A broken vending machine improper use of the emergency exits, ruined furniture, and many more issues have continued to damage Dominican Hall

Vandalism charges are split between the number of students living in the area of the incidence.
"The charges are typically split amongst the students, not per student. So as an example, if it was $\$ 214$, it's $\$ 214$ divided by the number of students in that space," said four-year Resident Coordinator Tatiana Webster.
Around 4 am . on Feb. 22, residents came into Dominican and noticed the damages to the lounge on the second floor. "It was [also) the night of that big party across the street. We were coming to hang out in the lounge and we saw the vending machine just hanging on the chair and there was glass
everywhere. We saw blood on the door going up the steps, so then we went down stairs and told the RA," said Chris Harp, a junior sports management major Staff have always noticed vandal ism throughout the halls, but this particular incident seemed to stand out.
"I think the worst situation was the vending machine. That was just inappropriate," said Webster.

Residents are upset and feel that non-Dominican residents who visit are causing the problems. "I've seen people in the lounge that don't live in Domini can," said Harp. "They should make sure guests are getting checked in because security guards just let you slide in."

The visitors seem to be enter ing the hall easily because they tamper with the emergency

exit doors.
"They're taking tape and taping the lock so when you close it, it doesn't lock. You can just pull it open," said Webster.

Students, such as senior business major Joseph Toledo, are concerned with how Barry is handling the matter.

Toledo thinks security cameras should have been placed on the second and third floor lounge and laundry rooms after the first instance.
"It's ridiculous, we're freaking adults. This is a minor punishment since we are at school, but if you do that in the 'real world' you're going to get arrested," said Toledo.
Both students and staff agree that cameras will help identify the persons responsible for vandalism.
"lt's really hard to find out

who did that since there's no cameras at all," said Harp. Webster has no information about installing cameras at this time. She urges students respon sible for the damage to identify themselves.

## Thousands of copies of The BUC stolen

The administration investigated and declined to discipline the students involved

After an article about former Buccaneer baseball player and accused drug dealer Zachary Jackson was published on the front page of The Barry Buccaneer on Feb. 26, more than 1,000 copies of the newspape disappeared from newsstands. Initially 2,600 papers were distributed and only 100 copies were left in The BUC office, according to Editor in Chief Khadine Baksh.
"I found most of them in recycle bins." said Baksh. "My sports editor told me that she just put a few stacks in the Cafe and [downstairs] Landon and they were gone when she got
back to the office,
The BUC spent an additional $\$ 705$ from advertising funds to reprint 2,700 copies of the paper "We redistributed the paper because we have advertisers that pay to be in the paper and we have other stories that students would like to read," said Baksh.

Even after redistribution, some papers continued to end up in the trash. In an effort to see who was taking papers specifical ly in Landon. The BUC requested video footage recording the newsstand on the information desk. However, Barry officials refused.
"You'd be wasting hours of your time. There's nothing to see," said Doug Ressler, investiga-
tions and training coordinator. However, a Barry professor reported that softball player Julie Brito came to her office and requested to obtain the paper sitting on her desk.
"I thought she just wanted to read it and so I said 'yes,"'s said Leah Blumenfeld, an assistant professor of political science. "It wasn't until after she grabbed the paper and hurried away that ! realized she was holding a whole stack of the papers."

Blumenfeld is unaware of what Brito did with the stack of The BUC in her hand.
"It all happened very quickly and by the time I realized what

## Investigation ended, newspaper theft continues

was going on, she had left the building," said Blumenfeld.

Brito refused to comment on the situation. However, she sent The BUC a letter of complaint via email.

Also, a security guard in Domini can Hall witnessed three girls claiming to be BUC staff members, trying to take the paper.
"They said, 'Oh we work for the newspapers, Oh they made a mistake, they're going to remove them.' I said, 'No no no, you can't remove them like that. I need to know who you are. I need to verify with Tatiana, the RC,"' said public safety officer Claire Chery.

After verifying that these students were not with The BUC, Chery didn't allow them to take the paper.

The Barry Buccaneer reported the theft to Public Safety and Miami Shores Police Department and filed a student conduct complaint with Maria Alvarez, associate vice president and dean of students.
"That's what I thought the role of the student conduct coordinator was for," said Baksh. "Dr. Alvarez told me that Julie Bnto confessed to taking only 15 copies and she can't really tell her (Brito) to pay for 15 copies. She closed the investigation and said there's nothing she can do about it." Alvarez refused to comment on the administration's investigation.

Baksh said that Alvarez told her that the police said stealing papers isn't a crime. In frustration, Baksh reached out to the Student Press Law Center for advice.
"We hear this pretty often--cops don't believe you can 'steal' something that is free. That's wrong, of course. You have the right to decide WHO gets your free stuff and how much of it , and the fact that your papers are not natled down does not
mean anyone can steal them all," said Frank D. LoMonte, a media law attorney and executive director of the SPLC.

