# Students Rally Against Discrimination

"Silence is approval."

Out of the many messages displayed at the rally held in front of Thompson Hall on October 11, Voices of Redemption intended that one to resonate in the minds of those who, they argue, perpetuate discrimination by not speaking out against it. Voices of Redemption, a group of concerned Barry University Students, organized the rally.

These concerned Barry Students are determined to establish a conduit within the university to continue and encourage diversity, create a feeling of acceptance, and diversify the administrative staff. In the opinion of Voices of Redemption, the administration doesn't cater to the needs of a diversified university. They attribute this to a lack of cultural and racial diversification amongst the staff.

The new Dean of Students, Dr.

Ken Rockensies, addressed the student body, "I spoke to show the administrative support that exists for the students with respect to their concerns on the issues raised at the rally." Dr. Rockensies assured Voices of Redemption, and the student body, that their concerns would not be ignored and would be addressed properly. He adds that he is "looking forward to meeting with the organizers to discuss their concerns in detail."

Dr. Heather Russell Andrade, Assistant Professor in the English Department, encourages the students and administrators to speak and listen to each other. "I think that we can all agree that the goal of creating a more inclusive and open Barry community, one in which all students are not only respected but have advocacy, agency and a platform upon which to speak, is a fundamental principle of democ-

racy and one which the administration and the faculty must rally around," she said. "The central tenet of education is praxis: reflection coupled with action. In this all too apathetic world we should stand behind the students involved in the rally for seeking to fulfill their educational mandate."

Amanda Branker, a member of Voices Redemption, describes the organization, "It was a small group of students who decided to meet and discuss the issues implicit to diversity," Branker said. "We contacted the NAACP, ADL, AND ACLU, and we received mentoring from different resources on campus."

Voices of Redemption has been an active participant in the racial and social issues of the university, but what they saw as the inability of the administration to properly manage racial situations prompted the call for a petition during the rally.

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# Note from the Editor

Having attended an all-girl Roman Catholic school before college, I grew up surrounded with nuns and priests and bishops and religious icons. Barry University's conservative ways don't impress me. Actually, I'm used to more rigidity. I'm not too far from years when nuns would examine us for forbidden jewelry and confiscate them if it failed to be a cross or religious medallion, or surprise us with inspections during which all the brave souls who decided to break the rules and paint their nails received detention in the semidark chapel, armed with a rosary and a scraper as substitute for nail polish remover.

Back in those days – actually only six or seven years ago - nuns and priests were close to sacred. Even though we ridiculed their old fashioned mentality, we always respected them, no matter what.

I'm increasingly concerned with the growing resentment toward priests and the Catholic Church, however. Ever since the many reports of molestation and child abuse have put them in the spotlight, priests have become targets of cruel jokes and stereotypes. What irks me is the socalled Catholics who've instantly lost their faith because some men of the cloth have committed horrible acts against children. I have continuously heard statements like, "The Catholic Church is going down," or "I don't trust the Church anymore."

For all of you who feel betrayed in some way, I ask this: what is your faith based on? Whom or what do

you place your faith in? A priest? A man? A building? Or God? I think we like to see the faults in people, and tend to overlook the humongous sacrifices they've made or their extreme devotion. Priests, as well as nuns, devote their lives not only to God, but also to other people. When priests are caught molesting minors or committing other acts, it is understandable that we feel betrayed and vulnerable. After all, these are the men we trust, we confess to, we look up to, and mostly respect. Of course, our primary reaction is to back off and look at them for who or what they really are: sick individuals and criminals.

But it is extreme to assume that they all have in them this evil, repressed force ready to be unleashed. Priests, before being men of God, are first and foremost human beings, who've made the decision to leave behind all material goods and follow a strict and sometimes incomprehensible path. They do so because of a love for a supreme being, they devote themselves in a way few of us could probably do. And when we cast them all in the same dirty bag, it's another negative stereotype that plague our society. Priests are human beings, and human beings make mistakes. How could we ever expect them to be saints?

