

BU baseball pitcher arrested on marijuana charges

Police: Zachary Jackson had 70 grams of marijuana

One of Barry's baseball pitchers, Zachary Jackson, was arrested Jan. 24 on campus on charges of possession with intent to distribute marijuana.

The Miami Shores Police Department found 70 grams of marijuana in a jar on the floor of his car, which was parked in front of Flood Hall, according to the arrest affidavit.

The marijuana was bagged separately in three Ziploc bags, along with packaging material and packages of rolling papers and pipes, the arrest affidavit said.

Jackson told police that he sold

marijuana in half-once Ziploc bags and had recently "re-upped." The arrest affidavit said he made that statement to "explain the quantity of marijuana discovered."

Jackson was removed from the baseball roster. Baseball coach Mark Marc Pavao declined to be interviewed. Athletic Director Michael Covone said he could not comment on "student issues." Dean of Students Maria Alvarez also declined to comment. Jackson's status at Barry was unclear.

Joe Rodgers, former photo editor of The Barry Buccaneer, was also arrested on charges of marijuana possession on the same day as Jackson. Rodgers said he was unaware of Jackson's arrest.

"Who is that?" said Rodgers when asked if he knew Jackson. Rodgers has resigned from The BUC.

Jackson posted a \$5000 bond and was released from jail. Jackson was a resident of Flood hall. Housing and Residence Life director Matthew Cameron said he could not speak on "students academic records with other students or anyone for that matter."

Jackson could not be reached for a comment. His attorney, David Kotler declined to speak specifically about this case but provided some information about the general nature of the case.

"Just because it's a student, it's not treated any differently," said Kotler. "Normally in drug cases, the defendant will have to complete a program or the case is dropped or probation. Nine out of ten times, the defendant will plead not guilty at the arraignment, then it proceeds to trial, then the charges might be dropped or [the defendant] will argue legal motions." He said it could be a year before a case goes to trial.

Jackson ended up signing a written plea of not guilty.

Four graduating classes return to Barry

Students of now and then joined forces to celebrate the past and look towards the future

This year, for the first time in almost a decade, classes of 1963, 1983, 2003 and 2008 were invited back to Barry for a reunion from Feb. 22-24.

For the last five to 10 years, only the 50-year classes have been celebrated, until Elizabeth Reed, associate vice president for alumni relations and annual giving, took the opportunity to expand the reunions.

"We're starting slowly," said Reed. "We're seeing how popular this is. In the future we hope to include many more classes."

An expensive event to host, this year's events came from a collaboration of efforts from Sarah Herald, vice president for institutional advancement and external affairs, and Scott Smith, vice president for student affairs. The alumni looked back on their personal histories, and took guided tours to the archives displaying photographs and memorabilia of their college experiences.

The largest event, on the night of Feb. 23, was a presidential reception in the health and sports center, where Sister Linda Bevilacqua, OP, PhD 1962, addressed the attendees. Alumni celebrating 50-year anniversaries were each awarded a gold medallion.

Other events included an opera performance by students and a tour of the new art exhibit at the Gato Gallery by Tom Rockwell, associate professor of graphic design.

Planning was done by members of the 1963 class. Sandra Southmayd, Annette Nolte and Patricia Fox MacLaughlin ensured the events were best suited to their classmates.

"We planned this around what we thought they would like," said Southmayd.

Excited to see her classmates, Southmayd proclaims the weekend reunion was "a very wonderful and reminiscent experience."

The invite extended to graduates from any of the eight branches of the university, so some visitors will actually be seeing the Miami Shores campus for the first time. Some 70 percent of Barry's alumni live in Florida, but some traveled from states like New York and Chicago.

Southmayd, studied education and physical education, during which she was elected to the Student Council, today's Student Government Association.

"This gave me a wonderful experience in a leadership role which carried me on throughout my entire career," said Southmayd.

Annette Nolte, co-chair of the reunion and 1963 graduate anticipated seeing former classmates, some of whom she hadn't seen in 50 years.

"[It was a] once in a lifetime experience," said Nolte.

Another alum is Adrienne Vazquez, a member of the Alumni Association's board of directors. She studied nursing at undergraduate and graduate level and is class of 2005 and 2010.

She received nomination for Homecoming Queen in 2004, when Homecoming was also centered around basketball.

"[Homecoming] is a lot of fun and a great idea. It should ignite a lot of school spirit," said Vazquez.

Student leaders helped unite Barry's past and present.

