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# Commuting Residents: The Worst of Both Worlds



Parking and transportation isn't just a commuter's concern. Residents in Holly House have had to deal with transportation and parking problems since the first day of school. Holly House, the gated dorm complex for Barry upper-class students is about a 15-minute walk along busy Northeast 2nd Avenue. And then there's the shortage of automatic gate openers. Senior Ryan O'Donnell lives in a corner apartment near the gate and gets calls as late as 2:30 a.m. from students asking him to click them inside.

"I can do it from my bed, so I just roll over and click the gate open for them," said O'Donnell, "I don't mind. I'll do my part."

Approximately 700 new students were accepted this year, a record, according to Assistant Director of Housing and Residence Life Damion Martells. With the expected flood of new residents, Barry closed the deal on the new dorm complex in February. The majority of the tenants living there didn't leave until their leases expired around the end

three months to prepare the building for students.

Most residents agree that they like the spacious rooms, kitchen areas and community pool at Holly House. Despite this, a growing list of problems is taking place, including the unreliable wireless internet and four dryers will accommodate

of May, giving Barry a little over the 150 student residents, just like the shortage of gate openers.

> The clicker shortage "was an inherited issue" from the previous owners, explained Martells.

> "The total amount that was given to us was approximately 60, one per unit," he said.

Although students with gate and skepticism that four washers openers are usually happy to help a stranded peer, some clicker-less students decide to just park on the street.

"You'll see 10-12 cars still parked in the grass because there are a lot of people that still don't have [clickers]," O'Donnell said.

This concerned Holly House resident Romel Marseille.

"People could easily steal something from your car just because you didn't have a clicker," he said.

Students without clickers were "asked to park at the main campus and take the shuttle," said Martells from ResLife.

The shipment of clickers eventually did arrive, and according to Residence Coordinator Erica Granoff, everyone who registered for a clicker has received one. Yet, there is still another concern for Holly House students: The commute to school. These students are in the middle; they live off the main campus, yet pay for the comfort of being in a dorm close to school.

Many are uneasy about the fourblock walk to and from Barry. Rumors run rampant about assaults on students around campus and by

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# SGA Plans for Image Improvement, Helping Students

Junior Chad Bell paced around the Student Government office, handing out flyers to students while sending important e-mails on his BlackBerry and conducting a news interview.

"Come in. Come in," said Bell energetically to students passing by.

During the Second Floor (2R) Landon Open House on September 9, the mood was chaotic.

Bell, a second-year senator on the SGA council, is at the forefront of an effort to change SGA's image among the student body.

"This year, our goal is to make sure a spotlight is put on Student Government in the university. I want us to be more out there, more open, more viewable," said Bell.

SGA serves as the voice for the students, proposing and implementing changes, such as introducing recycling to campus dorms and making laundry free for campus residents.

Despite these noteworthy changes, many students on campus still ask: What does SGA do?

"I don't feel like SGA does anything for the campus. I don't even know who our representatives are," said sophomore Kwamain Williams. "I know who CAB is because they're always doing something for the school. I see them all the time with their flyers and T-shirts."

Campus Activities Board (CAB) organizes a variety of events at Barry, from comedy shows to dances, including the annual Glo party held the beginning of every fall semester.

Junior Roodelyne Davilmar, secretary of SGA, said the problem is poor communication between SGA and students.

"It's kind of disappointing to hear that. But, we were on campus last year," said Davilmar. "We did have posters out. We were on the web. I just think students sometimes put all the blame on SGA, but they don't try to find us. People just need to understand it is a two-way street."

Goals for SGA include more affordable meal plans for commuters and free printing in the computer lab and in the library.

"I'm tired of paying for the printing at the computer lab. I'm tired of paying for the printing at library. They're stealing from us," said Bell.

Hernan Londono, associate CIO and director of the Division of Information Technology (DoIT) believes it is not uncommon for students at universities to have to pay for printing.

"In the past, we did have free

# Letter From the Editor



In recent semesters, Barry has been experiencing dramamtic increases in student enrollment. A seemingly positive occurance, there are many underlying issues involved, such as parking accommodations and classroom and dormitory infrastructure.

Housing and Residence Life (ResLife) announced plans last semester to alter the housing situation on campus to where upper-class students would have to seek housing off-campus, with or without the assistance of ResLife. This semester, students are dormed in a variety of locations near the Barry campus, including houses across the street from Kolasa Hall, Garner, Northeast 2nd Avenue and the Holly House apartment complex on Northeast 2nd Avenue and 119th Street.

While there are many concerns involving these off-campus housings, *The Barry Buccaneer* wanted to specifically focus on the students living in Holly House.

As The Barry Buccaneer sent writer Kateah Herrera to investigate the new housing situation, we initially expected to find students who would be thoroughly upset with the situation at Holly House. Through interviews, reporting and researching, we discovered the truth, and are happy to report it to you. To our surprise, we found many students generally happy with the accommodations and setup, although some problems are detracting from this experience. For example, some apartments are still not wired for the internet, aggravating students, particularly those who take online classes. Complaints have been filed, but the issue has not been resolved.

Other pecularities include the non-student residents who still live at Holly House. While the majority left when their leases expired, a few still remain. How do these residents feel about living in a complex filled with college students? How do the students feel? Is there any reason to be concerned for either party?