When we say we have faith, we better check it at the door. Faith in what? Why do we go to Church anyway? To assemble in a loving union and pray to God, or to worship a man in cloth? The priest's role is to guide,

stir us in the right direction, not to be 'God.' When one fails to do so, we must remember what we believe in, and that shouldn't be a man.

With that said, I hope we learn to separate the man from the religion, and the sooner the better.

Now that I've got that off my chest, let me just say that I strongly hope the articles in this issue will open your eyes. A recent incident on campus sparked a thirst for equality and respect, and I do hope it will be quenched. As a college environment, it is here, if not in the family, that education on discrimination and acceptance should start and flourish. I want to believe we are more than fresh high school graduates running around campus without a goal or without a stand on issues.

Barry University has made it to the top most diverse institutions in the nation. Yet, according to certain people, we're not living up to this honor. In an environment where communication and tolerance is promoted, we find prejudice and inequity, and it is sad that some of us firmly believe these aren't issues on our campus. Just because we're a so-called 'diverse school' doesn't mean discrimination doesn't exist, and we should be made aware of that. As a friend of mine says, "This is the 21st Century, people! Get with the program. Discrimination is so

yesterday!"

It especially doesn't make sense in the world we live in. Florida has a diverse culture, with people from everywhere living next to each other. Another friend told me that what he liked about Miami was that contrary to New York City where the palpably diverse people tend to gather in neighborhoods (Italians, Jews, Jamaicans, Puerto-Ricans), inhabitants of Miami tend to live together. Shouldn't that count for something? We should take pride in this instead of behaving like immature, uneducated and ignorant individuals. There are other issues in this life worth fearing, and discrimination shouldn't be one of them. # Bush vs. McBride: Battle Continues

The atmosphere of the gubernatorial race has heated up as the candidates, almost neck-and-neck in the polls, race headlong towards an uncertain November 5th. The standing of the candidates has been divided along strict lines, and the issues most prominent with voters have been defined largely in terms of education and public safety. Below are the respective positions of each candidate.

### Crime and Safety

### Bush:

Bush cites drops in crime as being attributed to his administration, and promises to "look at every piece of legislation on the books and any piece of legislation that might go on the books" regarding public safety, according to Lt. Gov. Frank Brogan. The Bush administration also cites the "ten-twenty-life" laws, an increase in the amount of individual prison sentences served and a "three strikes" gun

law as being pivotal in reducing crime.

A law requiring Florida convicts to serve at least 85% of their sentences was passed in 1995, before Bush took office. Gun crimes have dropped every year since 1996. The "10-20-Life" law went into effect in 1999, after the decrease had begun.

In an election in which many predict the vote of women as being pivotal and where crime has been a heavy issue, it is interesting to note that almost a quarter of murders committed in Florida were related to domestic violence, which was a 15% increase in that category, under the governor.

### McBride:

McBride has continued to emphasize education. In a recent debate, he responded to questions about crime by citing higher education as a factor in its decrease. "The way you do that, again, is pivoting back to, I think, the most important, crucial issue in this state, and that is whether or not we're going to invest in our kids, and

whether we're going to invest enough in them to keep them in an education environment where they can prosper," McBride said. The candidate has not put forth a clear public safety agenda, barring that.

### Education

### Bush:

The Bush administration embraces grading schools and supports continued use of the FCAT as a means of grading. Under Bush the voucher system has been utilized, although sparingly, and has come under fire from some Civil Liberties organizations which discredit the use of public money to fund attendance at religious or parochial schools. Bush is opposed to the amendment limiting class sizes, but vows to build 300 more schools. This plan is regarded as a continuation of Democratic Governor Lawton Chiles' "Smart Schools," in which long-term bonds funded by the Florida Lottery were used to propagate construction of new schools. Under Bush's program, called

"Classrooms for Kids," taxes paid by telephone and cable users, as opposed to cigarette smokers, would pay for the new schools. Bush's education proposal also involves a new "I'm a Reader" kit. The kit includes a children's book and an application for a library card, to be distributed to new mothers.

### McBride:

Thus far, McBride plans to increase taxes on Cigarettes by 50 cents a pack, and fund the current constitutional amendment to limit class sizes, an amendment which would include a strict limit on the number of students per classroom, depending upon age. Republicans estimate the plan could cost up to 27 billion dollars, presumably to be derived from the new cigarette taxes. The amendment has enjoyed popular support over the course of the campaign.