"[Student leaders] allowed alumni to see what our current students are like and the sort of programs they are involved in. [The alumni] really enjoy asking and seeing what they're up to," said Reed.

FIU and UM students have to pay more than Barry students for parking

Students constantly complain about parking fees but at other universities, students have to pay more.

It's been a good school year for parking, according to George Wilhelm, director of public safety. He said there has not been an increase of the usual amount of parking tickets nor a large amount of complaints from students and faculty.

Yet, students find themselves

or not placing their registered decal. The payment of these fees goes to Barry's public safety budget. Last school year of 2011-2012 public safety had a revenue of \$71,765 and for fall 2012 they gained \$40,226, according to Lena Mercea, associate vice president for budget and supply chain management.

Student parking fees at FIU are additional payments added to their tuition, even if the student does not own a car. FIU computer engineering senior Christopher Lopez paid for two years of parking although his mom was dropping him off during that time.

"FIU charges us up the nose for parking and fails to address the parking issue we've had on campus for years. The rates keep getting higher, but no new parking is added with each passing year," said Lopez.

Three years ago, UM changed their parking system, according to junior psychology major Jessica Canosa.

"I wish ours were free! The fees are a bit over-priced because we are restricted to parking in certain locations," said Canosa.

Students at UM have colorcoordinated parking lots and their permits dictate where they must park. Students sign up for those designated areas, but may be wait-listed for spots that are closest to the classroom buildings. Some locations are coveted and may take years to get the perfect spot, such as parking lot areas under "Red".

To avoid these issues of paying a fine, there are students at Barry who come early to find parking. "Not only is traffic bad in the morning, but I am not fighting over a parking space. No way is that on my to-do list so early in the morning," said senior English major Gabriella Coro.

Students at Barry can take the advice from senior Coro and come earlier to school to snatch a good spot avoiding an improper parking ticket. Following public safety rules and regulations will avoid unnecessary charges that any college student is not interested in paying.

Chavez sparks mixed emotions for Venezuelans Health, power and future ride on Chavez's return

Venezuelan students this month were keeping an eye on the health of President Hugo Chavez, who missed his inauguration ceremony on Jan. 10 because he was still in Cuba recovering from cancer surgery.

But not all of them were hoping for his quick recovery.

"I'm happy that he is sick," said Elizabeth Gosein-Vasquez, a senior political science major.

Some observers have questioned whether Chavez had violated the constitution by not taking the oath of office on time and opposition leaders even called for new elections.

"Proper elections need to be held in Venezuela and someone else needs to come to power," said Gosein-Vasquez. "Chavez took the rights of the people."

Chavez has been in power since 1999. Many Venezuelans who fled the country after he took power bitterly oppose him.

"[Chavez] has been playing with the country since day one. That is the reason why I'm in the United States," said Lourdes Zabala, a senior criminal justice major. "My parents worked for the petroleum industry and they saw no positive future for Venezuelans."

Chavez won re-election in October but was forced to go to Havana after his cancer came back in December. Venezuelan government officials say the president is feeling better and has returned to Venezuela. Non-Venezuelan Barry students also

watched the news in Venezuela closely.

"I have close family friends who live in Venezuela and they fear for their lives and the lives of their family every day," said David Zaret, a senior political science major. "I think his lack of visibility had a lot Venezuelans nervous. We will have to see what happens, but sometimes people put up with someone because they know them and how they rule versus the unknown of a new ruler."

Like the opposition, Zabala does not trust the government officials in her homeland.

"The men working with him are not going to give up their power," said Zabala. "Chavez's people are going to continue to stay in power."

Like many Venezuelans, Zabala dreams of a better future for the country.

"My dream is to be able to go back to Venezuela and walk down the streets without worrying about people trying to rob me, be able to get in a taxi and make sure that I'm getting home safe without the taxi man taking me somewhere else," said Zabala. "Venezuela is a very wealthy country and I wish one day the wealth could flourish like it used to before Chavez took office." Compiled by Khadine Baksh EDITOR IN CHIEF

Top car insurance companies give B+ students A+ discounts

Progressive, Geico and State Farm offer discounts to students with a minimum 3.0 GPA

If you thought owning a new car was too expensive because of the insurance--think again. Students are able to save up to 75 percent on their car insurance if they qualify for certain discounts.

State Farm offers the Good Student, Multi-Car and Good Driving discounts to students that qualify. Students can also complete the Steer Clear and Defensive Driving programs for more discounts. All of these can lead up to a total savings of up to 75 percent, according to State Farm agent Debbie Dell.