LoMonte advised Baksh on some other steps The BUC could take.
"I actually think a lawsuit and/or a disciplinary case is the more appropriate remedy than an arrest, since it's often just a stupid momentary prank gone wrong," said LoMonte.

Some students around campus are upset that The BUC decided to place Jackson's story on the front page.
"I think it was very degrading for The Barry Buccaneer to put that on the front page," said Hector Canales, a junior international business and finance major. "It seemed very harsh and diminishing to the individual."

Others in the Barry community are upset about the newspaper theft, which is a crime, according to the SPLC.
"It's very wasteful and I'm all for |going| green," said Tokeena Wallace, a Barry alumni. "It's understood that the copies are free, but students shouldn't abuse that and trash them like that."

Some students were more concerned with the fact that Jackson was selling marijuana.
"I feel like the student's life kind of sucks now," said Ricardo Demoya, a junior biology major. "I mean he is not really going to school anymore. When that type of things happen, you really have a problem."

 this report.You'll never forget how to ride a bike, as the saying goes. Plenty of students will also never forget the day theirs was stolen.

The majority of incidents have occurred on the east side of the library, suggesting that this is the most attractive area for bicycle thieves. There have also been several thefts from the racks outside Landon. Bicycles have been taken at various times of the day and night.

The most recent thefts were on March 11 and 15 , when locked bicycles were taken from racks outside the library and O'Laughlin.

Barry has received an estimate for placing a camera in front of the library, however, there isn't much it can do.
"The decision to purchase the cameras is out of the public safety department's hands. We only make recommendations," said Douglas Ressler, investigations and training coordinator.

The cameras around Landon have failed to provide clear identification of bicycle robbers, although they do show that most locks used by students are inadequate.
"I have a recent theft on camera and you would be amazed how quickly the person cut the lock," said Ressler.

Not all thefts are necessarily done by Barry students.
"I thought somebody on campus had stolen [my bike] but it turns out it was a
little kid. Public safety saw a little boy riding on it five hours later," said Steffane Wharton, a junior professional writing major.

This January, Wharton's bike was taken from Lehman--where there are no cameras--when she left it unattended for a matter of minutes. Wharton did not lock her bicycle as there was no available bicycle rack.
Bicycles have not been safe on campus for quite some time.
"My bike was stolen from Landon in my first semester at Barry, Spring 2011," said Olivier Lemaitre, a junior in public relations.

His lock was cut and despite public safety's help, his bike was never found.
"I think it's sad that people resort to doing this," said Lemaitre.

Students wishing to protect their bicycles can do so by registering them with public safety for free on April 5 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Andreas breezeway. They can also register with the Miami Shores Police at any time. Crime Prevention events are regularly held on campus where this can be done.

There are currently 1,226 residents on campus this semester. But in the cafeteria, there are only 575 seats with a maximum occupancy of 637.
"We [Sodexo] have noticed the overcrowdedness during lunch hour, but we aren't quite sure as to what the solution may be," said Patricia Johnson, Sodexo supervisor. "We have thought that we should have two lunch sessions instead of one.

Students are starting to notice they're spending more time scouting their seats.
"Seating arrangements are only a problem during lunch hour," said Enrique Alvarado, a senior english and philosophy major. "I think they should break up the lunch hour into two sessions so everyone could fit properly without being uncomfortable."

Sodexo, Inc. is the leading provider of integrated food and facilities management services in the U.S., Canada and Mexico according to its website, but Barry students have different opinions
on the company.
"I love how many options there are to choose from, but I dislike the unclean utensils," said freshman social work major Markyse Bernadin.

Others prefer one meal time over another.
"I don't like the lunch portion at all, but I adore the breakfast and the light lunch sessions," said freshman nursing major Taylor Pelsis. Many students don't know that light lunch even exists in the Cafe, even though it's Monday to Friday from 2-5 p.m. Items like soups, the deli and salads are offered, according to the Barry website.

The cook can also make veggie burgers and cheese pizza for vegetarians at any given time.
"I've been a vegetarian for seven years, and the vegetarian options exceeds expectations," said Jelissa Cruz, freshman international business and history major. "If you haven't tried the six bean soup or the curry tofu then you're failing at the veghead-life," said Cruz.

"I order from the restaurant about once a week and the food is good and worth it for the amount of food you're getting," said sophomore nursing major Tuminee Robb. "lt's also close so that's good too."

Students feel that employees sometimes lack customer service "The employees sometimes provide rude service when placing orders," said Robb.

The same way food and deliv-
ery time are on point, customer service is sometimes underscored.
"I order food from there every couple of weeks. The food isn't that bad, I just don't like their meat. They do well with delivering on time, but they did mess up my order once and the woman who took my order wasn't friendly. I'd recommend it to other people and I like that it's close to school," said sophomore psychology major Tracy Vertus. Even with the minor hiccups, Ng guarantees that this business will be around to fill up stomachs, while customers fill up on gas for years to come.