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# We're Here: Barry Students Move into Kolasa Hall

On October 12 and 13, over 170 Barry Students made the much anticipated move into Barry's newest residence hall, Kolasa Hall. Since the beginning of the semester, most of these students have been staying at the Best Western on the 79th Street causeway.

Last spring, during room lottery students who chose to live in the new dorm knew that they would have the inconvenience of moving twice during the coming fall semester. Although most did not like the idea of this, the benefits of living in an immaculate new dorm seemed to outweigh the moving woes.

The 47, 000 square-foot-building which was named after John and Neta Kolasa, is located on 115th Street just west of North Miami Avenue. This beautiful L-shaped hall has two wings of three and four stories each. There are 49 singles and 62 doubles, each room with its own private bathroom. There are also three oversized, state-of-the-art study lounges (on the second, third and fourth floor) overlooking the baseball field.

Barry hired movers to help make the move go as smoothly as possible. At 8 a.m. Saturday morning they were moving the university furniture out of the hotel rooms. Also, the school provided the students with boxes and the option of having the movers bring their personal belongings to the new dorm, although many chose to move themselves.

When students arrived on campus Saturday and Sunday, they were greeted by the smell of fresh paint and new carpets.

"It is so exciting when you are the very first people to live somewhere.

And we have our own bathrooms! Yes!" Marie Emilie Rojas, a junior, told me.

"It was well worth the wait that is for sure," she added.

As for Barry, Kolasa Hall is just the beginning. Construction of the

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# Barry is Building New Student Union on the Way

"It is something we've needed for years," says Doctor Michael Griffin, noting the influx of students now swarming through Thompson Hall as a prime indicator of the need which the new student union will fulfill. "We've outgrown Thompson Hall."

Size was indeed a powerful factor in influencing Barry to build the new student union. Thompson Hall, structurally speaking, was never designed to house the services which now operate within it. Student counseling, for example, often seats students on the floor or in the halls. The minimal office space allotted to the counselors makes sessions with students difficult. The dining hall, whose entranceways become clogged with students at circa twelve o'clock, was also never intended to operate for as many students as it now serves.

The new union, designed by Harper Partners, avoids many of the design missteps which Thompson is now paying for. From its inception, students as well as faculty and staff have had their share of input into the design of the new structure. As a result, the building has been crafted to suit the needs of the services it will house. Sodexho Research and Development made great strides in improving the design for the new dining hall, which includes provisions for made-to-order food stations separated in order to prevent line buildup. Health Services too has helped to cater the design to their specific needs. In the end, all of student services will migrate from Thompson to occupy space in the student union. Public Safety and the Bucstop are slated to remain.

The location of the student union is not random. Given the pivotal role that it will play in student life in the



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# In the Name of God, The Beneficent, The Merciful

# I Am a Muslim

Recently, and especially since R9/11/2001, Islam and Muslims have repeatedly come under attack from many 'men of religion' and others who claim to know more about Islam than the estimated six million Muslims who reside in the United States. These attackers have spread propaganda blaming Islam for the 9/11/01 attacks, even though President Bush repeatedly stated that Islam is not to blame for the terrorist acts, but rather the people who twist the religion to provide an excuse for terrorism

Muslims all over the world share common beliefs, one of which is that Islam is built on five pillars. These five pillars are absolutely essential to the Muslim, and if any single pillar is deficient or missing, then the person is not a true Muslim, until he/she makes up for the deficiency.

The first pillar is Faith, or *Imaan*, in Arabic. Muslims believe in One True God, i.e. the God of Moses, and the God of Abraham, and therefore, the God of Jesus. We Muslims see ourselves, in relation to the Jews and Christians, as the early Christians saw themselves in relation to the Jews. That is, we see ourselves as reformers of the religion of Jesus (and hence the religion of Abraham and Moses also),

just as the early Christians saw themselves as reformers of the religion of Moses. So when one attacker accuses the Holy Quraan as being "strictly a theft of Jewish theology," we understand. It is similar to the Christians' inclusion of the Old Testament in the Bible. Muslims are required to believe in ALL of God's Messengers, from Adam through Moses, Abraham and Jesus, to Muhammad (may God be pleased with them all). We are also required to believe in all of the revealed books, including the Torah. the Bible and of course, the Quraan. We follow the teachings of the Quraan to the exclusion of the others because we believe that the other books have become corrupted with the passage of time. The Quraan also explicitly states that we are to follow the practices (or Sunnah) of Prophet Muhammad (May God be pleased with him).

