize this: we've never really been safe. It's even worse when we stop to think that extremists who believe we're evil are following their "religious beliefs." How many wars have been fought in the name of religion? How much blood must be shed in the name of God? It seems religion justifies all actions taken. Terrorists kill innocents (and themselves) in the name of Allah, and then we fight back because "God is behind us." I wish we could just leave religion out of this for once instead of hiding behind it. I

understand that America was founded primarily on Christianity, and that in times of despair in sorrow, we search for comfort in the truth of God. But I sometimes get the impression that we think we're the best because of what we believe in, and that isn't right. If so, we're being no better than others.

My point is this: we're vulnerable, we're under attack. We have always been and we will probably be for a long time. The notion of security has always been an abstract. We do have military power, but we are never SAFE. Never were, and truthfully, we never will be. Unfortunately, it took a tragedy like this one to open our eyes. However, there is safety in numbers. We stand united through it all, and this will give us a sense of unity. We now have a peace pole erected in front of the Cor Jesu chapel, blessed with holy water, reminding us of our power in overcoming and loving. We can pray and cry and laugh together, we can support each other. That's the beauty of America.

Now if only we could remember that for more than two minutes... There are so many things we can do with a little faith. The Buccaneer wants to take you to new frontiers, starting this semester. The Battle for Miami-Dade

A bitter battle over the civil rights for gays and lesbians has been underway in Miami for the past several months. This is not the first time that this issue has come to the forefront. In 1998, the law came under attack by a "pro-family" group. The 1998 effort mirrored a 1977 crusade led by Anita Bryant that successfully overturned a similar gay rights law. This time, the effort is being lead by Take Back Miami, a coalition of Christian conservatives, who state that the law is nothing more than a ruse to promote a gay lifestyle among school children, legalize same-sex marriages, and allow gay and lesbian couples to adopt.

The Unlikely Crusader

At first glance, Nathaniel Wilcox would be the last person one would expect to see crusading to have a bill repealed that protects people from being fired, evicted, or denied service because of their sexual orientation.

After all, he is a black man who spent many years fighting discrimination as a member of People United Leading the Struggle for Equality (PULSE, formed 22 years ago in response to Miami's worst race riot). In addition, Wilcox's brother was gay. Yet, Wilcox is the co-chair of Take Back Miami, the coalition of Christian conservatives that lead the efforts to repeal a Miami-Dade county ordinance that makes it discrimination against sexual orientation illegal. He spent months spreading the work to Miami-Dade's 184,000 black voters (a community that was considered crucial to the most-watched gay-rights referendum in the nation). According to Wilcox, there is no irony in his leading this crusade. He stated, "This is not a thing about discrimination. It is about an acceptance of a lifestyle that is ungodly."


An Issue of Discrimination

While Take Back Miami claims

'this is not about discrimination,' Save Dade (an organization against the repealing of anti-gay/lesbian law) says that is precisely what it is about. Since the law was enacted in December 1998, there have been 71 complaints of alleged discrimination based on sexual orientation. While most complaints are generally based on race, national origin, or gender, sexual orientation has quickly become the fourth most common reason for discrimination. This is significant because it is a relatively new category.

The Vote

On yet another election day riddled with computer glitches, workers who were late, polls that closed early, and charges of fraud, residents of Miami-Dade rejected a bid to repeal the county's civil rights protections for gays and lesbians. The ordinance was upheld by a narrow margin of 53% to 47%. However, the battle may not be



over. Many people, including Eladio José Armesto (a spokesperson for Take Back Miami, the coalition of Christian conservatives that lead the efforts to repeal a Miami-Dade country ordinance) are calling for outcomes on this issue and numerous others to be challenged. They cite enormous illegalities including polls that opened over an hour late, faulty machines, and stations which ignored the governor's order to stay open late.

I knew it was just a matter of time before someone asked me: I thought you were going to pursue your second degree? I've heard that so many times! If I've told this story once, I've told it a hundred times. I don't have any money, which is very common amongst college students. I got a job to gain experience in my profession as well as make some money on the side. Unfortunately, I put myself in a horrible situation. I lost two federal grants, and now I don't even have enough money to finish my first degree. Why is it that students who try to help themselves are being punished?

There are many students who desire to attend college, but they can't. Why? Money! Who would've known that a working student who pays bills, and is independent, can't get help form the government to go to college? I'm not saying students who solely depend on their parents shouldn't receive financial aid, but financial aid should be given to students who are trying to support themselves, or are in need. When college students are working and trying to support themselves, they need help too. The only type of aid working students qualify for are students loans.

Hassles for Working Students

TaMeka is a 20-year-old college student, who doesn't qualify for financial aid, because she earns twenty thousand dollars a year. This is not nearly enough for her to live off of, let alone pay for college out of her pocket. TaMeka is forced to take one or two classes a semester, because she can't afford to be a full-time student. Her tuition is

\$ 10,000 a semester, which is half of her annual salary. Let's not forget books! Depending on a student's major, books can cost up to \$500 a semester.

