# Prepping for the Worst Sexual Assault Awareness at Barry University

Sexual Assault is a hot topic in America, especially when considering college campuses.

During the week of April 12, Barry University dedicated several events to opening up on the topic to create awareness among the student body. The desired result is students and faculty can become more educated about the subject in order to prevent such crimes from being committed and what steps to take if it does occur.

On Wednesday, April 15 there was a film screening of Jennifer Newsom's "Miss Representation", a documentary. The film explores how women are represented in different media platforms, the under-representation of women in politics and how it affects the rest of American society.

Following the film, a panel discussion led by Dr. Laura Finley was made available to the audience. The professions of women, in the panel, ranged from educators, to social workers, to therapists. The women shared their personal reactions to movie and spoke about what they do to entice change. They acknowledged that the culture

cannot be changed overnight, but they support the idea that our small every day actions could, progressively, shift the way we think and act.

Sexual assault and other violent crimes committed on college campuses must be recorded. The Clery Act requires all colleges and universities administering federal financial aid to record and disclose crimes committed on or near their respective campuses. The disclosures include statistics of crimes and summaries of security policies (made once a year in Annual Security Report) and information about specific crimes and emergencies. Institutions failing to comply receive penalty charges per violation. They also may be suspended from participating in financial aid programs.

"We don't have a lot of sexual misconduct reported at the university, but that doesn't mean it doesn't happen," said Maria Alvarez, Dean of Students at Barry University. She encourages students to step in if they see violent acts. "I do not advocate that you get involved, but call someone, call the police or public safety."

Soon students' opinions of how their school addresses sex-

ual assault will be observed on a national level. The Campus Safe Act is being enforced at colleges and universities across the country. By next July, all institutions have to administer a survey the services provided when it comes to reporting physical abuse.

"Less than 5 percent of violent cases are reported on campus ... but that may be because, of a lack of desensitization," said Finley.

Finley believes that not speaking to authorities is common because many victims believe the act was partially their fault. There is also a lack of knowledge on how to go about reporting misconduct.

"I don't know where to go if someone is being abused or if something like it were to happen to me," said Sophie Dagrin, freshman exercise physiology major. "I know that there is security around, but it might already be too late."

The hope is Barry students take time to understand sexual misconduct, though a sensitive subject, should be addressed and corrected. This observance of how to stop violent crimes against college students can help decrease the number of victims.

After I graduate I plan to continue playing matches for my tennis club in Germany and then it is time to start working. I would love to work in an area that is related to sports.



# Watch where you're going Crossing mishaps on Barry's crosswalks

In the past six months, two Barry students and a neighbor who lives near campus have all been struck by cars while crossing the street, Miami Shores Police records show.

The three cases have one thing in common - someone was not paying enough attention, something students and officials agree upon.

The first accident occurred in October and left doctoral student and Barry employee Jeanerva Pearson with an injured ankle. Pearson was crossing the crosswalk on North Miami Avenue in front of Andreas, at the time of the crash. The driver was cited for failing to use due care toward a pedestrian, according to the police report.

Pearson said the accident left her scared to walk to her car.

"I would have a lot of anxiety attacks and panics thinking about going to my car," she said. "Just the thought of me even having to walk across, I would find any excuse about not going to my car."

The night of Pearsons' accident the surrounding street lights were not working and she was wearing all black, according to the police report.

Doug Ressler, acting public safety director said he only recalls a handful of accidents in the three years he has worked at

"I know a lot of people at

school and I see them, we all see them, they just walk out in the road, assuming that a car is going to stop," said Ressler. "That's wrong. That's a wrong assumption to make, because whether or not the driver is right or wrong the pedestrian is going to lose."

Miami Shores Police Chief Kevin Lystad, wondered if the regular traffic back-up contributed to the accidents.

"The other issue that I suspect is that drivers, which I haven't been able to establish it, could become frustrated with delays that are caused by students crossing," he said.

Students admit, however, that they're often distracted by their phones and not paying attention to the cars.

Sophomore broadcasting major Valerie Antonuccio said she was nearly hit in the crosswalk recently, though she confessed to be partially at fault because she was texting while crossing North Miami Avenue.

"Any accident is caused by one person not paying attention to what they're doing and what somebody else is doing," said Ressler.

The most recent accident left Barry Student Chantel Drysdale with serious injuries after being hit by a pickup truck. She was airlifted via helicopter to Ryder Trauma Center where she was treated for severe injuries to her right hip and broken femur.

A witness told police that Drysdale was not in the crosswalk at the time of the accident and appeared to be looking down on her phone when the driver hit her as she crossed the

Drysdale is now back on campus and attending her regular classes.

Junior biochemistry major Ramon Gutierrez almost suffered a similar fate recently, when he was texting while crossing the North Miami Avenue.

"If I wouldn't have looked up, I would have gotten ran over by the car," said Gutierrez

Barry is working closely with Miami-Dade County to try and make North Miami Avenue safer. Barry's director of external and government affairs, Elizabeth Besade, said the county conducted a traffic study in November, measuring the speed and volume of traffic over a 24 hour time period between Northeast 111th and Northeast 115th streets.

"We absolutely want the students to be safe," said Besade. "But we have to keep working with the county because it has to be collaborative."

In an effort to improve the lighting situation, Barry added flood lights on the gates leading to Lehman and the wall outside of Andreas to help guide drivers and students at night.

But Pearson said, they're just a Band-Aid on the larger issue.

On April 14, after the Buc spoke with Chief Lystad, two patrol cars were parked outside Lehman's front lawn monitoring the crosswalk in rush hour traffic.

A. of the hall banged on windows and doors, urging students to get out of their rooms, while the fire alarm sounded. This wasn't a drill. Room 34 had flames bursting from the closed door.

"The fire was huge, the metal door was melting and the glass broke open from the heat," said freshmen Paul Matos. "Barry's faculty was trying their best to get everyone out, thankfully there were no injuries from the incident."

Matos was napping when the fire started.

"Sister Linda and Student affairs staff came quickly to see the fire come out of the room,"said Michael Barroso, sophomore

pre-med-bio major who was at the scene. "One of the faculty members was seen hoseing the fire down, before the fire depart ment arrived."

The room was destroyed between the charring from the fire and everything being soaked from the pressure of the water pumps. Two fire engines arrived on the scene for safety.

Students were given shirts at the scene if they weren't properly clothed. all the affected students were excused from their classes for the duration that they were not allowed access to their dorm rooms. Police and public safety then closed off the area affected by the fire.

"I was told to move as soon as possible, the same day of the fire." said freshmen Kelvin L. Pitman, who was moved to a new room for safety purposes.



- 12. There is a free bus to the mall from campus every weekend.



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