The second pillar is obligatory prayer. Muslims are required to take time out to converse with God five times a day. This is done firstly through ritual (physical) cleansing, secondly through ritual actions, and thirdly (and most importantly) through concentration and sincerity. For a Muslim, prayer is a time of peace and reflection; a time when the world means nothing and it is just the supplicant and his/her Lord. The Friday post-midday prayer is congregational, where all Muslim males are

required attend the Mosque for that prayer. Females may also attend if they wish, but attending is not required. The Friday prayer (or *Jummah* prayer) contains a sermon delivered by the leader (or *Imaam*), not unlike the sermons of Christian Priests and Jewish Rabbis.

The third pillar is obligatory charity called Zakaat. Muslims are divided into two groups based on his/her financial standing: those who pay the Zakaat and those who receive it. Those Muslims who must pay the Zakaat must give 2.5% of their disposable wealth, which they have kept for one year, to those who are eligible to receive Zakaat. This way, the wealthier someone gets, the more money he or she has to give to the poor. Through this, Islam seeks to close the divide between the wealthiest and the poorest of society, a problem which currently plagues this massively capitalist world.

The fourth pillar is obligatory fasting, or *Saum*, during the Islamic lunar month of *Ramadhaan*. *Ramadhaan* this year is expected to begin on the November 6 or 7, and last for 29 or 30 days, depending on the sighting of the moon. The Muslim fast requires that we stop eating and drinking before dawn and try our best not to sin, while abstaining from food and drink, until sunset. The most difficult part for me personally is trying not to sin. After the first few days, staying away from food and drink isn't very difficult.

The fifth pillar of Islam is the pilgrimage to the Holy City of Makkah, in Saudi Arabia. This pilgrimage (called the *Hajj*) takes place in the month of *Zhul Hijjah* (three months after *Ramadhaan*) and is compulsory upon those who are well, and able to afford the pilgrimage (i.e. debt-free). Every year, millions of pilgrims converge in Makkah to satisfy this requirement. At the end of the pilgrimage, many pilgrims leave with great sadness, begging God to allow them to return to the Holy City once again.

In a nutshell, what we have outlined above are the fundamentals of Islam. According to the American Heritage Dictionary, a fundamentalist is one who adheres to the basic principles of a movement. Therefore, anyone who adheres to the above-mentioned pillars is a fundamentalist. So when someone on television refers to a terrorist as a 'fundamentalist', one can tell that there is an anti-Islamic bias at play. Also, please note that we have not mentioned Jihaad anywhere with respect to the pillars of Islam. Jihaad needs to be discussed in detail. as it is a topic unto itself. If God wills, we will discuss the topic of Jihaad in a later issue.

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


### Fashion Do:


### Gentlemen

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# Barry Author Makes American Library Association's Top Ten

To Manning's most recent romance J novel, Seducing Mr. Heywood, has had great reader reviews. This book, of the traditional Regency romance genre (which take place in the early 1800s), is the sequel to *The Reluctant* Guardian, and bears the basic premise that every man with a fortune is in need of a wife. Jane Austen, one of Manning's mentors in writing this novel, is considered a contemporary writer of the Regency period. Manning was influenced in writing these books by letters she edited from the Washington State University archives in 1971-1972. She has also been published in several anthologies and literary magazines, but never received such magnanimous acclaim.

Making it in Booklist's Top Ten Romances of the Year 2002 is a great honor. It is from this list of top books for the year that libraries across the United States determine which books to purchase for their collection."

"For about a week, I really didn't believe it," said Manning. "I had this great feeling of disbelief."