Because, working students are forced to take classes part-time instead of full-time, it takes them double the time to finish the program. Often, the students have to take a

leave of absence from school for one semester or even up to a year, because of lack of funds. No money for college deters students from pursuing their dreams

Students trying to help themselves should be helped out as much as possible. Yes, college is a privilege! But, I believe it shouldn't be a challenge (at least a financial challenge) for students to educate themselves, and do positive things with the knowledge they gain in college. These are the students we shouldn't have reservations about giving money to, because we know they will use the money wisely. Do You Really Understand Financial

What exactly is financial aid? It is very important that students under- out their Free Application for Federal stand what financial aid is, the application process, and what exactly they qualify for. Financial aid is the total amount of money awarded to students by school, state, and federal programs. The money is allotted for tuition, housing, and books (if any is

left over). Loans are money borrowed from a bank to pay for your school. The bank charges interest fees for the use of the money. The amount of money paid back is with interest over a period of time. Usually, this money is to be paid back six months after you've graduated from college. Often students are confused and don't know the difference between the aforementioned methods of payment. Financial aid doesn't have to be paid back, but

It is important when students fill Student Aid that they understand everything they are being asked, and they have all of the information they need to complete the form. This form determines how much of your hard earned money will go towards your tuition.

Salvation

For the working students who don't qualify for financial aid, there are other options out there. The information is readily available. The answer is scholarships. Yes, it's free money. A scholarship is considered a gift to help your pay for college. Scholarships do not need to be repaid, and are awarded based on performance in a certain area. These areas



Hiding in the Back Seat

Rebekka tried to pretend it didn't exist and buried her fears into alcohol and drugs. She tried so hard to keep the secret hidden from all those around her. The medicine she had to take made her feel worse than the disease itself. So hoping the disease would take her life, she went on and off the medication. And she tried desperately to get lost in the party life. She figured she was dying anyway, so why not go out with a bang? She became an unreliable model because she was sick all the time; she lost her friends; her mother was in denial. Finally her web of lies caught up with her, and she could hide no more.

Rough Road

"Why isn't this bottle of Tequila working yet? I don't have any other choice. I hate this disease. I hate losing my friends. I hate looking into my mother's eyes. I hate my life. . . I hate myself."

She pushed the pedal further down, and let the drugs and alcohol take over. She stared directly into the only path she could see. Imagining the serenity she would soon feel. Not thinking twice, she floored the car one last time. Her car slammed into the metal that should have brought her

For three days Rebekka was in and out of a coma. When she awoke, she begged to die, but she had a reason, one she couldn't see right then, for being alive.

As Rebekka later learned, she could choose to live, fight and make an example of her life, in order to save

Back in the Front Seat

After Rebekka's unsuccessful attempt on her life, she attended a seminar for HIV positive women. There she found a reason to be grateful, a reason to stop pitying herself, and a mission to fulfill. She met sixty other women, some who were worse than herself. And there she was empowered to make a difference; she even came forward with her disease on the front page of the Advocate.

Rebekka can proudly say now that she is eight years drug free and three years alcohol free. She also has an undetectable viral load, which means the virus is undetectable in her system, but can still be transmitted to others. She is a phlebotomist, and a physical fitness practitioner. She completed a physical challenge course, meant for army training, and came in sixteenth out of 108. Rebekka is no longer trying to die; she is trying to live and live

She is currently visiting schools world-wide with a strong message She wants to educate and disclose the many resources there are out there to help victims of this disease and young people who have an at-risk lifestyle.

Her goal is simple: "I want to make a difference, I want to prevent this from happening to other kids."

Road Work Ahead

Rebekka Armstrong recently visited Barry University to tell her story in hopes it would reach students and possibly save students from making the same mistakes.


Although she is leading a normal life, she is it feels like to be 'well.'






Starring ROBERT DENIRO, JAMES FRANCO, FRANCES MCDORMANYD

While the two new chapters, which are meant to fill in some of the back-story of the original trilogy, have been received with plenty of positive feedback, many casual movie watchers, along with a fair number of junkies, sci-fi have expressed angst over the culmination of some twenty-years of waiting for more

writing credit with other individuals. The first of these two films, The Empire Strikes Back (not directed by Lucas), is considered by many enthusiasts to be the strongest in the whole series. In fact, depending on whom you talk with, A New Hope (directed by Lucas) could be referred to as the weakest film in the series, in terms of acting. Now take

into account that the two newest films (The Phantom Menace and Attack of the Clones) are both directed and written entirely by Lucas, and have been slammed for their acting performances. Coincidence? Maybe.

Why hasn't George done like he has in the past and handed the directing and some of the writing duties to someone else? Have twenty years of royalties and marketing turned him into a complete control freak? Or is he convinced that he and he alone can produce these new films to their



utmost potential? Whatever his reasons are, he will be sticking to them. While he will share the writing credit with one other person, George will direct the final installment of the new

The style of Lucas' writing also appears to have changed. Starting with The Phantom Menace, the abundance of more colorful and sometimes downright goofy characters says to me that he is writing to a much younger crowd these days. The reasons for this could be extensive. Maybe all his time working in television has contributed to this - who knows? The point is that those of us who aren't nine-years-old don't care to see and hear loony characters and dopey Saturday morning cartoon dia-