A student must have a good driving record to qualify for any

of the discounts. Students with a minimum 3.0 GPA can get the Good Student discount, according to Dell.

"I have been with State Farm for a few years and I've had the Good Student discount for a number of years and it has saved me a few bucks," said Ashante Richard, a senior biology major.

Although Richard receives discounts, she believes that the insurance company is unfair.

"I don't believe that they are trying their hardest. I don't understand why my deductible should increase so much for minor traffic infractions," said Richard.

She received a traffic ticket resulting in a \$100 increase in her policy premium. Receiving a ticket automatically prevents her from getting the Good Driving, Defensive Driving and the Steer Clear Program discounts.

Progressive, another leading car insurance company, is also helping students keep money in their wallets with its own set of discounts, including E-Sign, Snapshot, Pay-in-Full and Good Grades.

Progressive is drawing more students in with the new Snapshot discount. This is a mobile device that is installed in the vehicle for six months tracking your daily driving habits. The device records the number of miles driven, how often you break suddenly and how often you drive between midnight and 4 a.m. Progressive tracks these habits which can help students save up to 30 percent on a policy, said Progressive agent Margera Rudolfo.

The E-Sign discount is another program that Progressive offers. Once signed up, students no longer receive their statements through the mail. By opting for them online, Progressive saves paper and students receive a small discount.

"Having the E-Sign discount saves me 10 percent on my insurance along with other student discounts," said Erica Montanez, a freshman biology major.

Geico also has a few student discounts but does not offer as many as Progressive or State Farm. In order to receive the Good Driver discount, you must have an unblemished driving record for five years. Like State Farm, Geico also requires students to maintain a "B" average. Slip into C territory and say good-bye to your discount.

The only other discounts that Geico offers are the Multi-airbag discounts and discounts for people involved in an organization that is sponsored by Geico, said agent Mario Suerias.

Even with minimal discounts, students seem to be pleased with Geico's services and prices.

"The only way that my rate goes up is if I were to receive a ticket," said Lydia Nimako, a senior political science major.

Congress avoided another recession, but will students?

Although the fiscal cliff has been avoided, students may see changes in government funding, again

The United States Congress acted to pass legislation to avoid a global recession, but government funded education programs may be at risk.

The U.S. government budgets part of its revenue based on an authorized borrowing limit known as the debt ceiling or debt limit, according to the U.S. Department of the Treasury website. The debt ceiling has been extended for three months, which will allow America to pay bills such as defense, education and entitlement programs.

If the debt ceiling is not met, monetary changes for government funded programs are possible.

"If no agreement occurs, then yes, there will be impacts to student financial aid for 2013-2014. What the exact impact to higher education will be is also difficult to filter through the political fog," said Dart Humeston, director of financial aid in an email interview.

Financial aid is continually working to understand the changes happening.

"The management team of the financial aid office has been following this situation closely and the best information we have currently comes from Mr. Arne Duncan, The U.S. Secretary of Education who spoke recently. In his speech he indicated that there would be some cuts to the Federal Work Study Program and the Federal SEOG program, as well as possible delays in processing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)," said Humeston.

Many students, may be forced to make alternative plans to pursue higher education and manage their financial plan.

"I would have to go to a lower cost school and move closer to home. Even considering taking out loans since I have tried to avoid that," said Maura Johnson, senior social work major.

There are many ways students can help themselves prepare for the changes.

"First, don't panic. There will always be changes when it comes to federal funding, some good and some not so good. Second, complete the FAFSA accurately and quickly. Third, if you do not know who your federal senators and congresspersons are, you need to find out now. Write them an old fashion paper letter (as Graphic by Susan Dorta

well as electronic) to voice your opinion on this matter," said Humeston.

Students hold the power to make a difference on the financial aid situation.

"If more students become involved in expressing their views to their elected officials it could make a real difference. Anyone can locate their elected representatives online," said Humeston.

Another way to prepare for the changes is to work on a savings account.

"In order to be prepared for what's ahead, students should become involved in the political process and contribute more to their savings accounts," said Tesia Schwarz, senior international business major.





Delgado was then offered to play two years in a junior college in Nebraska on a full scholarship, and then moved to play with Barry's Buccaneers again on a full scholarship.

Delgado is planning to apply to med school when she graduates. She has been offered to play at a pro level in Puerto Rico for Las Leonas de Ponce, but Delgado decided to stay in Miami and finish her education.

Delgado is very driven by her parents and everything they have done for her to help her get where she is now.




After signing up for the race, you are directed to pick up a race package the day before.