So far, Seducing Mr. Heywood has received impressive reviews. Despite the fact that many of those who review books have "axes to grind," the on-line critiques of Ms. Manning's romance novel have described the book as "a satisfying and unusual Regency romance" and "a very engaging and elegant read." According to Publisher's Weekly, "the reader is genuinely touched when the once-wayward heroine finally recognizes not only her true soul mate but her real soul."

The essence of traditional Regency romances is that they are not graphic in nature. Rather, they focus more on anticipation and sensual tension, rather than exposing the plot in a manner that appears rather cheap and

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# Columbus Day: Holiday or Holocaust

Barry University conducted business as usual on October 14, 2002, on a 'legal' holiday. President George W. Bush described Columbus in his Proclamation for Columbus Day in 2001 as having a "willingness to brave the unknown," as being "a symbol of the quest for knowledge and understanding of the world," and as having had "great courage." He stated that Columbus' "virtues have been echoed down through history by some of America's greatest pioneers,' and that "the Nation continues to follow the example of Columbus' bold desire."

It is not surprising that George W. Bush would feel this way. After all, white-male America relies heavily upon the mythology surrounding Columbus as a central part of its cultural identity. For generations history books promulgating the white-male ideal have woven tales of the humble son of a Genovese weaver who rose through the ranks to become an Italian Sea Captain, and his 'superior white male intellect' that allowed him to know that the world was round. He is America's 'first hero.'

While the rest of the world believed that the world was flat and one risked falling into an abyss filled with sea dragons and other horrible creatures, Columbus set out to sail around it. Even his crew (if you believe the myth) grew increasingly mutinous because they were fearful that they would fall off the edge.

Unfortunately, this, like almost every other detail about Columbus that we were taught as children, is a LIE! The truth of the matter is that there were very few people who believed in 1492 that the world was flat. Native Americans drew pictures

of the earth casting a round shadow on the moon, and sailors recorded that the world was round because ships disappeared over the horizon, hull first, then sails. The myth of Columbus proving the world was round was not even popularized until 1828 when Washington Irving wrote his biography. In other words, Columbus proved the world was round nearly 400 years after his voyage – now that's impressive.

As for the so-called mutiny, it was actually Columbus who was growing fearful and wanted to turn around. His crew had to convince him to keep

There were at least four prior discoveries of America before Columbus, and there may have been as many as 15. The first discovery was obviously made by the inhabitants of the land when Columbus arrived. Sometime between 70,000 -12,000BC those people arrived in what we now call Alaska. They are believed to have come from Siberia. The first of these discoveries was when these people traveled to present day Canada and New Mexico. This occurred sometime between 10,000 and 600 BC. The strongest evidence to support this is the striking similarities of the Navajos and Crees cultures and how they differ from other Indian

The second of these discoveries was also made by the communists in Russia. That's right; there is further evidence to support the people of Siberia landed on American soil long before Columbus. This time they traveled across the Bering Sea to Alaska (sometime around 9000 BC).

The third discovery was made by the Afro-Phoenicians. Evidence supports their traveling to Central America, Canary Islands, and the Great Lake regions. Statues of Negroid and Caucasoid likeness were discovered in Central America. One famous discovery of such statues was made in 1914, when two Ancient Egyptian Style statues (of what are now believed to be Osiris and Isis) were located in Mayan ruins in Acajutla, Mexico. Also, recent tests on Egyptian mummies have provided evidence of cocaine and nicotine use (plants found only in the Western Hemisphere).

There are Egyptian legends of trips to the 'mythical' land of Punt (which is located in the Great Lakes region of the United States).

The fourth discovery, and the second most well known discovery, was made by the Vikings. They traveled from Greenland and Iceland to Labrador. Baffin Land, Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, Cape Cod, and possibly even further south between the years of 986 - 1350. The first Norse to travel to America was Bjarni Herjolfsso in 986. Later, Thorfinn and Gudrid Karlsefni led a party of 65, 165, or 265 homesteaders equipped with livestock and supplies to settle Vineland in 1005. This trip was not an isolated incident. The Norse were still exploring land in Labrador 350 years later. In fact, Columbus most likely learned of their discovery when he visited Iceland in 1477, several years before his voyage to the new world in 1492.