Many students have opted to not take part in Barry's meal plan,

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preferring to shop and cook for their own meals. For those who did not purchase a meal plan, the dorms at Holly House cost students \$4,102, or about \$1,000 a month. While South Florida real estate is notorious for exorbitant prices, doesn't \$1,000 for a one-bedroom, one-bathroom apartment seem a bit steep considering the area? It seems exorbitant that two roommates are having to each pay \$1,000 for off-campus housing yet are not really experiencing the benefits of it.

A reason students choose to live on campus is for the convinience. For some, living on campus is preferable to fighting traffic, spending money on gas and struggling to find a parking space. So why are the Holly House residents having to drive to school?

As Kateah reported, many residents still drive to school, even though they technically have campus housing, which is just adding to the overwhelming parking situation, as evidenced by the long rows of cars parked

along 115th Street.

Feedback from the student body is that ResLife forced upper-class students off campus, yet are not making the transition easy.

To end on a positive note, at least these students are generally happy with the accomodations. But it would be nice to have internet access.


According to Matthew Cameron, director of Housing and Residence Life, the plans for new resident housing for Barry students are still in their initial stages.

"The construction of new residence halls is not set in stone by any means," Cameron wrote.

Housing and Residence Life looks at the future as a foundation for potential growth for both housing and the university in general, such as the opportunity of changing the resident/commuter ratio and offering housing for graduate students.

In explaining the recent progress of the new housing plans, Cameron emphasizes the vast array of parties involved, such as a new committee whose single focus is to work on the proposals involved, and a team of contractors to address the technical aspects of the proposal.

Not making any promises, Cameron wrote that "the idea is that the halls would be built for the Fall 2011 academic year."

# **New Dean Brings Worldly Experiences to Barry**

The new dean of the Andreas School of Business brings a plethora of experiences from just down the road to the opposite end of the hemisphere.

Dr. Tomislav Mandakovic was dean of the College of Business Administration at Universidad Diego Portales in Santiago, Chile. He came to Miami for a visit in 1983 and decided to stay. He comes to Barry from the Chapman Graduate Business School at Florida International University (FIU), where he was an associate dean.

Mandakovic said he sees many similarities between the 39,000-plus student population at FIU and the significantly smaller student population at Barry.

"If you were to plug your ears and just observe the people around you, you would find no difference," he said. "The languages spoken may be different, but the people, wherever you go, dress and act alike."

His international experience was one of the qualities that stood out to Provost Dr. Linda Peterson.

"He has broad experience and ties to local and international communities," said Dr. Peterson. Diana Alexandra Rodriguez worked as Mandakovic's assistant at FIU for almost a year and described him as a natural leader.

"He always challenged me to perform better," she said in reference to her job. "Tomi was a valuable boss. More than being a boss, he was a listener and a leader with very high expectations about himself and his team."


Mandakovic, a father of four and grandfather of six, said he was drawn to Barry because of the way the university incorporates ethics into the classroom, which, in his opinion, is an important aspect of education.

"People with ethics have long-term visions and long-term goals," said Dr. Mandakovic.

When asked about what changes he will be making to the Andreas School of Business, he said he was still in the process of deciding.

"I am not sure what changes will be made, but yes, there will be change," said Dr. Mandakovic.

One thing he would like to see is more interaction between students and faculty. And to promote this concept, Dr. Mandankovic says his door is always open.

#### Clubs

#### Restaurant/Bars

# Barry Baseball Focuses Beyond the Game

Barry's prestigious baseball program, which signed four seniors to the major leagues this summer, attracts freshmen athletes and transfer students who hope to get recruited by the pros. But seniors Charley Short and Brian Santana say the team's recent successes were only part of the reason they chose to play ball at Barry.

Short, from Miami-Dade College, and Santana, from Florida International University, transferred to Barry their junior year after recognizing Barry's balance and commitment to academics, community and sports, stemming from their first impression of their future coach Marc Pavao.

Apart from a demanding schedule filled with daily workouts, drills and games, Short, Santana and their teammates find the time to give back to the community. Short, who was also recruited by Oral Roberts University in Tulsa, Oklahoma, chose Barry because of the generous scholarships.


"The coach and university inform you of the funds available to the student athlete," said Short.

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the Exxon station across the street from Holly House. Marseille, a senior sports management major, says that after his class ends at 9 p.m., "I wouldn't walk home; I'd rather have a friend pick me up."

Residents can call for the Shuttle Buc service from 8 p.m. to 4 a.m. every day as well as call Public Safety for an escort when they feel unsafe.


Some Holly House residents, like Laura Yatarola, would like to see a shuttle during the daylight hours as well. She doesn't mind the walking, but she would like to see more security guards on Northeast 2nd Avenue, "or maybe one that stays at

Although there is no place to station a security guard at Holly House, Martells assures that there is a new post for Public Safety in St. Catherine, the off-campus dorms across the street from Barry on Northeast 2nd Avenue. It will lend additional security support along with the bike patrol that pedals from campus to Holly House.

Even after the new shipment of clickers came, Yatarola noticed that someone was "breaking the switch so the gate stays open." Martells from ResLife explains that Public Safety is responsible for fixing the gate, but that students need to make safe choices as well.


She also contributed on both sides of the field, playing a great defense and an even better offense.


"I'm majoring in Spanish because I love to learn new languages and about other cultures," said Wolfer.