Columbus' first voyage to the Americas isn't an example of virtue, contrary to what we may think. On his first voyage, Columbus kidnapped a mere 25 Natives (the exact number is not known, as only 7 or 8 survived

the trip). On his second voyage, he came equipped with the necessary tools (i.e. cannons, crossbows, guns, cavalry, and attack dogs) to provide us with a better example. He demanded food, gold, spun cotton, and sex from the Arawaks. If they resisted, he and his men would cut off the ears or nose of an Indian. He would then send the disfigured victim back to their village as an example of disobedience. Males age 14 and up were forced into slavery to mine for gold and other valuables. Females were turned into sex slaves at a young age. When the Arawaks tried to fight back, Columbus declared war. According to Barry Lopez, author of The Rediscovery of North America, the Spaniards hunted Indians for sport. In one day alone, the Spanish are believed to have beheaded, dismembered, or raped at least 3000 Arawaks. Upon Columbus' second arrival there were approximately 400,000 Arawaks. By 1500, only 300 remained.

The most common argument I hear for the continuation of the celebration of Columbus Day is: 'I Don't Want to Lose a Holiday from Work.' It seems that we as Americans have no problem elevating Christopher Columbus to such a high rank that only one other man (Martin Luther King Jr. - who was a peaceful liberator of people) enjoys the status. I am not trying to take a much earned paid day off away from you; I would never do such a thing. All I am saying is that I believe we could find someone (at least I hope so) who is much more deserving of such a prestigious honor.

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# ELS: Teaching English to the World

mong all the classrooms, the Apsychology department and the Barry Buccaneer, the first floor is also home to the ELS Language Centers. Many international students are aware of this program and its location; however, they have yet to gain campus wide recognition. This program, whose mission is to teach English to foreign students, is actual-

ly a world renowned English learning center.

Established in Washington D.C in 1961, the ELS program has taught English to millions of students from over 140 countries. In its 40 years, ELS has become the world's largest network of English instruction. Fourteen years ago, Barry University became one of the many universities across the world to opens its arms to this program. Originally located in the ACE building, the ELS center is now

stationed Library 109.

When a foreign student decides to enroll in this program they are given numerous options of which specific program they would like. They can choose to study at one center close to home, or study overseas. Once the location is fixed, they can choose whether to take an intensive program, which is 30 to 50 minute lessons per week for a period of four weeks, or they can choose the semi intensive program which consists of 20 to 50 minute lessons per week for a period of four weeks. The program the student chooses will depend on how much time they would like to dedicate in exploring their surroundings. Electives are also provided for those who would like to customize their English choices.

Zeva Soroker is the international student advisor for this program and is usually visible from the moment you walk into the office. She is there to help the students enrolled, but also, anyone who would like to receive information about the program. Street has been with the ELS program before it was offered at Barry University, and for the past 14 years has been a part of its history. 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# Putting a Face on the Issue

For me, it's Ned.

Given the disturbing bigotry evident in an oddly titled article in the September 2002 edition of Buccaneer ("The Battle for Miami-Dade,"), we might ask whether Dade accepts last month's vote to defeat 'Question 14' and reaffirm the Miami-Dade Human Rights Ordinance. Or, will we succumb to the continued agitation of those like Eladio Armesto and Nathaniel Wilcox (spokesmen for Take Back Miami, demanding the vote nullified). Whether we go on tolerating Armesto and Wilcox's intolerance might come down to whether we can put a face on the issue. For me, that face is a friend I knew in graduate school.

Ned was active for human rights at Cornell University. Southern, White, and soft-spoken, Ned became quite loud when the question of his humanity was at stake. Once I befriended him, my support for gay rights became more concrete.

That's not surprising: after all, the civil rights movement gained much momentum from the debate over desegregation begun by reaction to the 1896 Plessy V Ferguson, and continued by more positive judicial decisions such as 1954 Brown v Board of Ed of Topeka Kansas. These and other cases involving the 14th amendment (which guarantees citizens "equal protection of the laws") ended the veneer of legal support for 'separate but equal' public accommodations. Once White Americans interacted with Blacks, they were able to put a face on Jim Crow laws, racial discrimination, and horrific crimes of lynching and torture committed daily against Blacks under segregation. These crimes were bred by the dehumanizing atmosphere of legal discrimination and were rampant in America prior to civil rights.

The civil rights movement wouldn't have succeeded without white support—King knew this. With the support of White Americans within Catholic, Protestant, and Jewish religious organizations (such as Barry's own Dominican order), King employed the tactic of civil disobedience, leading protestors into direct confrontation with racist civil authorities, as Gandhi had done in India. As King anticipated, Blacks were beaten on television, and so were Catholics, Protestants, and Jews who stood with them. Seeing fire hoses turned on innocent, Black school children on TV, America had to suddenly put a human face on Southern racism. They didn't like what they saw. The Streets of New York

Because of my friendship with Ned I decided to spend time in NYC in the early 90's volunteering to help the gay/lesbian advocacy group, 'ACT UP' respond to an epidemic of bigots' attacks. I came to think of these bigots as 'night walkers' (a parallel, in my mind, to the 'night riders' who had intimidated, beaten, tortured, and killed Blacks during the Jim Crow years). Volunteers walked Greenwich Village armed with walkie-talkies to protect gays and lesbians. One night several men with baseball bats attacked me and other volunteers. Screaming anti-gay insults, they tried to break my skull, not because of the color of my skin, but because they assumed that I was gay. Luckily, the police intervened. But not before I saw the hateful, cruel faces of my attackers.

The Face of Bigotry

I can't help but put those faces onto the frequent and vicious crimes against gays that fill the news. One of the little-mentioned facts during the local debates over Gay rights before the Sept 10 vote, was just how frequent and brutal are attacks on gay and lesbian Americans. The human rights ordinance protects gays and lesbians from discrimination motivated by ignorance and intolerance, but also by-let's admit it-a pervasive atmosphere of hatred and dehumanization; the same atmosphere that Blacks have to live under.

Governor Bush's recent homophobic remarks about Rilya Wilson's foster parents, uttered to a gathering of North Florida legislators, betrays this still unexamined bigotry, but there is even more sinister evidence: Mathew Shepard fatally beaten and

tied to a fence in Wyoming; a gay man beaten, kicked in the face-and-head nearly 30 times until dead by his attackers right in West Palm Beach; a gay Black man beaten in W. Virginia, then repeatedly run over with a car. Some might wonder how anyone, from the governor of our state down to those thugs in West Palm Beach, could say and do such things; but I think of the faces I saw in NYC, faces of average Americans who don't think the 14th amendment should include people they wouldn't want to live next to, people who they happen to fear, or irrationally despise, or even wish to attack; people like Ned.

I'm not surprised by the recent religious conservatism being displayed by a minority among Dade's Black clergy. Black people can be bigots, too: they call for gays to be deprived of legal protection from housing, job, and financial discrimination-in short, a suspension of the 14th amendment. These conservative Blacks are a minority: Marleine Bastien, executive director of Haitian Women of Miami, Inc., and Congresswoman Carrie Meek, publicly called for a 'no' vote on 'question 14'.

Still, I lately have the uneasy feeling, like whites must have felt during heated debates over desegregation in the civil rights era, that religious conservatives wish to push me into a corner where I'd have to choose between loyalty to my race and loyalty to human rights. Well, if it comes to that, the choice will be simple. I choose Ned.

# Has the Force Left Them?

A View on Star Wars Episode II

### Visual Effects

While A New Hope featured groundbreaking effects for its day, those visuals by today's standards are fairly tame. The Empire Strikes Back and Return of the Jedi demonstrated gigantic leaps in visual effects technology. The important thing here however isn't quality, but quantity.

Massive and detailed effects sequences were crucial to the success of the original trilogy, but by no means were visual effects integrated into those films at the extent they are today. Much of the older trilogy was filmed among physical sets and onlocation backdrops. Cut to production of these new films thirty years later and find actors giving the great majority of their performances in front of blue screens. In fact, for The Phantom Menace, in upwards of 95% of the movie's shots contained digital effects. So what is the result of the dominating presence of computer generated imagery? Entire scenes are now so saturated with digital eye candy that it becomes nearly impossible to suspend disbelief. Onlookers are bombarded with shot after shot of vast artificially generated cityscapes, backdrops, and bustling environments so packed with detail that even



their creators say they can't take in Even the climaxes themselves don't everything in a dozen viewings. The seem to be without their flaws. overall feel of these films is extremely busy, in stark contrast to the much simpler and uncomplicated look and feel of the older movies. The Phantom Menace and Attack of the Clones simply rely far too heavily on visual effects to tell their stories.

# Storytelling

It's no secret by now that the two latest Star Wars flicks did not contain the most compelling storylines. So what's going on here? Unlike the almost perfectly written The Empire Strikes Back, which featured plot developments and twists of all kinds to keep the audience engaged, Menace and Clones seem to meander around for the longest while, sometimes picking up a new character or location along the way, before getting to the heart of what each film is supposed to be about. The result is a pretty boring first hour

and forty minutes before the real meat of the story kicks in and the movie finally takes off.

Looking at the final sequences of Menace and Clones in retrospect, it seems almost like Lucas is striving to "wow" his audience with something that we have not seen before and that will blow us away. In The Phantom Menace, evildoer Darth Maul wielded his double-bladed lightsaber unlike anything Star Wars fans had ever seen. In a huge crowd-pleasing spectacle in Attack of the Clones, the traditionally conservative Master Yoda went medieval on his former pupil turned bad guy. Why does George now feel that he has to hit us with something new all the time? He's had the right formula for quite a while now, after all.

coming years, the question of location poses interesting answers. "I believe anyone and everyone who exists within the confines of Barry's gates should be held accountable for taking action against all forms of discrimination," says Branker. "This campus is Photo By: Carlos Camacho diverse and we need trained profession-



als who know how to deal with issues of diversity and of discrimination."

Mercedes Washington, also a Voice of Redemption, believes "discrimination is alive and kicking on this campus."

"Everyone knows it, and administrators are getting antsy because there is a collective of concerned people who are serious about eradicating it." Washington said. "There are students who are actively and vocally holding them accountable for not doing their jobs completely."

She goes on to say that Barry isn't living up to its Dominican tradition completely because it overlooks the equality it prides itself in promoting.

"Where is the office for employees to complain when they are discriminated against?" she asks. "There is no office for discourse like this, yet this is something deemed necessary by the federal government."

One of the missions of Voices of Redemption is to promulgate that these issues can be attacked by first admitting their existence. To remediate to these problems, according to Branker, Barry's community needs to "recognize and legitimize them."

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

An 8-6 record (as of October 13) is not bad for most teams, but Barry University's women's volleyball team is not most

"It's been a little bit of a struggle," says coach Dave Nichols. "We've had some bad luck because of injuries. There's a lot of talent on this team and we've played a difficult schedule, but we haven't gelled yet."

The team's disappointing record is definitely not for lack of effort. Out of their six losses, four have come against top 10 (NCAA Division II) ranked opponents. Mental lapses, player movement, bad luck, and injuries have hurt the team. The mental lapses give them a feeling as though "we've beaten ourselves," says Nichols. They lost four seniors after last year's championship season.

"It wasn't just their quality of play, it was the knowledge of systems, it was the energy that they brought, and we haven't quite replaced that," says Nichols. "That's always an ongoing thing. You hope by the end of the year that you can replace that. Another part of that is one of our best players has redshirted this year. That hurt a lot."

Redshirting, which everyone hears about in college football, is the process by which a player sits out a year (perhaps to learn the team's system, or for personal reasons) without losing a year of NCAA eligibility. Also a stinging point is that one of the team's co-captains, senior Rochelle Magill, had shoulder surgery in August.

"She's playing back-row, but she's still not going all the way around and she is one of the better players in our conference. We miss her. When she comes back, we feel

that maybe those games that we've been losing by close margins...I think she'll make a big difference when we see those same opponents.'


Spiking for Greatness

[all] people can speak." In Israel, Levy and Scabini did not know each other but they heard of each other and played against each other.




